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# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Sustainable development is the pathway to the future we want for all. It offers a framework to generate economic growth, achieve social justice, exercise environmental stewardship and strengthen governance."

The above quote by Ban ki-Moon corroborates well with the fact that today, after almost two years of the pandemic and much global tension, India stands on the helm of massive economic integration across the globe, having aptly earned the title of 'one of the fastest growing world economies'. This further endorses Prime Minister, Mr. Narendra Modi's vision that 2022, a year of revival and rejuvenation, will be the golden page of building a New India. We are celebrating 75 years of India's independence this year, a tribute to the eternal experience of a self-built, self-sustained and self-motivated nation that has inspired the entire world. The achievements of the nation as whole stand as a commemoration of the spirit of the freedom movement and the sacrifice of the martyrs who worked relentlessly towards building the majestic nation we are today and propelling us towards unprecedented growth and progress.

I must begin by appreciating the 2022-23 budget, a pragmatic, progressive and growth-oriented one that speaks volumes of the government's dedication towards continuous and consistent economic growth in the country. I am delighted to inform that Hon'ble Finance Minister, Ms. Nirmala Sitharaman graced the occasion of our Chamber's Post Budget Interactive Session on "Implications of Union Budget 2022-23" with our industry members. The invigorating discussion was well received by the stakeholders with an active discussion between the Minister and the Industry members. The budget is a step forward towards creating an Atmanirbhar Bharat and seeks to lay down the foundation of 'Amrit Kal', an epoch of 25 years that will propel India @75 to India @ 100 by the year 2047.

I am thankful that the Omicron variant that embodied the third wave was relatively mild, though highly infectious. This not only resulted in lesser mortality, but also reduced the severity of the economic impact. Having said this, the Indian economy is expected to expand by 9.2 percent in the current fiscal year and by 8-8.5 percent in the next fiscal year. Industry fully appreciates that this year's budget theme will ramp up growth of infrastructure, digitization, manufacturing, Start-ups, MSMEs, Green energy, among others. The allocations in infrastructure and affordable housing along with vast initiatives in Production Linked Incentive Scheme are indeed goal setting and unprecedented, all crucial for employment creation and enhanced income.

The budget provides impetus to programmes such as the PM Gati Shakti National Master Plan, a transformative approach to boost economic growth and sustainable development driven by its seven engines These include - Mass Transport, Waterways, Railways, Roads, Airports, Ports, and Logistics Infrastructure. This was strongly reiterated by Finance Minister at the interactive session with PHD industry members wherein she pointed out that India has to tread on a two-track growth path. One is Rail, which is going to have a multimodal approach, guided by the Gati Shakti Project where 21st century infrastructure will be built. Gati Shakti will ensure that there is a synergy between every mode of transportation and linkages with logistics for smooth transfer of goods and services inside India and outside.

The boost to infrastructure development in the Budget is visible through announcements such as proposals for manufacturing 400 new-generation Vande Bharat trains in the next 3 years, expansion of National Highway network by 25,000 km in FY 2022-23, planning of 100 cargo terminals in 3 years, among others. We appreciate the government for announcing an increase in Capex to Rs. 7.5 trillion in FY 2022-23 from Rs. 5.5 trillion in FY 2021-22. An amount of Rs. 1 lakh crore would be allocated to the States, as interest free 50-year loans for FY 2022-23. This will help the State governments speed up their spending on infrastructure.

We further concur with the Finance Minister that the second track of sustainable growth involves new opportunities in startups, sunrise sectors and transition towards clean energy. Sunrise sectors including artificial intelligence, geospatial systems and drones, semi-conductors, space economy, genomics and pharmaceuticals, and clean mobility systems have been awarded special mention in the budget which I believe is a highly progressive step.

India is fast tracked towards becoming a digitally forward, sustainable global

superpower by the end of this decade as is visible with the introduction of digital currency, issuance of e-passports, IT based land records, Hi-tech services for farmers and data centres for farmers. FM clarified that a consultative process for crypto currency formalization is going on with all concerned authorities and a transparent policy initiative in this regard will be announced soon.

We opine that the roll out of the National Digital Health Ecosystem, an open platform consisting of digital registries of health providers and health facilities, unique health identity and universal access to health facilities is highly encouraging. This is especially relevant in these times of the pandemic, wherein predictive and preventive health and seamless continuum of care across the healthcare journey of an individual have become extremely critical.

The increased budget for solar power and policies to support a circular economy shows the government's commitment to a carbon-neutral economy. The government has considered the Chamber's proposal on issuing sovereign Green Bonds for mobilizing resources for green infrastructure.

It is highly encouraging that the Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme (ECLGS) has helped 130 lakh MSMEs to mitigate the worst impact of the pandemic. In this regard, I welcome extension of the ECLGS up to March 2023 and its guarantee cover will be expanded by Rs 50,000 crore to total cover of five lakh crore rupees.

The Finance Minister in her address pointed out that 1700 dead laws have been removed for supporting Ease of Doing Business 2.0. Industry finds this highly inspiring as it shows the commitment of the government for 'minimum government and maximum governance.'

Apt like the beautiful verse by Kautilya, "Success needs action. Action needs initiative", we assure the government of our commitment to bring together industry stakeholders to invest across sectors and help in boosting growth amid high & rising inflation and continuing Covid uncertainties. It is our collective mission to work assiduously to make India the fastest growing economy while creating new opportunities for the common person.

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


DR RAGHUPATI SINGHANIA FORMER PRESIDENT, PHDCCI (1991-92) r Raghupati Singhania is the Chairman & Managing Director at JK Tyre & Industries Ltd. With over 40 years of experience in leading and managing businesses, he is well known in the industry for his remarkable visionary abilities, quest for innovation and entrepreneurial zeal, which were best displayed when JK Tyre ushered radial technology in India way back in 1977 when all other tyre companies in the country were grappling with intricacies of conventional technology.

During his tenure as President of PHDCCI, Dr Singhania was of the view that human resource development held the key to economic progress of the nation. He felt that a large reservoir of productive human capital would be an incentive for foreign investors to invest in India. He underlined that agricultural development was crucial in bringing about qualitative changes in the demographic profile of the country and thus advocated for a sharper focus on rural infrastructure and semiurban market. Also, he opined that development of new cities with modern facilities and amenities would avoid migration and help in meeting people's aspirations. The Chamber under his leadership supported globalization and also highlighted that India should endeavor to develop that measure of strength and excellence which would enable it to stand in the comity of nations with its head held high.

Dr Singhania has held several prominent positions as a board member of various leading Apex Chambers and Government bodies of India, including Confederation of Indian Industry, Automotive Tyre Manufacturers Association, Associated Chamber of Commerce and Industry Indo-American Chamber of Commerce, North India Council, Asia-New Zealand Foundation, Bureau of Indian Standards, Rubber Board (Kottayam), Chemical & Allied Products Exports, Promotion Council and Indian Wire Rope Manufacturers Association.

Dr Singhania has also been associated with various premier educational institutions as a board member, including Xavier Institute of Management, Bhubaneshwar and Indian Institute of Technology, Chennai. He is also Pro-Chancellor of JK Lakshmipat University, Jaipur. His illustrious career is studded with numerous prestigious recognitions and awards for his dynamic approach to business. His passion for sports and technology led JK Tyre into the arena of motorsports in the nineteen eighties, when it founded its own rally team.






DR ASHOK KHANNA Former President, Phdcci (1998-99) r Ashok Khanna is the Chairman and Managing Director of Khanna Watches Ltd. Dr Khanna with a first class B.Tech (Hons) degree in textiles from Bradford University and taken an AOTS Course in Japan, Industrial Training Courses in Toshiba (Japan), Switzerland, U.K and USA became the founder Managing Director of the Punjab Anand Batteries Ltd. In 1977 he ventured to start his own industrial house, Khanna Watches Ltd. in collaboration with S.B.B.M. Burdet, FRANCE. In 2007, he diversified his business in the field of construction and real estate.

As Chamber's President, he catalogued a number of proactive suggestions for the government to act on. This included the government playing a predominant role in providing school education, healthcare and social infrastructure to the people. He advocated the strengthening and modernization of industrial clusters in the country. Dr Khanna also showed concern about the poor state of finances of the States and called for change in formula of revenue sharing between Centre and states. Dr Khanna supported productivity improvement of labour laws to improve the generation of employment. He supported introduction of VAT in the country.

In 2011, Dr Khanna was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by SBBS / Zoroastrian College, Mumbai. He has been a senior Member of the Managing Committee of FICCI,CII and ASOCHAM and also served as member of Administrator's Advisory's Council, IDBI, National Productivity Council, GNDU, DGTD and educational institutions such as Thapar University, Punjab University, and Banyan Tree School. Dr Khanna has also served in senior positions in Ansal Housing Construction Ltd.; WWICS Group and Industrial Cables (India) Ltd.

Dr Khanna is the Founder Chairman of Art of Living (Punjab, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh & Chandigarh). He is also the Brand Ambassador of Solar, Chandigarh.



MR. KARNA SINGH MEHTA Former President, Phdcci (1999-2000) r. Karna Singh Mehta is a leading Chartered Accountant and is the Managing Partner of the firm of Chartered Accountants, S.S. Kothari Mehta & Co. Having vast experience in the field of finance and accounting, he steered his Audit Firm, S.S.Kothari Mehta & Co. to be amongst the Top-10 in India.

Mr. Mehta has made a mark in the profession, in Tax Policy thoughts and in Rain Water Harvesting through the PHD Rural Development Foundation. As Chairman and then as Mentor of PHD Rural Development Foundation, he brought about significant step-up in construction of over 300 Rain Water Harvesting Structures which have hugely impacted agricultural productivity and human lives especially in Rajasthan, Haryana and 5 other States.

During his tenure as President of PHD Chamber, he led a joint delegation of Haryana Government and the Chamber to meet industry leaders in Japan, Korea and Singapore. This led to the bringing of Suzuki Engine Plant to Haryana and other investments on the lines of industrial estates in Singapore. As President, he also campaigned for liberalization of Capital Issue Rules bringing about the reduction of 60% public holding to 25%. This triggered off the growth in public capital issues. His role was recognized when he was appointed a member of SEBI Primary Markets Advisory Committee and then SEBI nominated Director of National Stock Exchange of India.

Mr Mehta brought up the standards of work in his Chartered Accountancy profession. He served as Chairman – Research Committee, and Vice Chairman of Accounting Standard Board while being member of Central Council of Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. His writings in newspapers spurred the introduction of laws for exemption of demergers; for conversion of Sole Proprietorships and Firms into Companies to enable their growth from the Chamber, where he was Chairman of Tax and Company Law Committee for over seven years.





DR KASHI NATH MEMANI Former President, Phdcci (2004-2005) r Kashi Nath Memani is the Chairman of HT Consultancy Services Private Limited. He was the President of the PHD Chamber during the centenary year of the Chamber, 2004-05. The Chamber commemorated the historic occasion of 100 years during his tenure. 

Expert Committees. More than 100 Members and Industry Stakeholders participated in the virtual mode.





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


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# **THE STORIES OF UNSUNG WOMEN HEROES**


Badrinath, Rishikesh and Haridwar. It receives tourists from across the globe who visit this great land in search of physical, mental and spiritual healing.

# GLOBAL TRADE AND INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR INDIAN INDUSTRY IN IRAN

he International Affairs & Trade Fairs Division, PHDCCI launched its first Virtual Interactive Series on Global Trade and Investment Opportunities for Indian Industry for the year 2022 - Global Trade and Investment Opportunities for Indian Industry in Iran on February 2, 2022.

Mr. Vijay Mehta, Chair, International Affairs Committee for MENA, PHDCCI while setting the agenda mentioned that the series will network and make new business connections with an idea to highlight and showcase the various opportunities and incentives provided by the world's prominent investment attractive economies to Indian investors.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCCI in his presidential address highlighted that India-Iran relations spans millennia marked by meaningful interactions and with a focused and sector-specific approach, both the Indian and Iran Industries should strive towards fostering business cooperation by establishing joint ventures, technological transfers and partnerships.

H.E. Mr. Masoud Khansari, Tehran Chamber President, of Commerce, Industries & Mines talked about the impact of the pandemic on both the countries that are facing formidable challenges and opportunities. He said Indian and Iranian Industries should strive towards fostering business cooperation by establishing joint



ventures. He also invited PHDCCI to lead business delegations to Iran which will create new areas of mutual co-operation and ensure the smooth flow of trade & bilateral cooperation.

Mr. Massoud Rezvanian, Deputy Chief of Mission, Embassy of Islamic Republic of Iran spoke on the friendly relations shared between the two countries since history, growing in a multifaceted manner. He mentioned that to increase the bilateral trade relations, there is a need to strengthen financial and banking services in both nations. Both nations should find themselves an opportune moment to explore the convergence of their mutual interests.

