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
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
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## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Leadership is the capacity to translate vision into reality." Warren Bennis

Leadership at an organizational level, state level and the national level is a matter of deep understanding and insightful decision making. The 360-degree endeavours of our Prime Minister, Mr. Narendra Modi to build an "Atmanirbhar Bharat," shows his unconventional, visionary and progressive leadership qualities. Under Mr. Modi's efficient administration, India has been moving forward with "game changing" reforms at an extraordinary pace and is poised to become among the world's most competitive economy, driven by continued expansion of its technology and start-up ecosystem. Indian Businesses are contributing to national prosperity and the essence of "Sabka Prayas" is becoming the focus of New India in the Amrit Kaal over the next 25 years.

These past two months have been volatile on the international front due to the conflict in Europe and COVID-19 related lockdowns in certain nations. This has impacted the Indian economy with several challenges including high international commodity prices, supply chain discruptions and weakening external demand. Recent events show how critical world peace is, and how inter-connected all countries are. Being a defining geopolitical moment for the country, I opine that the Indian government urgently needs to adopt the policy of dialogue and diplomacy to help abate the geo-political crisis at the earliest.

Thanks to the large-scale vaccination drive and other containment efforts of the Government, the Omicron wave is now gradually ebbing in India. The economy has resumed its normal growth trajectory. GDP growth during FY 2021-22 consolidated at around 9 percent, the highest among the leading economies. However as a result of Russia-Ukraine conflict's implications for India and surging global oil prices, the current FY 2022-23 is estimated to attain a GDP growth curve in the range of 7.2-8.2 percent as projected by leading international and national organizations.

It is inspiring to note that the fundamentals of our economy remain robust and we are well placed to deal with the situation stemming from global developments. Our strong buffers include large foreign exchange reserves of nearly US\$ 600 billion, favourable external sector indicators, and a strengthened financial sector. Other positive elements in the picture are exceptional performance on the tax collection front and exports which

touched an all-time high of US\$ 669.65 billion in FY 2021-22. FY 2022-2023 embarked with high economic activity as the PHD Chamber's Economy GPS index in April 2022 showed a record figure of 145.5, supported majorly by the growth of GST revenue collections, passenger vehicle registrations and sequential growth of Sensex. Our manufacturing as well as the service sectors witnessed faster growth in April 2022, due to quicker ease in production, increased factory orders, renewed expansion in international sales and increase in employment.

With Russia and Ukraine being major commodity producers, the crisis has led to rising inflationary pressures of fuel and other products such as foodgrains, edible oils including sunflower oil, fertilizers and metals. As India depends on imports to meet up to 85 percent of its crude oil needs, the Indian refiners are planning to buy crude oil from wherever it is available cheaply, including Russia.

I must commend the Reserve Bank of India's recently raising the repo rate and cash reserve rate to help curb the current retail inflation rate of 7.8 percent while supporting growth. However, this might consequently hurt consumer and business sentiments. Lending rates may go up gradually and loans against real estate, automobiles and FMCG will now cost higher. As inflation is expected to remain high in the months to come, the Chamber recommends that escalation in commodity prices should be addressed with reduction in excise duties on key raw materials and easing the supply chains. Petroleum products such as petrol and diesel which fuel inflation should be brought under the ambit of GST.

I must point out that the conflict has created an opportunity for India's agricultural exports, particularly wheat. Russia and Ukraine together account for almost a quarter of the total wheat supplies globally. The war has resulted in sharp shortages of wheat supply, leaving countries looking for alternative suppliers. On the internal front, there are pressures on wheat stocks this year due to 20 percent lower arrivals compared to 2021, due to extreme levels of heat. I concur with the government's recent decision to contain the export of wheat due to an estimated large drop in output and a sharp rise in domestic food prices, especially of cereals.

Going further, we all know that India has a long-standing co-operation with Russia in the field of defence contracts. With many in the pipeline, the Indian defence establishment has been steadily reducing its dependence on Russian technology and weapons. Having said this, I appreciate the government's recent radical decision to indigenize 101 more weapons and platforms to speed up 'Aatmanirbharta' in the Defence sector. We also welcome the handing over of 30 Transfer-of-Technology agreements to industry, which reflects the increasing trust of Indian industries in DRDO-developed indigenous technologies.

Taking a peek at the international outlook, potential market opportunities have opened up due to the recent trade agreements with the UAE and Australia and the proposal to establish a Trade and Technology Council with EU. Germany's commitment to provide India 10 billion euros by 2030 to support green growth initiatives is a notable action to achieve the goals in the climate action and sustainable development space. It is also praiseworthy to note that our Prime Minister made a pitch to global giants to help make India one of the key partners in the global semiconductor chain.

Given the government's pro-business sentiment, we at the Chamber are highly motivated and will continue to engage with policy-makers and organize events and awareness seminars. Last month, at the interactive session with Parliamentarians on 'Ease of Doing Business in India,' Mr. Kaushal Kishore, Hon'ble Minister of State for Housing and Urban Affairs while gracing the occasion, stated that bank finance is the key enabler which can facilitate ease of doing business. The Chamber also partnered with the Theme State 'Jammu and Kashmir' at the 'Surajkund International Crafts Mela 2022', wherein more than 1.5 million visitors visited the festival during the fortnight of celebrations.

To conclude, I am confident the Chamber will remain steadfast in its commitment with the Government to focus on manufacturing to achieve sustainable economic growth and create new avenues for job creation. As Mark Twain beautifully puts it, "Synergy - the bonus that is achieved when things work together harmoniously", this transformation will require greater synergy between all stakeholders, which we at PHD Chamber consider our responsibility to enable to achieve greater Progress, Harmony and Development for our country.



Dr Gupta, with an Honorary Doctorate degree conferred by Sri Sri University, Orissa for his contribution in providing safe and healthy drinking water in rural and urban areas, has been honored with numerous awards and accolades from various national and international organizations. 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
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### PHDCCI AIR CARGO SUMMIT - 2022 SUSTAINABLE FUTURE GROWTH OF AIR CARGO-FOCUS ON GATI SHAKTI MASTER PLAN



he Civil Aviation Committee of PHD Chamber organized a mega flagship event - THE PHDCCI AIR CARGO SUMMIT -2022 –"Sustainable Future Growth of Air Cargo-Focus on Gati Shakti Master Plan" on March 29, 2022 at PHD House, New Delhi.

The inaugural session was graced by Mr. Amrit Lal Meena, IAS, Special Secretary, (Logistics) DPIIT; Mr. Piyush Srivastava, Senior Economic Advisor, Ministry of Civil Aviation and Mr. Sudhendu J. Sinha, Adviser (Infrastructure Connectivity -Transport and Electric Mobility), Niti Aayog.

The first panel discussion on 'Key To Air Cargo Resilience & Sustainable Future Growth' was moderated by Mr. Keku Gazder, Industry Expert & Former CEO, AAI Cargo Logistics and Allied Services. The eminent panelists included Mr. Ashwin Noronha, Head of Strategy, Business Development, Noida International Airport; Mr. Sanjiv Edward, Chief Commercial Officer, GMR Delhi International Airport; Mr. Ramesh Mamidala, Chief Cargo Development Officer, Adani Airports Limited; Mr. Ivo Seehann, Director Sales & Handling, South Asia, Lufthansa Cargo AG; Mr. Rajesh Singh, AVP-OPERATIONS SpiceXpress;



Mr. Satish Lakkaraju, Senior Vice President, Wiz Logtec Solutions Pvt. Ltd. and Mr. Sunil Arora, ACAAI.

The second panel discussion on 'Innovation & Digitalization for Future Growth' was moderated by Mr Sanjiv Edward, Chief Commercial Officer, GMR Delhi International Airport. The eminent panelists for this session were Mr. Atul Singh, IRS, Additional Director, ICEGATE, CBIC, Director General of Systems, Central Board of Indirect Taxes & Customs; Mr. Cyrus Katgara, Partner, Jeena & Co; Mr. Parvinder Singh, Managing Director, Hans Infomatic Pvt. Ltd; Mr. Amit Maheshwari, CEO & MD, Softlink Global Pvt. Ltd.; Mr. Suneet Gupta,

AVP India, Kale Logistics; Mr. Soma Sekhar Vedantam, CEO, TrackIT and Mr. S. Ramakrishna, Balaji Mariline Pvt. Ltd.

Mr. Amrit Lal Meena, IAS, Special Secretary, (Logistics), DPIIT, while complimenting the Chamber, shared that the PM Gati Shakti initiatives aim to take measures for the reduction of the logistics cost. Mr. Meena highlighted three issues which need to be addressed in a time-bound manner. One issue is seamless multimodal connectivity infrastructure; other is the system and processes, the extent of digitization and third issue is resolution of user issues.