Mr. Ravinder Singh, Second Secretary (Commercial), Embassy of India, Iran highlighted that India and Iran have a strong bilateral economic relationship and it needs to further deepen for the benefit of people of both countries in focused sectors such as automobile components, IT and pharma.

Ms. Maryam Faraji, Deputy Director General for Foreign Investment, Ministry of Economic Affairs & Finance of Islamic Republic of Iran gave an overview of the Iranian economy. She highlighted that it's the right time to enter into joint ventures for increasing investments by organizing several important economic and commercial conferences and exhibitions to enhance our bilateral economic relations.

Mr. Seyed Reza Seyed Aghazadeh, Director-General of the Asia-Pacific Office at Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO) while deliberating about the historical, cultural, and geographical ties between the two nations, mentioned that the Free Trade Agreement needs to be processed for facilitating trade and at the same time for reducing tariffs. He highlighted that increasing trade relations by leveraging business environment will be a welcome step between the two countries.

Ms. Ferial Mostofi, Head of Investment & Consultancy Center of TCCIMA highlighted that Iran offers unique and valuable geographic location and provides a perfect platform to tap the fast growing and lucrative global market in key sectors like agricultural, infrastructure, energy, mining, pharmacology, innovation and digital. She also highlighted about the advantages of investing in Chabahar Free Zone in the areas of trade, welfare services and tourism. She also mentioned about financial mechanisms like barter mechanism and blockchain as well as crypto currencies for facilitating trade.

Mr. DPGoel, Co-chair, International Affairs Committee for MENA, PHDCCI thanked all the dignitaries for the informative session provided to Indian industry about the various incentives offered by the Government of Iran.

Mr. Surinder K Kalra, Co-chair, International Affairs Committee for MENA, PHDCCI delivered the vote-of-thanks to the guests and mentioned that PHDCCI will continue to work towards better and stronger collaborations with Iran and will constantly strive to identify new areas of mutual co-operation and ensure the smooth flow of trade, investment, joint ventures and technology.

The session was jointly moderated by Mr. Naveen Seth, Assistant Secretary, PHDCCI and Mr. Niraj, Senior Secretary - International Affairs, PHDCCI. The session witnessed the participation of over 233 industry members including over 120 Iranian companies.



#### NEXT PHASE OF EASE OF LIVING TO BE LAUNCHED UNDER AMRIT KAAL : UNION BUDGET 2022-23

"This Budget seeks to lay the foundation and give a blueprint to steer the economy over the Amrit Kaal of the next 25 years – from India at 75 to India at 100". The Union Minister for Finance and Corporate Affairs, Ms. Nirmala Sitharaman, laid this vision, while presenting the Union Budget 2022-23 in Parliament. She made the announcement for the next launch of Ease of Living under Amrit Kaal.

The Union Minister explained that this new phase of Ease of living will be guided by an approach comprising of the following: Active involvement of the states, Digitisation of manual processes and interventions and Integration of the central and state-level systems through IT bridges. This will help in creating a single point access for all citizen-centric services and bring about standardization and removal of overlapping compliances.

The Finance Minister announced that the issuance of e-Passports using embedded chip and futuristic Technology will be rolled out in 2022-23. This will further enhance the convenience for citizens in their overseas travel.

Modernization of building byelaws, Town Planning Schemes and Transit Oriented Development have also been proposed by the Finance Minister to bring about reforms in Urban planning. This will facilitate reforms for the people to live and work closer to mass transit systems. In this regard, the Union Minister also said that, "the Central Government's financial support for mass transit projects and AMRUT scheme will be leveraged for formulation of action plans and their implementation for facilitating TOD and TPS by the states".

For developing India specific knowledge in urban planning and design, and to deliver certified training in these areas, up to five existing academic institutions in different regions have been proposed to be designated as Centres of Excellence. Ms. Sitharaman also informed that centres will be provided endowment funds of Rs. 250 crore each.

The Finance Minister, while highlighting the constraint of space in urban areas for setting up charging stations at scale, announced the proposal of bringing out Battery Swapping Policy and inter-operability standards. The private sector will be encouraged to develop sustainable and innovative business models for 'Battery or Energy as a Service.

# **INDIA INC. SPEAKS: UNION BUDGET 2022-23**



PhD Chamber organized its Flagship Event- India Inc. Speaks: Union Budget 2022-23, on February 1, 2022 in Hybrid Mode. Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber presented the welcome address at the inaugural session.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber, said that the Economic Survey 2021-22 projected a growth rate of 8-8.5% in FY2023 on the back of macro-economic stability and wellplaced effective reforms undertaken by the government. On the Budget expectations, he opined that the budget should focus on refuelling the consumption demand, private investments and employment creation through ensuring hassle free credit availability to industry, particularly for MSMEs, improving ease of doing business for the MSMEs, reducing costs of doing business, creating a level playing field for the industry and timely justice for people and industry. He emphasized that the reforms should be undertaken to bolster the MSME sector and the focus should be on easing the compliance for MSMEs as well as easing the availability and access to finance for MSMEs. After the announcement of the Union Budget, he said that the budget is a very pragmatic and promising budget for Aatmanirbhar Bharat. This year budget has laid a strong emphasis on the PM Gati Shakti Scheme, which is a positive step. He stated that Rs 7.5 lakh crore Capex which is 30% higher than the previous year is a good step. He welcomed the measure to extend ECLGS scheme and suggested that the manufacturing sector, especially the MSMEs need relief on high commodity prices though relaxations and welcomed the announcement on steel commodities.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, Immediate Former President, PHD Chamber, was of the view that Economic Survey 2020-21 has been a sentiment booster with encouraging numbers. He said that the government has introduced National Infrastructure Pipeline and Gati Shakti scheme in the last few years, for which required investments are to be made by the government and public sector. He said that it is a K-shaped recovery from COVID-19 wherein the large corporates and producers are doing well but it is those at the bottom of the pyramid that need handholding. He emphasized that sectors like pharmaceuticals, housing, MSMEs and automobiles are expected to produce employment and GDP growth. He said that high commodity prices need to be addressed in the budget. It is also important to remove customs duties to zero on certain commodities. He said that ECLGS for MSMEs has been a big support and should be extended to repeal the brunt faced by MSMEs during COVID-19.

Dr NR Bhanumurthy, Renowned Economist and Vice Chancellor, BASE University, Bengaluru, said that the Union Budget 2022-23 is going to be growth-oriented and is expected to focus on fiscal consolidation by putting the money where the government could get better returns employment opportunities. and He said that the budget is going to focus on capital expenditure and particularly the capital expenditure in the agriculture sector. He said that the agriculture sector needs investment. He said that the government has laid the roadmap and that National Infrastructure Pipeline and National Monetisation Pipeline are extremely important for mid-term growth. He said that the budget is going to be opportune and will focus on potential GDP of the country. He also mentioned that inflation is in a much better position. He said that it is important to focus on a USD 5 trillion economy as a medium-term target. He also said that the implementation of urban employment guarantees like rural programmes are important and that the government should come out with sectoral interventions. He said that V-shaped recovery is expected in the coming period.





Dr Ashok Khanna, Former President, PHD Chamber, said that the overall budget will boost economic growth. In his view, special focus on 'Housing for all' and infrastructure development are major instruments for growth. A lot of announcements have been made in terms of highways projects, reducing compliances to make life easier and digitalization. Also, the stock market has boomed with the announcement of the budget. Telecom sector has been given a boost but the common man is still struggling with connectivity issue at the grassroots level; thus, it requires financial support at the state level. He opined that the long-term capital gains on listed equity shares of 15 %, GST collection, defence production, domestic industry, e-passport, and emphasis on the agriculture and export sector are all good moves.

Mr. K S Mehta, Former President, PHD Chamber, appreciated that the Budget encouraged the manufacturing and services sector. He said that the budget will also lead to a revival in the sectors which have been worst affected by the pandemic.

Mr. Sanjay Bhatia, Former President, PHD Chamber, appreciated the Finance Minister for starting her budget speech with special emphasis on digital economy and Fintech, which would play a very vital role in building a New India. He appreciated the step taken by the Government for MSMEs, ECLGS extension and CGTMSE schemes. Railways to develop projects for MSMEs and defence will help India to become Aatmanirbhar Bharat. Lastly, he appreciated the extension of scrap duty for one more year and removal of customs duty on steel.

Mr. Ashok Kajaria, Former President, PHD Chamber, said that the budget has given the roadmap for the next 3-5 years. He appreciated the announcement on the digital Rupee to be issued by RBI. He highlighted that the incentives for new companies and start-ups, which have been extended are positive steps.

Mr. Sandip Somany, Former President, PHD Chamber, appreciated the continuity in the Budget. He remarked that the directionality of the budget is very good and focus on Aatmanirbhar Bharat and Infrastructure are encouraging. He felt that expansion of ECLGS scheme is a very good move as this will increase Line of Credit to businesses with enough amount of capital that will help small scale businesses to continue forward.

Mr. Suman Jyoti Khaitan, Former President, PHD Chamber, described the budget as positive and a long-term budget with a vision but the real test is implementation. In case, there is no new strain of the COVID variant, then this budget will be path-breaking as the economy is positive with enough credit and the only need is to focus on the implementation path, he added further.

Dr Mahesh Gupta, Former President, PHD Chamber, said that it has been a historic budget during the pandemic. He said the basic reason has been of creating jobs in the post pandemic era. In his view, infrastructure development and capital expenditure announced by the government would greatly enhance growth. He further said that all aspects of development have been covered. He was glad that income tax and GST have not been touched in a way. He said that the focus would have been on better revenue collection and better management of funds. He further said that MAT rates have been reduced and the effect of COVID-19 has been taken up well in the budget.

Mr. Rajeev Talwar, Former President, PHD Chamber, in his budget expectations opined that the budget will cement tax reforms. He was of the view that over the years, the government has done well and tackled the pandemic and its impact on the budget. He further mentioned that education, health and housing are three areas that need to be focused upon in the budget. He said that in the coming years, 80% of the population would be living in the cities, then pucca houses must be developed on the government land to be provided free of cost with rent as low as Rs 50 per day. He said that three big ideas must be followed in the budget, first, affordable housing, second, cooperatives in the agriculture sector for providing economic returns to farmers and third, the MSME sectors that contribute 30% to GDP. He said that MSMEs require lesser compliances, better technology and engineering so that they produce world-class goods.

Dr D K Aggarwal, Former President, PHD Chamber, said that strategic sale of Air India is a good step. Emphasis on LIC is a big event for India, which indicates more than 2 crore investors, will get access to the capital market which will improve financial inclusion. He stated that Venture Capital and Private Equity invested more than Rs.5.5 lakh crores last year facilitating one of the largest start-up and growth ecosystems, is a big step by the





#### government.

Mr. Mukul Bagla, Chair, Direct Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that the government has put a lot of stress to settle the disputes of taxpayers and to clarify the things with the tax payers. He appreciated that the government has allowed the assesse to revise their return for a period of 2 years for the end of the relevant assessment year. He informed that the incentives for start-ups have been extended by one more year. He expected some clarity on the tariff rate of the crypto-currencies and also said that there is no change in the tax rate for MSMEs and sole proprietors which are small businesses that are still taxed at the rate of 30%.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that there are some big announcements by the Finance Minister in the Union Budget 2022-23 under the GST regime. He further informed that the GST revenue collection was growing during the last 2 years and people are struggling with the pandemic. He expected that five specific petroleum products to be included under the GST regime and also asked for providing the roadmap for including these petroleum products.

Mr. Sandeep Aggarwal, Chair, Industry Affairs Committee, PHD Chamber, appreciated the PLI scheme with electronics. He suggested that for certain products which are not included in PLI Scheme, the government may add those items in the PLI Scheme because it would help in economic growth. He appreciated the government to make Performance Bank Guarantees into Insurance linked schemes.

Mr. Vipin Vohra, Chair, Civil Aviation Committee, PHD Chamber, commented that the budget focus is more towards infrastructure development. The government had taken lots of initiatives for the civil aviation sector and given emphasis on reducing logistic costs, which will further accelerate 'Make in India'. He appreciated the move to develop 100 cargo terminals and skilling the logistics sector.

Mr. Atantra Das Gupta, Chair, Medical Devices Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that India has not only excelled in manufacturing but also in a position to export, therefore a little more exemption and allocations in terms of healthcare were required. He appreciated e-health and teleconsultation have risen in popularity not only on the government side, but also on the private side and suggested that a proper road map is required to strengthen these facilities.

Mr. Ajay Beri, Chair Agri Food Processing Committee, PHD Chamber, welcomed the step for procurement of fruits and vegetables and said that this will enhance the capability of the food processing industry.

Mr. Dev Goyal, Co-chair, MSME Committee, PHD Chamber stated that the initiative by 1.5 lakh post offices across the country will provide the banking services is a welcome sign towards the 'Atmanirbhar Bharat'. He appreciated the Government for announcing certain schemes for the farmers such as subsidized loan at 7% interest, out of this 4% is a grant given by the Government, so effective rate of the loan is 3%. Farmers still do not avail it, therefore, once post offices start working as banks in the villages will help to make the farmers Atmanirbhar.

Mr. Vikram Singh Mehta,Co-chair, Economic Affairs Committee, PHD Chamber said that this is quite a mixed budget and suggested that some reforms were needed for health, MSMEs, manufacturing and education sector. He further suggested this budget should have focused more towards revision in the tax slabs and more on revenue collection.

Mr. Rajan Sehgal, Co-chair, Tourism and Hospitality Committee, PHD Chamber stated that the Travel and Tourism sector suffered the most during the last two years due to the pandemic. He addressed various challenges faced by the hospitality industry in providing services to clients. He said that this sector expects some percentage of salaries to the staff (tour operators and transporters) which are approved by the government so that they can survive in the market.

Mr. Mahendra Kumar Rustagi, Co-chair, Environment Committee, PHD Chamber said that, the Green Bond with the sovereign guarantee has been announced is a great step forward for sustainable development and climate change.

Mr. Rupinder Singh Sachdeva, Chair, Punjab Chapter, PHD Chamber said that this year's budget is a very good budget and appreciable as it is taking care of many good aspects, especially MSME sector allocation. Direct payment of MSP to the farmers, smart villages, 5G network, Open fibre cable network are the need of the hour which the government should push more in the future for the betterment of the people.

Mr. Amit Kumar Choudhary, Co-chair, Rajasthan Chapter, PHD Chamber said that, PM Gati Shakti Scheme is going to boost the infrastructure sector and Housing For All will also contribute significantly to enhance the real estate sector. The announcement for submitting a revised tax return for taxpayers who committed omissions or mistakes estimating their income for tax payment is a revolutionary part of this budget.

Mr. B K Sabarwal, Managing Committee Member, PHD Chamber, stated that the emphasis on Capex from Rs 5.5 lakh crore to Rs 7.5 lakh crore will boost the infrastructure sector. He further mentioned that LIC issue would be coming shortly and other public sector disinvestments would be followed which is a positive sign. He further appreciated the GIFT City in which world-class foreign universities can come and establish themselves and would allow setting up of an international arbitration centre at GIFT City, which would be a welcome step.

Mr. Saurabh Sanval, Secretary General, PHD Chamber said that the government has placed modernisation and infrastructure development of the Armed Forces at the centre stage of the National Security and Defence Planning process. PHD Chamber has been working very closely with all the stakeholders of the Indian defence industry including Ministry of Defence, Armed Forces and the Paramilitary Forces for promoting indigenization and self-reliance in defence manufacturing with special emphasis on MSMEs. He appreciated that PHDCCI's sincere effort has been greatly acknowledged and amplified by the Finance Minister in Budget 2022 through the increase in the defence capital procurement from 58% to 68%.

# POST BUDGET INTERACTIVE SESSION ON IMPLICATIONS OF UNION BUDGET 2022-23

The Direct Taxes Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on Post Budget Interactive Session on "Implications of Union Budget 2022-23" on February 4, 2022, in a virtual mode. Mr. Tarun Bajaj, Revenue Secretary, Ministry of Finance and Mr. J B Mohapatra, Chairman, CBDT had an interactive session with the Members of PHD Chamber.

Mr. Tarun Bajaj, Revenue Secretary, Ministry of Finance stated that the whole idea for the budget 2022-23 was to give a push to the economy. If GDP goes up, employment situation improves, the industry also feels that there is demand in the market and demand goes up. He further stated that the government also wanted that private sector should take over the investment which is dominated by the government sector. He mentioned that the capital expenditure has gone from Rs 5.54 lakh crore to Rs 7.50 lakh crore, out of this 1 lakh crore will go to the states for infrastructure. He said that the Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme extended & enhanced, sectors not covered earlier are to be covered, the CGTMSC is to be expanded by other 2 lakh crores which will provide collateral free loans to small and medium industry and also to micro industry. He explained that one factor that is important in the budget making process is the transparency which the Government has not hidden in terms of revenue and expenditure. He also added that stability, predictability and not giving surprises is a matter of tax policy which the government has implemented more on the corporate side than on the individual side.

Mr. Saket Dalmia, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber, in his



welcome remarks stated that as with 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' and 'Make in India' being given a push along with Amrit Kaal' aspirations, a new vision of a developed India has been rolled out with the budget of 2022-23. Announcements related to Gati Shakti, Capex Boom, Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme extension and enhancement, PLI Schemes are signals that the Government is listening and reacting. He further stated that better conformity to taxes will be a game changer in ease of doing business to turbocharge the tax compliance. He opined that state level overreaching the GST related administrative power is having a devastating impact on small and medium companies since the whole concept of GST is based on one nation and one tax. He suggested addressing the issue for further robustness in GST collection and encouragement of new enterprises for times to come.

Mr. Mukul Bagla, Chair, Direct Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber stated that major hits of the budget 2022-23 is the substantial increase of over 30% in the capital expenditure of fiscal 2023 which is expected to re-kick the investment cycles; there was no new direct taxes, income and capital gains. He appreciated the continuous focus on affordable housing under the 'Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojna'. On the direct tax front, a lot of measures have been taken and clarity has been provided over the taxation of virtual digital assets. He appreciated the reduction in minimum surcharge of 15% applicable on all longterm capital gains; extend the sunset clause for Sec 115 BAB in respect of the manufacturing entities which are taking the benefit of 15% tax rate by one more year. This would help in setting up of many new manufacturing units. He also appreciated that decision on extension of date of incorporating of eligible start-ups for taking the tax benefits and change on the introduction of the provision of filling updated returns for 2 years on payment of additional tax.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that the basic custom duty is being rationalized either reduced or exempted on raw materials input in component to boost 'Make in India' and 'Vocal for Local' for local domestic manufacturing which will help in removing cascading, increasing the local manufacturing and reducing the requirement of finished goods. Thereby outflow of convertible foreign exchange will not be there so balance of payable will come out. He mentioned that SEZ Act would be repealed for inclusive growth and provide boost to the exports and will create jobs. He appreciated the Government for extending the time limit to avail the credit till November 30 of next fiscal year and the amendment of GST R1 and 3B in case there is omission or error by November 30 of next fiscal year.

Mr. Rajeev Talwar, Former President, PHD Chamber, appreciated the recent announcements by the Finance Minister in the Union Budget 2022-23, particularly the extension of affordable housing till 2023. He urged that GST slabs for housing, construction, and agriculture cooperatives be rationalised, and that agriculture cooperatives are the way of the future. He further acknowledged that the ECGLS budget provisions are excellent, not only for the hotel and tourism sector, but also for the MSME sector, which has a provision of 2 lakh crores.

Mr. Sanjay Bhatia, Former President, PHD Chamber, stated that in order to promote the 'Make in India' and localization, a dedicated fund should be allocated which can be used by domestic industry to replace the imports of components and raw materials. He pointed out that TDS provision which came in last year to deduct the TDS on purchases made on more than Rs. 50 lakh has increased clerical work.

Mr. Sanjeev Agrawal, Vice President, PHD Chamber, delivered the vote-of-thanks to the Chief Guest. Guest of Honor and other members of PHD Chamber. He stated that it is highly encouraging to note that the Budget aims to focus on infrastructure and connectivity. To facilitate faster movement of people and goods, PM Gati Shakti will encompass the seven engines for multi-modal connectivity that are roads, railways, airports, ports, mass transport, waterways, and logistics.

About 600 delegates participated in the session. The programme was moderated by Dr S P Sharma, Chief Economist, DSG, PHD Chamber.

#### MINISTRY OF TOURISM SANCTIONS 6 PROJECTS UNDER ECO THEME IN 'SWADESH DARSHAN' SCHEME

The Ministry of Tourism has identified Eco Circuit as one of the fifteen thematic circuits for development under the Swadesh Darshan Scheme to promote eco-tourism in the country. The Ministry of Tourism has sanctioned of projects under Eco Theme in 'Swadesh Darshan.' A The Ministry has signed a MoU with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and Responsible Tourism Society of India (RTSOI) in September, 2021 with the purpose to undertake measures to actively promote and support 'sustainability initiatives' in the tourism sector of each other and work in a collaborative manner wherever possible. The Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change informed that they have issued guidelines for sustainable ecotourism in forest and wildlife areas. The guidelines provide for preparation of ecotourism plan which includes the capacity analysis-based description of the eco- tourism site. The guidelines also provide for regular monitoring of the ecotourism sites by the respective states/union territories.

# PROGRAMME ON SHADOW BUDGET 2022-23

The Economic Affairs Committee of PHD Chamber organized a Virtual Programme on "Shadow Budget 2022-23" in collaboration with EGROW (Foundation of Economic Growth and Welfare) on January 11, 2022.

Dr Arvind Virmani, Renowned Economist, and Chairman, EGROW, stated that the MSME sector is critical for job creation and income distribution, so to make them more competitive, the Government needs to reduce the regulatory burden on them. He stated that the last two years have seen most reforms, which were not seen since 1990 as the Government has changed its policy approach towards being a facilitator. Dr Virmani explained that systematic efforts have been taken to reform and liberalise production and service sectors like agriculture, space, geomapping, and infrastructure by the Government. He added that the Government has now focussed its attention on institutional reforms to provide access to better quality of public services. Dr Virmani suggested that the Government needs to focus on reducing the logistics costs in the country as these are significantly high as compared with many economies. He stated that though the investment inflows and the export markets have recovered, private consumption is yet to recover fully. He further informed that consumption recovery can be accelerated through tax reforms, which will in turn will accelerate job creation. He stated that the GST council needs to focus its attention on long-term income maximization rather than short-term which it is doing so now.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber, stated that the Union Budget 2022-23 is being presented at a crucial juncture, with the economy facing the third wave of the

pandemic. He stated that the industry expects easing of compliance and a level playing field to become more competitive. He said that the focus of the Union Budget needs to be on measures to refuel the consumption demand, creation of employment avenues and hassle-free credit to the MSME sector. He stated that there needs to be greater momentum on the exports sector through tax free export income for MSMEs for 3 years, which will compensate for the higher logistics cost. He explained that they expect an increase in the health care expenditure with the rising number of COVID cases in the country. To increase tax compliance in the country and to increase the tax base, Mr. Multani suggested that the Government needs to introduce lucrative tax paying benefits such as providing a threshold of pension (after retirement age of 60 years) to incentivise regular taxpayers. He informed that a reduction in the Basic Custom Duty for the manufacturing inputs will make it more competitive and help business sentiments. He added that through these measures, India would be able to achieve a 7 percent growth rate in the next



financial year FY2023, which will help it achieve the US\$ 5 trillion economy target in the future.

Mr. Alok B. Shriram, Former President, PHD Chamber, stated that the Indian Government has taken several bold steps since April 2020 to revive the economy, which has benefitted the marginalized sections of the society. Some measures like direct bank transfer of the benefits economically have helped the challenged sections of the society. He explained that sectors like construction and tourism still need help as they have not yet recovered completely. He added that along with providing support to the start-ups, there is also a need to support the existing industries as they are the job and wealth creators of the economy.

Dr Ashok Vishandass, Director, EGROW, revealed that sustainable annual growth to the tune of 6% in the agriculture sector for around ten years can turbo charge the economy. He stated that the Government needs to focus its attention on agri-exports and private investments in the agriculture sector. He added that global trade in organic products has touched US\$ 90 billion. India in the year 2019-20 exported US\$ 689 million worth of organic products, so a large potential is yet to be tapped. He added that States like Goa, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Sikkim, Rajasthan and Uttarakhand, which are the major producers of organic products can be the focus areas for the Central Government. There is a need to create Zones with common infrastructure for processing, with connectivity to ports and airports, he explained. Dr

Vishandass also stated that the entire production of all commodities from all the corners of the country can be monetized. He suggested that for achieving this, the Government needs to construct fast track rail cargo centers for perishables in the mission mode where farmers can store their produce and new technology can be incorporated into Indian agriculture.

Col M P Singh, Director, EGROW, stated that India spends 2.5% of its GDP on defence which is not much as compared to other countries. However, the country can save a lot of costs, if it focuses its attention on localising the manufacturing of defence equipment. He stated that the Hon'ble Prime Minister, Mr. Narendra Modi, in his address at the COP<sub>26</sub> summit spoke about the reduction of greenhouse gases and we need to have a similar target for the reduction of the imports of the defence equipment in the country. So, for the year 2030, we need to keep a target of reducing the defence equipment imports by at least 50% and by the year 2050, a 100% reduction in the imports is needed. He suggested this would reduce the expenditure on the modernization of the defence forces and also give a boost to the Aatmanirbhar Bharat initiative.