The Special Secretary also shared



Unified Logistics Interface Platform (ULIP) wherein digitization across modes of transport is being done, will play a very important role as it will facilitate a user with the information and access to all 24 systems as per their convenience. ULIP will ease the process in most of the ways and will be an enabler in increasing visibility and reducing logistics costs. A framework of resolutions will be prepared to address the Industry issues and if required further steps will be taken to solve them in a time-bound manner, added Mr. Meena.

Mr. Piyush Srivastava, Senior Economic Advisor, Ministry of Civil Aviation shared that the PM Gati Shkati programme is a blueprint of Amritkaal with a target to develop a multimodal approach in logistics. He shared that 'Sabka Prayas' will empower this program in the coming future. Mr. Srivastava said that the industry and the Ministry should join hands to fast forward the implementation of these policies. He suggested that power cargo airports be developed in order to make India an international transshipment hub which is futuristic and inclusive.

Mr. Sudhendu J. Sinha, Adviser (Infrastructure Connectivity-Transport and Electric Mobility), Niti Aayog suggested steps for sustainability in the logistics sector. He opined that a very solid, logical and precise approach is required to make India's position globally strong in this sector. He mentioned PM Gati Shakti shall be a game changer in infrastructure

development as it will provide a digital framework for all projects under this flagship programme.

Mr. Vipin Vohra. Chair-PHD Civil Aviation Committee shared a presentation highlighting the main industry issues & recommendations which were greatly appreciated by all the dignitaries. Though the air cargo industry has demonstrated how resilient and fast-moving it can be when under pressure, the pandemic's impact has disrupted air cargo flows, while revealing some weaknesses in the global supply and with opportunities for handling and delivering cargo in a different way, shared Mr. Vohra. He opined that to ensure faster revival, the Indian air cargo industry has to overcome some of the multitude challenges faced globally and also some of the bottlenecks it still faces domestically.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHDCCI, while welcoming all the dignitaries, talked about how the pandemic while having a detrimental impact on the air transport industry,

also offered an opportunity for the industry to rethink their future strategies and operations in a way that shapes a greener & sustainable future. This resilient air cargo sector is currently set for a huge transformation and the current need is to adopt sustainable strategies for its future growth. Digital technology adoption, ensuring adequate dedicated freight capacity, implementation of air freight stations, increased stakeholder collaboration, innovation, agility, enabling seamless air cargo partner integration and connectivity for efficient and transparent end-toend operations, along with focus on infrastructure investments are the major pre-requisites for the Industry's resilient and sustainable future growth, he said.

Mr. Michael Jain, Co-chair, PHDCCI delivered the vote-of-thanks to the dignitaries, industry stalwarts & sponsors for gracing the occasion and for their constant support in the Chamber's endeavors.






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## INDIGENISATION REQUIREMENTS OF INDIAN AIR FORCE: OPPORTUNITIES FOR MSMEs

One of the crucial element in the sector is repair which will not only reduce the cost and failures of the equipment but also ensure better performance in the long-run.

Mr. Chandraker Bharti, IAS Joint Secretary (Aerospace) highlighted that 12,000 MSMEs are currently engaged in development of equipment in the sector but the figure is very small compared to other nations and we need to increase the number of MSMEs. One of the important aspects, he mentioned, is import substitution which will prove expedient in reducing the foreign exchange burden.

Ms. Mercy Epao, Joint Secretary, Ministry of MSME talked about roadmaps prepared for up-scaling the MSME sector. Reclassification of MSMEs is one of the significant steps taken by the government in this direction to make them comparable globally. She also talked about numerous schemes like CHAMPION, and SAMADHAAN, UDHYAM to cater to the needs of MSMEs.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCOI during his presidential remarks mentioned that Indigenisation is the capability of developing and producing any defence equipment within the country for the dual purpose of achieving self-reliance and reducing the burden of imports.

Air Vice Marshal P S Sarin, VSM, Assistant Chief of Air Staff (Maintenance Plans), Indian Air Force mentioned that the biggest stepping stone will be repair, refurbishment and up-gradation in the sector for

He mentioned that homeopathy medicines have a good acceptability worldwide and these medicines have proven to be effective and created a different mark during the pandemic.

Padma Bhushan & Padma Shree Vaidya Devendra Triguna, Patron of AMAM, President, All India Ayurvedic Congress and Ayurveda Mahasammelan congratulated PHD Chamber for organizing this insightful webinar. He mentioned that homeopathy has played an important role in treating people especially during pandemic times. People are getting more inclined to homeopathy because of its benefits as it is cost effective, has no side effects and is a good immunity booster. He opined that Ayurveda and homeopathy have a huge potential to compete in the global market. India is taking a lead in homeopathy and to further strengthen the homeopathy landscape, he suggested that quality of the product should improve, more standard colleges should be established, IPD should be strengthened in colleges to boost the confidence of students pursuing homeopathy courses.