Former Presidents of PHD Chamber, Mr. Ashok Khanna and Mr. Sanjay Bhatia, interacted with Dr Arvind Virmani in the Q & A Session and stated that filing of income tax return should be simplified and that the Direct Tax Code needs further simplification. There is a need to focus on ease of filing returns. They further suggested that a Dedicated fund is needed for MSMEs across all industries to help them achieve size, scale and indigenization. At this juncture, the funds created for MSMEs need implementation. As the compliances for listed MSMEs is same as for large companies, the compliances need to be simplified for MSMEs. Amid COVID-19, MSMEs have been passing through difficult times and have been affected by the rising prices of raw materials. Therefore, the MSMEs should get additional working capital to keep their businesses going.

Mr. Vikram Singh Mehta, Co-chair, Economic Affairs Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that there is a lot of scope for additional spending as the budget allocated for CAPEX last year is not yet fully utilised. He explained that additional spending on CAPEX will give a boost to a lot of sectors which have been negatively impacted during the pandemic.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHD Chamber, in his welcome remarks said that the Union Budget for 2022-23 will be pivotal in defining the way forward for the Indian economy and fulfilling the aspirations of more than 138 crore people of India. While proposing the vote-of-thanks, he appreciated the valuable viewpoints of the esteemed speakers, thanked all the members of PHD Chamber and industry stakeholders for participating in the programme and thanked the sponsors.

Dr S P Sharma, Chief Economist | DSG, PHD Chamber, welcomed all the dignitaries and moderated the programme.



#### **WORLD PULSES DAY**

# DIGITAL HEALTHCARE ACCESS EQUALITY FOR ALL AGES

onsidering the importance of digital healthcare access to elderly people and under the aegis of Healthy Ageing webinar series, Hospital & Diagnostics Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on "Digital Healthcare Access Equality for All Ages" on January 12, 2022.



While welcoming the guests, Dr Sameer Gupta, Co-chair of the Hospital & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI, said that COVID-19 is changing older people's daily routines, the care and support they receive, their ability to stay socially connected and how they are perceived. He further added that older people are being challenged by requirement to spend more time at home, lack of physical contact with other family members, friends and colleagues, temporary cessation of employment and other activities as well as anxiety and fear of illness and death - their own and others. It is therefore important that we create opportunities to foster healthy ageing during the pandemic. Dr Sameer also said that Digital Equity is a condition in which all individuals and communities have the information technology capacity needed for full participation in our society, democracy and economy - including older persons - to ensure new opportunities and benefits are available to everyone.

Dr K Madan Gopal, Sr. Consultant-Geriatric Care, Niti Aayog apprised that currently 8.6% of our population is of old age which will be 12% in 2030 and 20% by 2050. He also said that life after 50 comes with a lot of social, economic and mental health difficulties. He also highlighted about elderly people living in rural areas who do not have the Digital Healthcare access. Dr Gopal also mentioned that during the second wave of COVID-19, the demand for Telemedicine & Tele health has increased drastically which has also made life easier for the patients specially living in the rural areas. He underlined an utmost need for creating awareness about the availability of digital Healthcare facilities available for the elderly in the rural areas.

Dr Gopal also talked about various initiatives taken by Niti Aayog for the elderly people in India and about the National Health Mission which provides opportunity for telemedicine consultation and has a wide network of diagnostic labs and provides primary care to all the people. Dr Gopal also urged everyone to come forward and work together to make a better digital care for the elderly people in India. He further added the need to look for the opportunity to utilize the potential of elders which they have gathered during their productive life span.

While mentioning about the work done by HelpAge India for elderly, Mr. Rohit Prasad, Chief Executive Officer, HelpAge India, mentioned about multiple determinants of ageing and health. Mr. Rohit said that COVID has disproportionately affected the elders,' livelihoods, income, loneliness and digital divide that has led to elders struggling with tech. While mentioning the way forward, Mr. Prasad said that there is an urgent need to enhance the digital literacy / skills of elderly to have transformational impact on their lives. He further suggested a need to develop elder specific and elder sensitive solutions which can be called as age friendly digital solutions and the focus should be on research and data for elderly with age disaggregated data and analysis for better insights & evidence into problems to solve.

Talking about the senior care, Dr Ipsito Chakravarty, Director of Gerontechnology Research Wing, Calcutta Metropolitan Institute of Gerontology said that it is not the "lifespan" but the "healthspan" that matters; it is not the Quality of Life (QoL) but the Quality of Experience (QoE) that matters; it is not the "object" but the "subject" that matters. Dr Ipsito further mentioned about Elderly-friendly interfaces which are very much important for Digital Literacy classes meant for the elderly. He further emphasized that User-centred Participatory Research, which involves the target population (Elderly) is the need of the day for developing digital accessibility for elders. He concluded with the sayings that help elderly in finding a purpose, assist them to live out that purpose to find a meaning and promote more & more participation (User-centred Participatory Research).

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHD Chamber delivered the vote- of- thanks to all the dignitaries and highlighted that digital technology has taken a place in everyone else's life; however, senior citizens are unable to access healthcare lacking the digital accessibility.

## BURNING ISSUES IN SUMMON, SEARCH, SEIZURE AND ARREST UNDER GST (UTTARAKHAND EDITION)

The Indirect Taxes Committee and Uttarakhand Chapter of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on 'Burning Issues in Summon, Search, Seizure and Arrest under GST (Uttarakhand Edition)' on January 6, 2022.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chairman, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that the GST Authorities are issuing summons in a casual manner and directly at the level of CEO and CFO of the companies. In this regard, he opined that the summons must be issued as a last resort and GST authorities should refrain from calling for information and documentation already provided or uploaded by companies online. He further highlighted that arrest provisions to be used as an exception and custodial interrogation should not be violative of Article 21 of Right to Life and Personal Liberty. Even recovery and provisional attachment provisions are to be used only when there is genuine reason to protect Government revenues and should not be used in regular and a mechanical manner. Also, to prevent custodial torture and to ensure that there is fairness and no abuse of power during the investigation, the

Hon'ble SC in the case of Paramvir Singh Saini v. Baljit Singh & Others [Special Leave Petition (Criminal) No. 3543 of 2020 dated December 2, 2020] directed installation of CCTV- Camera at investigation agencies, offices and police stations. Mr. Jain underlined that it has to be kept in mind that the search, seizure, arrest does not only affect the business of the taxpayer but is also a stigma on one's reputation. It ruins the person mentally and physically. Lots of litigation in GST is on account of interpretation of GST Laws and should not be termed as suppression in casual mode by the GST authorities, he added further.

Mr. Hemant Kochar, Chairman, Uttarakhand Chapter, PHD Chamber, stated that the provisions for Search, Seizure and Arrest are burning provisions and basically provided to protect the interest of genuine taxpayers and as a deterrent for tax evasion. He opined that the focus is required on enhancing ease of doing business, reducing cost of doing business, creating a level playing field and ensuring timely justice.

Mr. Pawan Arora, Co-chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber & Partner at Athena Law Associates, stated that the administration structure post GST was suppose to be based on the principle of pooled sovereignty, mutual co-operation, cross reporting and meaningful control.

Mr. Dharnendra K. Rana, Partner, Nitya Tax Associates explained the Legal Jurisprudence on Search and Seizure & the Constitutional validity of Search, Seizure and Arrest provisions under GST. He further mentioned that the taxpayer must ensure to identify officer before entering the premises; officer carrying the search warrant; two independent witnesses accompanying the officer; taxpayer can take photocopy of seized documents; if anything seized, officer must issue seizure order and prepares panchnama. He explained procedural aspects of Inspection, Search and Seizure. He further mentioned the provisions, consequences of nonappearance and guidelines for issue of summons under the power of summon (section 70). He also explained the section 69(1) and 132 (1) of CGST act of Power to arrest under GST.

Ms. Geetika Shrivastava, Executive Partner, TATTVAM Advisor in her presentation discussed the provisional attachment of property or bank account; rights & responsibilities during search proceedings and payment during investigations. She further explained legal provisions under GST Law and pendency of proceedings under specified sections. Dr S P Sharma, Chief Economist DSG, PHD Chamber gave the concluding remarks and vote-of-thanks to all the eminent speakers and participants.







# AGRICULTURE ECOSYSTEM: EXPECTATIONS FROM BUDGET 2022

he Capital Market & Commodity Market Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on 'Agriculture Ecosystem: Expectations from Budget 2022' on January 25, 2022.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCCI said in his address that agriculture continues to be a dominating employment generating sector and contributes a significant proportion to the country's GDP. He highlighted on identifying areas and crops to integrate the benefit of microirrigation with structured governance and execution strategy which will help the country climb to a newer height of growth.

Mr. B K Sabharwal, Chair, Capital Market & Commodity Market Committee, PHDCCI highlighted that in the Union Budget 2021, the government had a farm credit target of Rs16.5 trillion, which is likely to be revised in Budget 2022 to Rs 18.5 trillion.

Chief Guest, Mr. Rajesh Kumar Dangeti, Regional Director (Northern Regional Office), SEBI said that India is one of the highest producers of many agricultural products in the world. He also highlighted some of the problems which the farmers face in relation to inflation in agricultural products, over dependence on climate changes, storage facilities, depletion in ground water, air pollution and environmental sustainability and many others.

Mr. R N Bhaskar, Veteran Journalist moderated the session and laid emphasis on vibrant future markets for agriculture and subsidies in the agriculture sector.

Mr. Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda stated that agriculture is the backbone of the economy. He talked about the NREGA project, capital expenditure on agriculture including warehousing, transportation and irrigation facilities.

Mr. Sandeep Jain, Director, Tradeswift Broking Pvt. Ltd. focused on improving agriculture GDP so that the country can witness consumption revolution.

Mr. Kapil Dev, Chief Business Officer, NCDEX talked about the MSP, measures to bring down cost of production and the government's long-term approach on improving infrastructure in the agriculture sector.

Mr. Rachit Gupta, Co-chair, Capital Market and Commodity Market Committee delivered the vote- ofthanks to the speakers, sponsors and delegates.

Mr. Vivek Seigell, Assistant Secretary General, PHDCCI moderated the event.







## **OMICRON & BOOSTER DOSE**

he Hospital & Diagnostics Committee of PHDCCI organized a Webinar - "OMICRON & BOOSTER DOSE" on January 14, 2022.

The eminent guests were Dr Anant Mohan, Professor & Head, Pulmonary Medicine and Sleep Disorders, AIIMS, New Delhi; Dr Chandrakant Lahariya, Physician, Epidemiologist and Public Policy & Health Specialist and Dr Anusha Rohit, Head, Department of Microbiology, The Madras Medical Mission.

While welcoming the delegates on this important topic, Dr Harsh Mahajan, Chair, Hospital & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI, mentioned that the Omicron variant of the virus, even though clinically ascertained to be not as lethal, has the potential to cause another wave of the pandemic. He further said that anyone with Omicron infection can spread the virus to others, even if they are vaccinated or don't have symptoms.

Dr Anant Mohan, Professor & Head, Pulmonary Medicine and Sleep Disorders, AIIMS, New Delhi, shared the clinical and diagnostic perspective of the COVID infection with different variants. Talking about the positive side of the Omicron pandemic, he mentioned that 90-95% of people recover with home isolation and do not require hospitalization while the high transmissibility of Omicron is a negative side.

Dr Chandrakant Lahariya, Physician, Epidemiologist and Public Policy & Health Specialist, briefed about the global perspective of the SARS-CoV-2 Virus. Mentioning about the Omicron variant, Dr Lahariya also briefed about Decoupling of disease which means the cases are increasing because of high transmissibility of the variant but the hospitalization cases are very less and also decreasing. Talking about the vaccines, he said that because 90% population of India has received one or two shots of the vaccine, we are at a good state and vaccines are really working to provide us a protection from getting a severe disease. He further said that people with prior infection, recovery and vaccination have 14 folds higher immunity for various COVID variants even for Delta. Mentioning about the choice of booster dose. Dr Lahariya said that mRNA based booster dose will be the first choice, Protein based booster dose will be second and same vaccine taken earlier will be the third choice and urged the Government to allow people for choice of booster dose vaccination.

Dr Anusha Rohit, Head, Department of Microbiology, The Madras Medical Mission spoke in details about the Coronavirus timeto-time mutations and its different variants of concern. She mentioned Alpha, Beta, Gamma and Delta as the variants of concern and Eta, Lota,

Kappa, Lambda and Mu as variants of interest which are named after the letters of Greek alphabet. Mentioning about the Omicron, Dr Anusha explained that it has 32 mutations on spike protein while Delta variant has 9. She further said that if the virus only causes mild infection then natural vaccination of the population might occur and will result in end of the pandemic. She mentioned the need to get vaccinated, wear a mask, maintain physical distancing, ventilate indoor spaces, keep a good hygiene and self-isolate if you develop symptoms which is the key to survive.

Dr G.N. Qazi, CEO, Hamdard Institute of Medical Science and Research (HIMSR) and HAHC Hospital mentioned about various clinical trials for COVID-19, which are being conducted at the Hamdard Institute. Dr Qazi also thanked ICMR and NABL for their immense contribution for setting up various COVID-19 testing laboratories during the pandemic. He also mentioned that after taking the booster dose, every individual should take all necessary measures, so that there are no chances and probability of virus been getting mutated to others.

Dr Sameer Gupta, Co-chair of the Hospital & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI said that though there are almost 30,000 cases per day in Delhi, they are likely a gross underestimation as many patients are currently testing with the home based kits and not being counted. The good news is most patients are recovering at home and most patients in ICUs are



unvaccinated and patients with comorbidities. However we should not drop our guards - Vaccinations, COVID appropriate behaviour are of paramount importance.

Mentioning about the SARS-CoV-2

variants, Dr Deep Goel, Co-chair of the Hospital & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI said that not all the mutations are bad but this variant (Omicron) will get us immunityt against other variants. The paranoia of COVID is still there and people are not able to cope up with that yet. Dr Goel finally said that this virus will be there for long and we need to learn to live and coexist with this.



#### VIRTUAL MEETING WITH UNION MINISTER FOR COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY, CONSUMER AFFAIRS, FOOD & PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION AND TEXTILES



The Meeting was chaired by Dr J P Gupta, Chair, Environment Committee, PHDCCI and was graced by Mr. John Dulac, Clean Energy Finance Analyst, Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD); Ms. Poonam Sandhu, Clean Energy Finance Lead (India), Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC); Mr. Sturle Harald Pedersen, Chairman, Geenstat Hydrogen, India, Norway, Dr Karen Landmark, Chair of the Board, Greenstat Asia, Norway; Mr. Mahendra Rustagi, Co-chair, Environment Committee, PHDCCI; Mr. Umesh Sahdev, Executive Chairman, Hydrogenium Resources Pvt Ltd.; Mr. Naveen Seth, Assistant Secretary General, PHDCCI and Ms. Kanchan Zutshi, Senior Secretary, PHDCCI.

The meeting saw deliberations on green hydrogen development,

notably for fertilizer and refinery industries and on PHD Chamber's activities (under the Green H<sub>2</sub> Portal).

Dr J. P. Gupta, Chair, Environment Committee in his welcome address apprised the OECD Officials about the various activities organized by PHD Chamber on Green Hydrogen and the recent International Climate Summit which was organized by PHD Chamber with the support of several Ministries of GOI. Further, he invited the OECD and NRDC officials to work together on areas of common interest for Green Hydrogen Development in India.



#### THE GROWTH ENGINE OF PRESENT DAY AGRICULTURE HIGH VALUE AGRICULTURE: THE KEY TO THE INCOME REVOLUTION OF FARMERS

The Agribusiness Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on "The Growth Engine of Present Day Agriculture" on January 18, 2022, under the Webinar Series "Strategies for Doubling Farmers' Income - Marching towards an Income Revolution of Farmers".

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCCI in his presidential address said that the target of Doubling Farmers' Income by 2022 has brought a major change in the focus of the agricultural sector from the traditional productionorientation to income-orientation and created a renewed interest among the agricultural research community, policy makers, state authorities, extension agencies, private players, industry professionals, the farming community, youth, students, and all major stakeholders in the country.

Delivering his theme address, Mr. N K Aggarwal, Chair – Agribusiness

Committee, PHDCCI mentioned that our country needs to raise its growth trajectory while, transitioning to a more inclusive, stable, and resilient growth of agriculture and agri-food system. Only then the agriculture sector would be able to ensure household nutritional security and improve the livelihood of millions of smallholder farmers in the country.

Chief Guest, Dr Ashok Dalwai, IAS, CEO, National Rainfed Area Authority & Chairman, Empowered Body, Doubling Farmers Income, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare mentioned that in the 21st century, a new technological revolution is empowering the agricultural sector like never before. He emphasised the importance of promoting High Value Agriculture (HVA), which includes Horticulture, Dairy & Livestock, Fisheries & Aquaculture, and is critical for income revolution of farmers. HVA needs a robust Agriculture Value Chain, hence building of strong agrilogistics including cold chain and processing, is critical.

Dr H P Singh Chairman, Confederation of Horticulture Associations of India (CHAI) Former DDG (Hort.) ICAR; Vice Chancellor -RAU, Bihar; Horticulture Commissioner highlighted that horticulture today is at the stage of 'modern horticulture', which has been immensely powered by technology. He discussed various technologies being adopted in Horticulture Value Chain and opined that it is high time for the inclusion of the Horticulture Sector in the priority sector, because it comprises a wide array of verticals that have a huge potential for doubling farmers' income and providing nutritional security.

Dr R K Singh, Former Directorcum-Vice Chancellor ICAR-Indian Veterinary Research Institute (IVRI), Uttar Pradesh, Indian Council of Agricultural Research informed that the key factor driving the global animal health market is the growing number of R&D activities in the veterinary pharmaceutical sector to facilitate real-time disease analysis, as well as the emerging trend of pet humanizations. Based on the animal type, the global animal health market has been segmented into commercial animals and companion animals. Currently, commercial animals hold majority of the total market share. He also discussed the importance of





the livestock sector for increasing farmers' income.

Dr L. Narasimha Murthy, Senior Executive Director, National Fisheries Development Board, Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying informed about the challenges and opportunities in the fisheries sector and schemes of the government for promoting inland and marine fisheries.

Dr Ashok Dalwai, while talking on Secondary Agriculture informed that the key factor driving today's agriculture has new and emphatic demands. Therefore, instead of focusing on the old mandate of agriculture based on just providing food and fodder, a shift towards a new mandate that is focused on employment and better income is important. However, this must go hand in hand with the moral duty of providing food and nutrition security. Secondary Agriculture, which includes food and non-food processing, should be promoted to generate jobs and supplementary incomes.

Dr Sudhanshu, Secretary, Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (APEDA), Ministry of Commerce and Industry highlighted on the Agriculture Export Policy and discussed about the development in various clusters. Farmers can be educated about export-oriented quality production by working with Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), Farmer Producer Companies (FPCs), Cooperatives, etc. He stated that the farmers can be sensitized

for having export-oriented quality production. In collaboration with these organizations, APEDA is working with farmer groups to build a sufficient amount of capacity so that farmers know what kind of crops are to be grown based on demand, he further added.

Mr. Kunal Gupta, Co-chair – Agribusiness Committee, PHDCCI concluded all the views about the strategies and way forward for doubling farmers' income and gave a clear future perspective to all stakeholders.

## **GST ITC - LITIGATIONS, DIVERGENT RULINGS AND WAY FORWARD**



The Indirect Taxes Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on "GST ITC - Litigations, Divergent Rulings and Way Forward" on January 21, 2022, in the virtual mode.

Welcoming the delegates, Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber stated that the GST has been one of the landmark tax reforms in the country and it is taking time to get stabilized to a large extent, that's why, the business entities are still grappling with some issues and compliances required to be carried out. Further, he said that the Input Tax Credit (ITC) being the backbone of GST is imperative to streamline seamless flow of credit and any impending issues under ITC must be resolved at the earliest for making GST a Good and Simple Tax. He further added that though availing of ITC forms is one of the most critical activities for every business to settle its tax liability,

however, claiming ITC is a mammoth task.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that GST was introduced in the country to do away the multiplicity of taxes, remove cascading of taxes, double taxation and making GST law uniformly applicable from Kashmir to Kanyakumari. He further stated that the object clause with preamble of 101 constitution amendment Act, 2016 which had introduced GST in the country has envisaged that we are going to have seamless flow of credit. But, irony is that cascading of taxes continues in GST as five specified petroleum products remain outside of GST. GST credit is not available on specified goods or services as provided under section 17(5) of the CGST Act, even though used or intended to be used in the course or furtherance of business viz. construction of immovable properties, promotional items, CSR expenses, etc.

CA. Jatin Harjai, highlighted the points related to Transitional Credits – Dispute and Way Forward, GSTNrelated woes – Various Issues and Resolutions and Blocked ITC for construction of immovable properties.

CA. Tushar Aggarwal, Founder Partner, Tattvam Advisors in his presentation spoke on ITC blocked on telecommunication tower & immovable property construction, ITC on sales promotion vs. gifts and ITC on composite supply vs. mixed supply. He explained immovable property; pre-GST jurisprudence on Immovable property, pre-GST jurisprudence on tower and case study related to construction of factory.

Mr. Narendra Singhvi, Joint Partner, Lakshmikumaran & Sridharan made a comprehensive presentation on Legal Jurisprudence of latest Supreme Court and High Courts



Judgments, Various Issues under Refund - IGST vs. ITC Refund and GST on Ocean Freight on CIF value of Import of Goods. He further discussed the development in GST- Judgments; Refunds and Ocean Freight through some of the case studies.

Mr. Deepak Suneja, Partner, NITYA Tax Associates in his presentation discussed the Supply & GST ITC-Cross Charge vs. ISD and deposit of tax during investigation, search and seizure. He stated that the power of inspection, search and seizure should be exercised by GST and inspect place of businesses includes suppression of transaction or stock of goods; excess ITC/refund; ITC basis bogus invoices; maintained accounts in manner likely to cause evasion and escaped payment of tax and transaction not supported by e-way bill.

Mr. Pawan Arora, Co-chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber & Partner at Athena Law Associates gave the concluding remarks.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber while delivering his presidential address mentioned about the International Climate Summit held on September 3, 2021 organized jointly with Invest India in partnership with NITI Aayog, Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change and with the support of several Ministries of Government of India. The summit deliberations included setting up of an International Hydrogen Alliance similar to the International Solar Alliance and Centres of Excellence for Hydrogen across all the states.

He mentioned that Hydrogen clearly has the potential to transform our existing large reliance on fossilbased energy to low-carbon and green-energy to facilitate process of decarbonisation for our net zero transition. An increased relevance and advancement around the 'safety case' will play a vital part in the future deployment of hydrogen and will be vital to ensure that adequate processes are in place for things like the correct and safe maintenance and inspection of equipment that produces supplies or stores 'hydrogen' fuel, said Mr. Multani.

Dr J P Gupta, Chair, Environment Committee, PHD Chamber talked about the importance of looking into the safety aspect for the new molecule Hydrogen. He also talked about bilateral cooperation between India and Norway through Centres of Excellence for Hydrogen and capacity building for Hydrogen Safety.

Prof. Dr Jan Roar Bakke, Executive Vice President, Gexcon Norway gave an insightful presentation on Government Cooperation between Norway and India on Hydrogen Safety Regulations. In his presentation, he talked about high level observations based on European/ Norwegian experience which might benefit India. He mentioned that simplified legal processes for small-scale Green hydrogen production methods will greatly benefit. He said that inserting H2 storage-specific rules into the existing, relevant legislation will help in avoiding uncertainties.

Lastly, he mentioned that Bilateral cooperation between Norway and India with the purpose of establishing a regulatory framework that ensures safe use of hydrogen has been proposed on the background of significant Norwegian experience with developing hydrogen value chains relating to petroleum & renewable industry.

government The relevant authorities on the Norwegian side have established regulatory mandates and institutional capacities to engage actively with concerned authorities in India, informed Dr Bakke.



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Mr. Geirmund Vislie, Vice President – Hydrogen Safety, Gexcon AS, through his presentation talked about Gexcon's Expertise in Hydrogen Safety. He apprised the participants about the methods and softwares, like FLACS that accurately captures the effects of actual geometry and external parameters to give realistic simulations to ensure safe design.

He also highlighted the activities to be done to verify safety like Hazard Identification to ensure that all relevant risks are captured, Hazard and Operability Study to ensure that any deviation from normal process conditions are detected and actions are taken to prevent development into a hazardous situation, Ventilation and dispersion studies to assess the likely sizes and locations of flammable clouds in the event of leakages and ATEX zones and locations of detectors are suitable and Fire and explosion modelling to verify that events can be controlled so that risk to personnel and third parties is controlled.

Mr. Rajendra Narkhede, Senior Vice President, Gexcon India, in his presentation talked about the opportunities for development of Green Hydrogen Regulations/ Standards in India. The biggest challenge to the commercialization of the Hydrogen based technologies in India is the requirement of code and standards to get a sort of consistency and encourage deployment, said Mr. Narkhede.