Chief Guest, Dr Subhash Kaushik, Director General, CCRH, Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India shared a presentation about the significance and effective role played by homeopathy medicine during COVID-19 period. He stated that homeopathy is very effective, with no side effects and much more affordable than any other branch of medicine. He mentioned that demand for homeopathy has increased rapidly, especially during COVID times. Evidence for homeopathy is not big enough yet but definitely indicative of a scientific footing. In terms of infrastructure, he mentioned that various universities and institutes have been established in India to promote its use and awareness. The Central Council for Research in Homeopathy also works in this area to promote research that contributes towards public health in the country as well as development and acceptability of homeopathy in India.

Guest of Honor, Dr R. K. Manchanda, Director, Directorate of AYUSH, Govt. of N.C.T. of Delhi started his deliberation from the philosophy of homeopathy. In reality prevention by homeopathy can be done in almost every disease at the sub-clinical level. He mentioned about lifestyle modification, quality sleep

and avoiding overuse of alcohol, as all are mentioned in Homeopathy. He highlighted about various experiments done in the past for dengue and diabetes. Homeopathy has its unique distinction and can be integrated easily. He pointed out that one of the important advantages of homeopathy is its non-toxicity, safety is assured. He further added that it has less risk of antibiotic resistance. Dr Manchanda suggested that a good research fund can promote this industry at the next level and make our products qualitative and more competitive.

Dr S.P.S Bakshi, Co-chair, AYUSH Committee, PHDCCI and CMD, Bakson Group mentioned that Homeopathy is a medical system based on the belief that the body can cure itself. He mentioned that homeopathic medicines have seen resurgence in popularity in the past few decades. Homeopathy can be extremely effective in treating chronic and long-term health problems of any individual.

Dr Subhash Singh, Director, National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkatta, mentioned that homeopathic medicine can be very useful for acute and minor traumas and illnesses because homeopathy works to support the vital force of the body and assists the natural ability of the body to heal faster. He stated that Homeopathy is particularly effective





at helping patients strengthen their natural immunity, because it treats the individual as a whole while providing individualized treatment.

Dr R.N. Wahi, Homoeopathy Physician & Vice President, South Delhi Homoeopathic Association said that, this is the right time to create visibility and more awareness about homoeopathic medicines worldwide. He urged that it is important that Industry should collaborate and work

together with academia and adopt new technologies and reforms for creating a mark for homoeopathy. He also highlighted that the government should create a separate advisory board to promote the homeopathy industry.

Dr Bhaskar J Bhatt, Homeopath Physician & Past President, Homoeopathic Medical Association of India mentioned that homoeopathic medicines have helped in improving overall health and prevented various infections and chronic diseases. He underlined that it is the best preventive and highly effective safe medicine compared to any other medicine and has been very beneficial during COVID times.


With the signing of this MoU, PHDCCI and O. P. Jindal Global University (JGU) shall jointly organize capacity building programs for promoting entrepreneurship,

He said that Ayurvedic fundamental principles if applied as per the disease condition can certainly prevent the disease at the very first stage. He stated that the treatment plans as suggested by AYUSH have an Immune-modulatory effect and can certainly combat the disease. The Rasayana Therapy and the common Yoga protocol mentioned by AYUSH is an important tool in dealing with the management of post-COVID syndrome.

Dr Rajiva Rai, Chair, AYUSH Committee, PHDCCI & Head Research, Dabur India Limited highlighted that Ayurveda could play a significant role in long COVID. He apprised that Ayurveda has a comprehensive aspect of immunity through Rasayana which is a rejuvenation therapy. These Rasayana herbs are very common and useful in developing overall immunity of any individual and helps in restoring the body and mind.

Chief Guest, Dr Anand Gudivada, Advisor (Ay.) Ministry of AYUSH stated that nutrition is most important for a proper wholesome and balanced diet as it contains all the body constituents of dosha, dhatu and mala. Food is not only essential for our physical wellbeing but it provides nutrition for our mind as well. Ayurvedic remedies can restore the health of the body and mind. He mentioned that weakness is quite a common symptom of long COVID and it takes time to gain back the strength. But by taking the right diet and some Ayurvedic supplements and rasayana therapies, you can support your system to recover faster,













he further added.