He also talked about some of the good practices to be followed during design like Limiting Hydrogen inventories especially indoors, to what is strictly necessary by technology, Avoiding or limiting the formation of a flammable mixture, Carrying out ATEX zoning/ Electrical Area zoning analysis, Combining leak detection and counter-measures, Avoiding confinement; Promoting openings for natural or mechanical ventilation or explosion vents and Training staff in Hydrogen safety using Virtual Reality training.

Mr. Mahendra Rustagi, Cochair, Environment Committee, PHD Chamber in his concluding remarks talked about the importance of Hydrogen safety for accident minimization.

The session was moderated by Mr. Naveen Seth, Assistant Secretary General, PHDCCI and was attended by experts from India and globe like Mr Sturle Harald Pedersen, Chairman, Greenstat Hydrogen, Norway; Dr C Laxma Reddy, Additional Director General (Exploration), Directorate General of Hydrocarbons; Dr Chitra Rajagopal, Former DS and DG (R&M), DRDO; Mr. Umesh Sahdev, Executive Chairman, Hydrogenium Resources Pvt. Ltd.; Dr Mukul Das, Director, Shriram Institute for Industrial Research; Dr S K Tyagi, Former Additional Director, CPCB and many industry stalwarts pan-India.




#### NEW STUDY SUGGESTS INCREASE IN WARMING IN HIGH ALTITUDE HIMALAYAS DUE TO WATER VAPOR

A recent study has shown that water vapour exhibits a positive radiative effect at the top of the atmosphere (TOA), suggesting an increase in overall warming in the High Altitude Himalayas due to it. The precipitable water vapor (PWV) is one of the most rapidly varying components in the atmosphere and is mainly accumulated in the lower troposphere. Due to the large variability in space and time, mixing processes and contribution to a series of heterogeneous chemical reactions, as well as sparse measurement networks, especially in the Himalayan region, it is difficult to accurately quantify the climatic impact of PWV over space and time. Moreover, aerosol-cloud-precipitation interactions over this region, which are one of the most climatic-sensitive regions, are poorly understood, apparently due to a lack of proper observational data.

The recent research led by Aryabhatta Research Institute of Observational Sciences (ARIES), Nainital, an autonomous research institute of the Department of Science and Technology (DST) Govt. of India, showed that Precipitable Water Vapour (PWV) exhibits a positive radiative effect at the top of the atmosphere (TOA) in high altitude remote locations in the order of about 10 watts per square metre (W m-2) at Nainital (Altitude -2200m; Central Himalaya) and 7.4 W m-2 at Hanle (Altitude -4500m; western Trans Himalaya). Team members from the National Observatory of Athens (NOA), Greece; Tohoku University, Japan; Indian Institute of Astrophysics (IIA) and CSIR Fourth Paradigm Institute (CSIR-4PI), Bengaluru and Institute for Advanced Sustainability Studies, Germany also contributed in the study.

Tourism & Hospitality Committee of PHDCCI organized its 16th webinar under Border Tourism Webinar Series on 21 January 2022 focusing on Baksa District for the promotion of Border Tourism in Assam. The webinar was supported by the Ministry of Tourism, Government of India.

Ms. Rupinder Brar (IRS), Additional Director General, Ministry of Tourism, Government of India, highlighted that the last few years have been a period of discovery for the Indian tourists to look within and explore their own country. This also encourages us to bring the lesser known destinations of India under 'Dekho Apna Desh' campaign. She said that making the right itineraries is important connecting two or three different terrains that can provide huge value addition in terms of Cross-Border Tourism further enhancing the experience of a tourist.

Ms. Brar emphasized that there is a need for capacity building and skill development as it will help to scale up the quality of human resources while creating employment opportunities for the locals. Other areas where capacity building is required are for homestay owners, service providers which need both centre and state intervention.

While giving an overview on the Baksa District, Mr. Aayush Garg (IAS), Deputy Commissioner - Baksa District, Government of Assam, mentioned that the district has a lot of tourism potential and advantages as it has a long border line stretching approximately 45 kms with Bhutan. Crossing the border is also a smooth process as there are three entry gates to Bhutan which can be easily be accessed by showing a valid Indian passport. The district is completely safe for tourists and has well developed road infrastructure in place and accommodation facilities including 3 to 4 star properties.

Mr. Suresh Kumar, Commandant – Guwahati Frontier, Border Security Force (BSF), mentioned that for promotion of Border Tourism in the North East, we must give employment opportunities to locals and carefully select areas that are well connected. There are still many areas in the North East region that require significant focus on enhancing their connectivity and infrastructure. Despite being a border district, Baksa remains a very peaceful and stable destination and therefore is a favourable option for tourists.

Giving a detailed presentation on the tourism products of Assam, Ms. Moitreyee Das, Deputy Director – Tourism, Government of Assam, said that with the third wave of





the pandemic still looming at large, the state will have to strategize and start intra state as well as intra continental travel. She further said that development of Assam through the 'Look East' and 'Act East' policies of the Government of India is the need of the hour and the stakeholders of the tourism sector have to play a proactive role. It is imperative to establish a smooth tourist corridor to boost tourism and benefit trade linkages between Assam and the ASEAN countries, she added.

Mr. Saurabh Rishi, Joint Adviser - Aspirational Districts Programme, NITI Aayog, informed that Baksa district has done quite well in terms of improving various indicators relating to socio-economic development such as health and nutrition, education, financial agriculture, inclusion and basic infrastructure. Many of these indicators are directly linked to tourism development like road and digital connectivity, sanitation and drinking water facilities, skill among development others. Therefore, improvement of these indicators also improves the overall tourism potential of a district.

Mr. Debajit Kumar Borah, President, Tour Operators Association of Assam (TOAA), said that border districts must refrain from being only a transit point and further focus on becoming a tourist destination. Network is an area that requires urgent attention for promotion of stronger connectivity and integration.

Mr. Vishwanath Goenka, Advisor, Hotel & Restaurant Association of Assam (HRAA), informed that after the second wave of Covid, big flow of tourists started visiting the northeastern areas. With such influx of tourists, the prospect of development in the north-eastern regions has grown exponentially.

Mr. Pawan S. Jain, Chair – Tourism & Hospitality Committee, PHDCCI, said that Border Tourism allows us to explore the places where one can almost see the boundary disappear into another country. PHDCCI is committed to create such meaningful platforms to do its bit in enabling all the parameters of the tourism industry to grow and flourish further.

While welcoming the delegates, Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHDCCI, mentioned that tourism is considered to be the most prominent and convenient industry for the development of remote, peripheral and rather rural border landscapes. The border areas of all the States and Union Territories are rich in natural and fabricated tourism potentials. Now it is rope way ,cable car which are a great gift for the area particularly hilly area of the country. He said it benefits North East, Uttarakhand, Himachal and Kashmir. Shri Gadkari said It is very important for not only goods but tourism also as this can create more employment potential.

#### BUILDING HIGHER IMMUNITY THROUGH AYURVEDA FOR OMICRON VARIANT

he AYUSH Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on 'Building Higher Immunity through Ayurveda for Omicron Variant' on January 20, 2022.

Prof. Ramesh Kumar Goyal, Vice Chancellor, Delhi Pharmaceutical Sciences & Research University, (DPSRU) was the Chief Guest of the webinar while Dr Yogita Munjal, Deputy Director, Government of NCT of Delhi and Prof (Dr) Mahesh Vyas, Dean, All India Institute of Ayurveda, Ministry of AYUSH were the eminent speakers.

While welcoming the guests, Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCCI said that variants are the usual part of a virus evolution and till the time the virus has the ability to infect, mutate and transmit, they will persist in spreading. While mentioning the use of AYUSH system, he said that there are vaccines and booster shots that will help strengthen the immune system and keep you protected, but small things like having a nutritious diet, staying physically active, keeping stress at bay, drinking plenty of water, and including organic supplements to your daily routine will always help develop a stronger immune system and body. Regarding use of Ayurveda for COVID, he further informed that many medicinal plants like Ashwagandha, Guduchi and Rasayana drugs such as Amalaki, Brahmi and Yashtimadhu contribute for building good immunity and promote physical and mental strength.

While mentioning about the Omicron variant, Chief Guest, Prof. Ramesh Kumar Goyal, Vice Chancellor, Delhi Pharmaceutical Sciences Research University, (DPSRU) & briefed about the initiatives taken by the Ministry of AYUSH during the pandemic which helped boost the growth of the AYUSH industry at the global level. Prof. Goyal mentioned about the management of Containment zones and how the public perception for Ayurveda has increased during the pandemic globally. Prof. Goyal also mentioned that the drug named AYUSH 64 proved to be effective in the treatment of mild to moderate COVID- 19. In recent studies it has been proved that Ayurveda gave authenticated results for Antiviral activity. Prof. Goyal informed that the study on Ashwagandha and Giloy is going on at DPSRU.

Vaidya Devendra Triguna, Patron of AMAM and President of All India Ayurvedic Congress and Ayurveda Mahasammelan, asserted that Ayurveda has the potential in building immunity and fighting with other various diseases as well. He further mentioned about using of these Ayurvedic products like Chyawanprash, Tulsi, Giloy and Ashwagandha powder could be life savers bringing up overall immunity during these challenging times.

Dr Yogita Munjal, Deputy Director, Government of NCT of Delhi shared a brief presentation and statistics that Omicron variants spreads rapidly with an average doubling time of two days. She mentioned that Ayurveda is one of the richest traditional system of medicines that can help in building overall immunity. She also explained about various initiatives taken by the Delhi Government in fighting COVID-19.

Dr Munjal mentioned that with more than 180 AYUSH dispensaries in Delhi and four AYUSH hospitals, the Directorate of AYUSH has a robust infrastructure in tackling COVID-19 situation. She also explained about the advisory for AYUSH self-care and immunity boosting measures which have been released in various versions through social media for creating awareness. She also mentioned about dedicated COVID health care centres being established by the Delhi Government where more than 7000 patients have been treated in these centers during the pandemic.

Prof. (Dr) Mahesh Vyas, Dean, All India Institute of Ayurveda, Ministry of AYUSH mentioned about the main stay of Corona infection and recommended prevention, which are use of masks, disinfection, washing hands, physical distancing and isolation. Prof. Vyas briefed about the concept of immunity in Ayurveda and general measures to boost the immunity through Viharaa, yoga and physical exercise. Prof. Vyas further



mentioned about various AYUSH medicines and AYUSH herbs which work in immunomodulation of an individual. He also stated that taking a proper diet and proper sleep will help in boosting the overall immunity.

Dr Rajiv Rai, Chair, AYUSH Committee, PHDCCI & Head Research, Dabur India Limited mentioned that immunity can be built through Ayurveda and suggested that a holistic approach is needed as it focuses on the health of the entire body and mind.

Mr. Jitender Sodhi, Co-chair, AYUSH Committee, PHDCCI & Managing Director, AYUSH Herbs Pvt. Ltd. pointed out that Ayurveda has been a trusted measure in the fight against coronavirus. He stated that clinical trials for the usage of ashwagandha, along with other fortified medicinal herbs such as Guduchi, Yastamidhu are being studied as a prophylactic medicine. He said that Omicron variant has proved to be mild so far with little to no requirement for hospitalization and intensive care and experts believe that it could provide widespread immunity. He said that Chyawanprash and other rasayanas as per Ayurveda, prevent us from infections and inflammation of body cells.

Dr Santosh Joshi, Co-chair, AYUSH Committee, PHDCCI & Sr. General Manager, Hamdard Laboratories said that experts recommend that Ayurveda could really be helpful in boosting immunity. Along with taking Ayurveda drugs, one should also take a healthy diet and adopt regular physical activity in his lifestyle for developing a better immune system.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHDCCI delivered the voteof-thanks to the dignitaries and also the sponsors and other associated partners for their continuous support in organizing these interactive webinars.

#### UNPRECEDENTED PROVISIONS IN THE BUDGET FOR THE HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT OF THE AGRICULTURE SECTOR

Union Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Minister, Mr. Narendra Singh Tomar said that 2022-23 budget is for the villages, poor people, farmers, women and youth. He further said that unprecedented provisions have been made in the budget for the overall development of the agriculture sector. Expressing happiness, he said that the budget of the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare has been increased continuously in both the tenures of the government, this time also it has been increased to Rs.1.32 lakh crore from Rs.1.23 lakh crore last year. He said that the Ken-Betwa link project is also being given shape by the government, which was envisioned during the tenure of Mr. Atal Bihari Vajpayee. This will not only irrigate an area of about one million hectares but will also provide drinking water and electricity and create new jobs. Similarly, many important budget provisions like HarGhar Jal, PM Awas etc. will be very helpful for different sections of society.









#### INDIA-NEPAL STARTUP SUMMIT 2022

It is time for the government and industry to reckon the urgency of figuring out their immediate priorities, including supporting the Startups, Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) and Exports, the backbone of the economy.

As the economic rebounding is the need of the hour to brave a new world in post-pandemic times, PHD Chamber under the aegis of its India-Nepal Centre (INC) and in association with the Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI) and Nepal SBI Bank Ltd. (NSBL), hosted the 'India-Nepal Startup Summit 2022' on January 28, 2022 (in virtual mode) to bring the important stakeholders of bilateral economic cooperation on a common platform from both India and Nepal to discuss some of the most crucial aspects concerning investment and partnership to support the thriving Startup ecosystem in both India and Nepal. The session was attended by the key policymakers from both the government and industry to ideate the way forward for an ever closer cooperation between India and Nepal with focus on fostering the startup ecosystem in both countries.

Amb Mr. K V Rajan, Chair, India-Nepal Centre, PHDCCI & India's Former Ambassador to Nepal, mentioned that we must constantly revisit the critically important aspects like simplification, handholding and funding aspects of startups. He highlighted that regional and sub-regional boost of an integrated supply chain is equally important in the quest for becoming Global.

Chief Guest, H.E. Mr. Ram Prasad Subedi, Chargé D'Affaires, Embassy of Nepal in India reflected on the broad trends concerning the bilateral economic cooperation between India and Nepal and identified startup cooperation as a very important factor of economic development.

Mr. Dipak Kumar De, MD & CEO, Nepal SBI Bank Ltd. (NSBL) said that India continues to be the most formidable economic partner due to deep bilateral ties. He opined that foreign investments and approval are the real issues. However, Indian investment in Nepal has been significantly impressive. NSBL is the partner in Nepal's progress and it looks forward to supporting the startups, he added.

While counting India and Nepal as very important partners in economic progress, Mr. Pradeep Multani, PHDCCI President, assured India-Nepal Centre's unwavering support for the thriving Startup ecosystem in both India and Nepal.

Mr. Anil Khaitan, Former President, PHDCCI highlighted that the start-up boost over the past decade in India has been exponential. The economic reforms have also put India in a position where people have become job creators rather than job seekers, he added.

Mr. Anukool Bhatnagar, CGM & Head-Nepal Desk, State Bank of India (SBI) mentioned that as a health emergency, COVID-19 has given us all a fresh perspective to look at innovation aspects especially in the start-up sector. India and Nepal have interlinked businesses, peopleto-people ties, two-way logistics, shared market fundamentals and also have a similar vision to become self-reliant. He mentioned that the key focus of SBI right now is on sectors of green energy, agriculture, tourism, healthcare, IT electronics and logistics—and it is very much willing to further deepen its banking footprints in Nepal.

Mr. Biswas Dhakal, President, F1 Soft International Pvt. Ltd. and Founder of eSewa said that Nepal's SME sector is the main source of employment generation in Nepal. The SME sector in Nepal still remains in the informal sector and access to the formal working capital remains elusive for Nepal's start-ups, he added.

#### NEW ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE-BASED TOOLS CAN HELP FINDING HABITABLE PLANETS

Utilising an Artificial Intelligence-based algorithm, Indian Astronomers have devised a new approach for identifying potentially habitable planets with a high probability. Current estimates are that the number of planets in our Galaxy alone run into billions, possibly a number greater than the number of stars itself. The question that naturally arises is whether there are other life-harboring planets and if there is a way to predict which exoplanet can potentially harbour life?

In the present work, astronomers from the Indian Institute of Astrophysics, an autonomous institute of the Department of Science & Technology, Govt. Of India, along with astronomers from BITS Pilani, Goa campus have devised a new approach -- an anomaly detection method -- by which they can identify potentially habitable ones with a high probability. The method is based on the postulate that Earth is an anomaly, with the possibility of existence of few other anomalies among thousands of data points. According to the study, there are 60 potentially habitable planets out of about 5000 confirmed, and nearly 8000 candidate planets proposed. The assessment is based on their close similarity to Earth. These planets can be viewed as candidates for anomalous instances in a huge pool of `non-habitable' exoplanets.

### **INDUSTRY EXPECTATIONS FROM NEW FOREIGN TRADE POLICY 2021-26**

he Foreign Trade and Investment Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on "Industry Expectations from New Foreign Trade Policy 2021-26" on January 25, 2022.

Mr. Deepak Pahwa, Chair, FTIC Committee, PHD Chamber, delivered the welcome remarks wherein he mentioned that the global supply chains are undergoing a major transformation due to disruptions caused by COVID-19. He suggested that the focus of the Government should be on attaining a strong position in the global supply chains by increasing as well as optimizing production capacity and expanding trade through an export-driven model. Further, to harness the export potential of the country, deeper facilitation measures are required including improved ease of doing business at ground level, exploring domestic production possibilities with a level playing field; ensuring easier access to raw materials; increasing availability to credit for long term loans; among others.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, Former President, PHDCCI, said that USD 400 billion merchandise exports target for FY2022 is achievable as we have already achieved USD 300 billion exports in the last nine months. He opined that exports being strong are very encouraging but imports are also increasing equally. Increase in the commodity prices at international level is making our imports more expensive and fuelling the trade deficit. He further stated that India should expedite the signing of free trade agreements with the US, UAE, Australia, Japan and other countries. The government should also take up the issue of restoring GSP status with the USA as it is the major market for India. He suggested that zero duty under GSP status will make Indian exporters more competitive at the global level.

Dr Badri Narayanan Gopalakrishnan, Lead Advisor (Trade and Commerce), NITI Aayog, Government of India said that there is scope for India to increase its presence globally by offering a number of export incentive schemes, quality and standards, ease of doing business measures and various sector focused initiatives among others for the manufacturing and export community. He stated that promotion of high-tech exports, access to raw materials and intermediates, promotion of domestic production, integration in Global Value Chains, etc. would be the focus of the new Foreign Trade Policy so that the industry can explore new markets and have a level playing field.

Prof. Niti Bhasin, Delhi School of Economics, University of Delhi said that India is doing fairly well as compared to other emerging economies and growth projection of 8.5% in FY 22 is highest among other countries including China. International trade dynamics have substantially changed as a consequence of the pandemic. The supply chains have redefined and companies are looking for the alternative locations from China and this is the opportune time for India to capitalize the opportunity. She opined that the New Foreign Trade Policy should focus on



incentivizing the export products which are contributing significantly to the exports and has a comparative advantage for India. The FTA leverage of India is not very encouraging and trade balance is not favourable for India in most of the FTA agreements. Thus, she urged the Government to re-negotiate the FTAs, particularly in those products where India can capitalize.

Mr. Mohammad Saim, IRS, Deputy Commissioner, Department of Revenue, Ministry of Finance, highlighted that custom clearances are becoming more technology-driven and government is taking proactive measures to reduce compliance burden. He highlighted that Faceless assessment and reduction in dwell time at the ports are the cornerstone initiatives of the government including e-sanchit portal. He further mentioned that the Government has also started the new feature in the ICEGATE portal for automated complaint resolution in the stipulated time period.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chair, Indirect Tax Committee, PHD Chamber said that government should support local manufacturing for making India Aatamnirbhar by reducing or removing custom duties on raw material imports for domestic manufacturing. He further stated that the synchronization among foreign trade policy, GST laws and Customs is needed to make India more self-reliant. Exporter community is suffering due to delay in payments of refunds, so the industry urges the government to have more clear, simple, and smooth rules for availing export returns under IGST so that exporters can get their refunds without delay.

Mr. Sanjay Beswal, Co-Chair, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber urged the government to correct anomalies in RoDTEP and allow companies to present their own/specific data for rates specific to a product of a particular company. He opined that Export Promotion Capital Goods Scheme is one of the best schemes for export-led manufacturing, which will help in expanding markets and take care of the tax factor of Capital Goods in export costing.

Mr. Nirmal Khandelwal, Cochair, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber suggested the need to establish a body to support MSMEs, so that it can be a part of GVC and exports. Loans for the exporters are available at a very high rate in comparison to other emerging economies, so there is a need to rationalize the rate of the loan for exporters.

Dr S P Sharma, Chief Economist DSG, PHD Chamber, moderated the session and said that Foreign Trade Policy provides the set of guidelines that helps to achieve domestic production and exports targets. He further mentioned that FTA must be signed based on trade and industry benefits.



#### **DRAFT NATIONAL AIR SPORTS POLICY**

In order to promote air sports in the country, the government has prepared a draft National Air Sports Policy (NASP 2022). The draft policy was released on 01 January 2022 for public comments and last date for submitting the feedback was 31 January 2022.

As per the draft NASP 2022, some of the measures envisaged to make India a global hub for air sports are as follows:

- The policy will cover most of the air sports like aerobatics, aero modelling, amateur-built and experimental aircraft, ballooning, drones gliding, hang gliding and paragliding micro-lighting and Para-motoring skydiving and vintage aircraft.
- The Government may develop a simple, stakeholder-friendly and effective governance structure with significant involvement of air sports experts.
- In line with the Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan, domestic design, development and manufacturing of air sports equipment will be promoted.
- Government will endeavour to enhance the participation of Indians in global air sports events.
- Schools, colleges and universities will be encouraged to have air sports included in their curriculum.
- For the year 2021-22, a sum of Rs. one crore has been allocated to promote air sports in the country. Once NASP 2022 is finalised and the proposed Air Sports Federation of India (ASFI) is constituted, the government may release the funds based on need and justification.



#### **CREATING CLEANER FACTORIES: RE & NATURAL GAS IN MANUFACTURING SECTOR**

The Power, Renewable & Alternate Energy Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on 'Creating Cleaner Factories: RE & Natural Gas in Manufacturing Sector' on January 31, 2022.

Ms. Surbhi Goyal, Senior Energy Specialist, World Bank Group, spoke about the significance of adopting RE in the manufacturing sector, considering India's international commitments, and gave a brief overview about the international scenario in decarbonizing the manufacturing sector. She spoke about carbon taxation and growth of Green financing in Europe. She informed that credit enhancement and green financing options for MSMEs were essential for sustainable Green energy adoption by them. She also spoke about two new emerging technologies, viz Floating Solar and Green Hydrogen.

Mr. Ravi Kuchi, Vice-President, Business Development, Indian Energy Exchange and Mr. Sushil Mishra, AVP, Indian Gas Exchange, gave presentations on how their exchanges were helping Indian manufacturing in adopting RE & Natural Gas. The benefits of these Exchanges for the industry included: Transparency in pricing and Competitive pricing, flexibility of contracts and equal opportunity to buyers.

Mr. DV Shastry, Executive Director, Natural Gas Society – a veteran of the Natural Gas industry- gave a detailed presentation on benefits of using Natural Gas in Manufacturing sector and Government of India's plans for a Gas based economy.

Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission (ABDM)has been launched to create an enabling environment for implementation of digital health technologies in health domain. Under the ABDM, the three key registries namely Health ID, Health Professional Registry (HPR), Health Facility Registry (HFR) and digital infrastructure for data exchange have been developed. The digital health ecosystem established under ABDM supports seamless exchange of data across primary, secondary, and tertiary facilities to ensure continuum of care. Citizens are benefitted with lower out- of-pocket expenditure, reduced repeat testing, precision medicine, customized treatment plans, and quality of service across spectrum.

The government has also proactively implemented e-Sanjeevani telemedicine platform to provide free of cost teleconsultation services to citizens for COVID as well as Non-COVID ailments. It is operational in 36 States/UTs & provides doctors/specialist medical services to citizens through online consultation mode from the comfort of their homes besides consultations through hub & spoke model in Health & Wellness Centres.







## MSME CONCLAVE -AMBALA, PANCHKULA

MSME Conclave was organized by the Haryana State Chapter of PHD Chamber for Ambala and Panchkula Industry on January 21, 2022. 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






Afghanistan participated in SAARC Reverse Buyer Seller Meet (RBSM) which was organized concurrently with PITEX in Years 2015 & 2016. The events were highly successful as large number of buyers from various SAARC countries visited PITEX to explore the possibility of importing Indian products. Mr.Sanjiv Singh, Co-chair, Punjab State Chapter, PHDCCI shared that recent political disruption in Afghanistan has affected surrounding countries in unexpected ways. He elaborated that Afghanistan has a vast Indian market for Afghan products, mainly dry fruits, with substantial duty concessions. At the same time serves as an important market for Indian products, especially pharmaceutical products, tea, cement and other construction materials.

CA Jaideep Singh mentioned that Attari – Wagah route is the shortest route for trading between the two countries. #### ACCELERATING ADOPTION OF ENERGY EFFICIENT TECHNOLOGIES FOR MSMES



The Punjab State Chapter of PHD Chamber organized a Virtual Workshop on 'Accelerating Adoption of Energy Efficient Technologies for MSMEs' on January 31, 2022. The purpose of the session was to create awareness and widespread adoption of the energyefficient technologies in the MSME sector.

Session Moderator, Mr. S B Singh, Convener, Punjab MSME Sub-Committee, PHDCCI welcomed all the distinguished speakers and participants. He mentioned that the total demand for electricity in India is expected to cross 950,000 MW by 2030. Therefore, there is an urgency to improve energy management and energy consumption in Energy intensive clusters by identifying energy saving opportunities.

Mr. Debajit Das, National Project Coordinator, United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) mentioned that implementation of energy efficiency measures in MSME clusters namely, replacement of oil-fired furnaces by induction filler heater; replacement of conventional lathe machines with special purpose machines and servo drive & Motor driven power presses would substantially reduce energy consumption and associated costs and enhance production rate. He informed that Servo Technology can reduce electricity consumption during the unload period to almost zero.

Mr. S P Garnaik, Executive Director, EESL stated that cost of energy sources are increasing. He urged industry members and Energy Intensive clusters to avail the schemes under the project by sharing expression of interests to implement Customized Energy Efficiency programmes; install equipment and conduct energy audits.

Mr. Vinamra Mishra, Director, Ministry of MSMEs stated that 40% of the MSME Industry are manufacturing hubs and further 40% of these industries work in high energy consuming sectors. The major expenditure of these industries goes in energy consumption. He further assured that their joint project will provide efficient energy to the industry and will reduce their expenditures.

Mr. R.K. Parmar, Dy. Director, MSME-DI, Ludhiana, Ministry of MSME, Govt. of India apprised participants on the need for estimating the energy consumption, production and technology aspects in BJL (Batala, Jalandhar and Ludhiana) cluster. He further mentioned it is important to conduct technoeconomic assessments as well as the technology demonstration in MSME units for energy conservation.

Mr. Mrinal Bhaskar, Sr. Technical Expert, EESL made a comprehensive presentation on "Promoting Market Transformation for Energy Efficiency in MSMEs". He stated that it's a joint initiative conceptualised by the United Nations Industrial Development Organisation (UNIDO) and office of the DC MSME, targets to create and sustain a revolving fund mechanism as a mode to ensure replication of energy efficiency measures in selected clusters. The key executing agency of the Project is Energy Efficiency Services Ltd. (EESL). He mentioned that there is a huge potential of energy savings and Co2 emission reduction.

Mr. Utsav Tayade, Manager, Deloitte made a detailed presentation on Energy Efficient Technologies. He elaborated on Importance of Energy Efficiency; Why Energy Efficient technologies are required in manufacturing industry, explained project components, implementation methodology, expected outcome along with Business cost model.

Mr. Chandrashekhar Kumar, State Head, EESL delivered the vote- ofthanks to the guests and requested Industry members to enrol in the project to reduce electricity costs and improve profit margins.

Around 70 participants from trade and industrial sectors, MSMEs, Entrepreneurs, Professionals and Start-ups attended the programme.



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
## **BUDGET VIEWING SESSION**







#### **STAYCATIONS**

A staycation (a portmanteau of "stay" and "vacation"), or holistay (a portmanteau of "holiday" and "stay"), is a period in which an individual or family stays home and participates in leisure activities within day trip distance of their home and does not require overnight accommodation.Common activities of a staycation include use of a backyard pool, visits to local parks and museums, and attendance at local festivals and amusement parks. According to a Connecticut travel blog, the word "staycation" was originally coined by Canadian comedian Brent Butt in the television show Corner Gas, in the episode "Mail Fraud", which was first aired in October 24, 2005. The word became widely used in the United States during May 2008 as the summer travel season began with gas prices reaching record highs, leading many people to cut back on expenses including travel.

A closely related concept and term is nearcation, which is taking a vacation to a location relatively close to home. "Nearcation" and "staycation" may be used interchangeably since the travel destination may be in the same metropolitan region in which one resides and it is unclear how far away a destination needs to be until it becomes no longer a "staycation". Staycations are likely to be less costly than a vacation involving traveling. There may be no lodging costs and travel expenses may be minimal. Costs may include transportation for local trips, dining, and local attractions.


#### PHDFWF AWARDED WITH CSR TIMES AWARD 2021 UNDER SKILL **DEVELOPMENT CATEGORY**





#### PARVATMALA - AN EFFICIENT AND SAFE ALTERNATE TRANSPORT NETWORK

Developing an efficient transport network is a big challenge in hilly areas. The rail and air transport networks are limited in these areas, while the development of road network has technical challenges. In this backdrop, Ropeways have emerged as a convenient and safe alternate transport mode.

The government has decided to develop Ropeways in hilly areas of the country. The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MORTH) will look after the development of Ropeways and Alternate Mobility Solutions. The Ministry will also have responsibility for development of ropeway and alternative mobility solutions technology, as well as construction, research, and policy in this area. Formulation of institutional, financial, and regulatory framework for the technology will also fall under the ambit of this allocation.

Union Finance Minister Ms. Nirmala Sitharaman, while presenting Union Budget for 2022-23 announced National Ropeways Development Programme – "Parvatmala" – will be taken up on PPP mode, which will be a preferred ecologically sustainable alternative in place of conventional roads in difficult hilly areas, The idea is to improve connectivity and convenience for commuters, besides promoting tourism. This may also cover congested urban areas, where conventional mass transit system is not feasible. The Finance Minister announced that contracts for 8 ropeway projects for a length of 60 km would be awarded in 2022-23. The scheme is being presently started in regions like Uttarakhand, Himachal Pradesh, Manipur, Jammu & Kashmir and the other North Eastern states.

Given that ropeway projects are built in a straight line over a hilly terrain, it also results in lower land acquisition costs. Hence, despite having a higher cost of construction per km than roadways, ropeway projects' construction cost may happen to be economical than roadways. Material containers can be designed so as to rule out any soiling of the environment. Ropeway projects adopting 3S (a kind of cable car system) or equivalent technologies can transport 6000-8000 passengers per hour.

## Insurance Interpretation of RBI Circular about Lockers

S. K. Sethi, Founder & Chief Executive Officer, Insurance Foundation of India

For so many years Punjab National Bank entry to Locker room has been having advisory "Get your contents insured". Very few persons took this seriously. But the scene has changed with issue of RBI Circular which is made effective from 1 January 2022 for Bank Lockers. According to it the liability of the banks has been fixed and Banks are now liable to cover loss incurred by Locker clients due to following miss happenings: Loss due to

- Fire
- · Theft
- Building Collapse
- · Fidelity by bank employees

will be covered by banks up to 100 times yearly rental being charged. It means that locker for which your yearly rental is Rs 5000 – all risks as mentioned above are covered for Re 5 Lakhs. If Jewelry kept in it is Rs. 80 Lakhs even then bank will pay you maximum amount of Rs 5 Lakhs.

You must have read news item originating from Palamu District in Jharkhand in which Manager and Asst. Manager of Punjab National Bank joined hands, got duplicate keys issued from locker manufacturer by paying Rs 10000 from own pocket and then took out jewelry from the locker. Both along with 11 persons have been arrested.

#### It is a serious matter. It scares you. What is the solution?

Jewelry is covered under your home insurance policy provided you have attached valuation reports issued by Government Approved valuation Jeweler at the time of submission of proposal form.

The good point about home insurance policy is that policy covers loss of jewelry whether:

- It was lying in your home
- It was worn by you and it is lost in Park, Shopping mall or even while attending social event say marriage
- You are travelling within India or may be worldwide the risk is covered risk provided the facts were revealed in proposal form and adequate premium was paid.

#### Here are some of the questions on Maternity Claim:

#### Q- I am covered in policy provided by employer and maternity claim limit is Rs 50,000.

In my personal family insurance policy limit is Rs 50,000

I am told estimated Charges are going to be Rs 1,25,000. Can I claim amount from both Companies and policies?

A. Yes, you can claim from both companies. Original documents will go to First Company and Photocopy will go to second company. First Insurance Company will issue a

Certificate that they have the Original documents

Colonel's wife alleges theft of jewelry: by airport security IANS 31 January 2022

ECONOMY & NATION The wife of a Colonel in Indian Army has lodged an FIR with Sarojini Nagar police station here, accusing CISF and a private security company of stealing her omaments worth Rs 36 lakh.

#### When you face highest risk for yours Jewelry?

The highest risk is faced by you when going to another city for destination wedding for 3 days and are travelling by air/ checking into hotel.

This is the time when you are carrying maximum jewelry in your hand bag and for security check you have to put your hand bag on X-ray machine. Person looking at the monitor comes to know that your handbag has valuable jewelry. This is the time when chances are highest of you being cheated under one pretax or another. Same thing has happened to a lady (wife of Army Colonel) who was at Lucknow airport when she lost the jewelry worth Rs. 36 Lakhs.

#### Learning:

Home insurance is an important insurance and you must include right market value of jewelry in it. Do not do the mistake of covering part of it in the sum assured. In the event of loss the surveyor /loss assessor will declare it as case of under insurance and significantly reduce the claim amount to be paid.

### Maternity Hospitalization is not part of all Health Insurance Policies

#### Let us understand the facts

Many young couples are under the impression that hospitalization clause in health insurance policy covers maternity hospitalization. No it is not part of all policies. Let us see this aspect by going into depth.

with them. On the basis of this claim will be paid by both companies.

#### Q- My family health insurance policy permits Maternity claim for Rs 50,000, Child to be born will he get included in the policy automatically?

A. Generally he will not be covered in policy automatically. You have to see the policy language carefully.

A company allows addition of Child to the policy when child will be 16 days old. Most Companies will add him after 91 days. All companies will need discharge summary of the hospital that child born is normal (without any deformity).

In case the child is born with any deformity (say hole in heart) then no insurance company will insure him for life.

As far as addition of child after 16 days or 90 days is concerned some companies will permit addition. But many companies will permit addition of the child when renewal becomes due. It means child will be uninsured during this

#### period.

#### Q After completing my studies I have started my first job and want to know whether I can have the insurance policy, which in the years to come can cover maternity expenses.

A. Some companies permit maternity claim after policy is in operation for 3 years – Yes you can buy the policy and assuming you get married after 3 years and you need to cover maternity claim in year 5- yes the company will permit it assuming that year when you get married the name of your husband is also included in the policy.

#### Q I have desire that all risks of new born child are covered from day 1. Guide me.

A. It is your wish. In group policies taken by employer such risk can be covered. You have to see the policy language. Is it covered or not. If yes then you are lucky and can have peace of mind.

In family policy – check which company covers this. Most do not cover.

# THE Someshoara Temple

#### The Shiva Linga or Lingam at Someshwar Beach, Mangalore, Karnataka

angalore Mangaluru or is known for its temples. Devotees from all over India and around the world regularly visit these famous temples and seek blessings. Shree Somnatha Temple at Someshwara is a significant temple of this coastal city. Someshwara temple as per local parlance called is situated on the banks of Arabian Sea and is 18 km from the Mangaluru City, towards Kerala. This temple is also known as Rudrapada Kshetra and is famous for 'Pitrakaryas' (the rituals performed for departed soul by Hindus). It is believed that the temple was built by King Kharasura who was a relative of Demon King Ravana. Hence, it is believed that the temple existed from the time of Ramayana. Pandavas of Mahabharata also visited this temple and offered prayers here.

According to the earliest inscriptions by the Archeology Department, the modern history of this temple dates back to at least 1195. The inscriptions further suggest that the temple was built or renovated during the reign of the Alupa dynasty which ruled the region during 10th century. Further, the temple came under the administrative controls of Kadamba rulers of Banavashi and Choula Kings of Ullala around 12th century and then to Vijayanagara king Immadi Devaraya during 15th century. The famous warrior Queen Abbakka Chowta, the brave Tuluva queen who ruled the region during 16th century was a devotee of this temple and donated a Jaladani to the temple which has been preserved by the temple and used on special occasions to this day.

The temple is situated atop a big rock which gives it an elevated position overlooking the mighty Arabian Sea to the west and lush green areas on other sides. The yearly temple festivals are celebrated with all pomp and show

and attract a large number of people to this temple during the festivities. People not only come here to visit this ancient temple but also to see the extremely beautiful beach just behind the temple. The beauty is enhanced many times by the presence of rock formations adorning the beachside. These rocks are called Rudra Shile or Rudra Paadhe, where Shile or Paadhe means rocks and Rudra is another name of Lord Shiva. Best sunset can be viewed in this coastal region. One also finds a beautiful Shiva Linga on a smaller rock just beside this giant rock, almost on the sea. The whole scene becomes surreal when the waves from the mighty Arabian Sea splash their water on this Shiva Linga every few minutes as if performing Jalabhishek. The presence of black rocks in the vicinity on which the seawater hits fiercely at regular intervals and the grainy golden sand make the whole experience very pleasurable.