Guest of Honour, Prof. Rabinarayan Acharya, Director General, Central Council for Research in Ayurvedic Sciences (CCRAS) Ministry AYUSH talked about various clinical researches that have been conducted by the Council during the COVID-19 period. He also mentioned about post COVID syndrome as it's difficult to predict long-term outcomes from the new COVID-19 virus. Scientists are looking at the long-term effects seen in related viruses, such as the virus that causes severe acute respiratory syndrome. He said that it's important to remember that most people who have COVID-19 recover quickly. But the potentially long-lasting problems from COVID-19 make it even more important to reduce the spread of COVID-19 by following precautions, that include wearing masks, social distancing, avoiding crowds, getting a vaccine and keeping hands clean.

Mr. Arvind Varchaswi, Managing Director, Sri SriTattva talked about healthy and happy life through Ayurveda. He opined that AYUSH Industry should come up with some robust plan in research and

development for the growth of the sector. He said that COVID has created a new perspective towards healthcare by bringing all the systems of the medicine together. He mentioned that everyone wants to live a holistic life and Ayurveda helps in rejuvenating the body and treats the disease from its root cause for any individual.

S Rajagopala, Associate Professor & Head, All India Institute of Ayurveda, Ministry of AYUSH shared a brief presentation about signs and symptoms of the long-COVID. Dr Rajagopala also explained about most common symptoms in the long-COVID. He mentioned that a study shows that 10% of people with COVID will go on to develop post-COVID syndrome. He also talked about the mental health and various other symptoms associated with the post COVID-19. He further mentioned about various initiatives been taken by AIIA in the management of the COVID-19.

he initiative by the Government to promote "Startups" in India was spearheaded through the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT). The Government initiatives encouraged the Startup Eco-system in India 7 years back and catapulted India into the top 3 countries based on total number of Unicorns in 2022. In this context, the Direct Taxes Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on "Taxation Issues of Startups" on April 18, 2022.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHD Chamber, in his welcome remarks appreciated the Government for initiating the 'Startup India' campaign in 2015 to boost entrepreneurship in India. He suggested that the Government should tax investors & founders of startups at the same rate as listed securities; reform the Inter-Ministerial Board (IMB) framework for tax benefits and bring more clarity on foreign direct listing.

Mr. Sudhir Gupta, Vice President of Finance & Accounts, Indiamart Intermesh Limited stated that the in the last 10 years, the Government promoted the 'Startup India', a flagship initiative through which the

Government wants to build a strong ecosystem and nurture innovation.

Mr. Mukul Bagla, Chair, Direct Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, in his theme presentation stated that startups are the engines of our economy's growth and play a critical role in job creation. He mentioned that the Government needs to provide incentives for making investments in new startups; give concessions while raising capital by the startups; give tax benefits on the profits earned by startups and tax concessions in respect of carry forward of business losses in case of delusion stake by original promoters.

Ms. Pallavi Dinodia Gupta, Cochair, Direct Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, discussed the various challenges and ambiguities under section 56(2) and expressed her views on investing in a private limited company, how the burden of tax abuse gets discharged and proves and powers of the assessing officer to reject the method of valuation adopted by the assesse.

Ms. Lavanya Ashok, Partner, Trifecta Capital highlighted the tax issues in the investing landscape in India from a Venture Capital Perspective.

Mr. Harpreet Ajmani, Tax Litigation Partner, AZB & Partners explained about the grey areas which startups may face from the litigation perspective. He suggested that the Government should provide clarification regarding how reconstruct and splitting up is to be qualified and what all profits and gains are eligible for the deduction. He stated that if processes get synchronized and CBDT gives the clarification on the grey areas then it would aid in the growth of startups.

Mr. Rohit Jain, Partner, Vaish Associate gave a presentation on Initiatives by Government to promote start-ups; Income-tax SOPs provided to eligible Start-ups; Tax Holiday under Section 80-IAC of the Act; Capital Gains Exemption Section 54EE of the Act; Capital Gains Exemption Section 54GB of the Act and Set-off and carry forward of losses.

Mr. Sachit Jolly, Co-chair, Direct Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, delivered the vote-of- thanks to the speakers and gave the concluding remarks.







# INTERACTIVE SESSION WITH IPS, COMMISSIONER OF DELHI POLICE



Rakesh Asthana, r. Indian Police Services, Commissioner of Delhi Police interacted with the members of PHDCCI on April 20, 2022. During the interaction, he stated the facts and figures of criminal data and mentioned that 86% of criminals are first-timers and it is the duty of Delhi Police to ensure that they refrain from being the part of the bigger crime world and instead be a part of the wider and a happier society.

He further projected the potential and capabilities of the Delhi Police. He addressed how Delhi Police can help the business world to flourish in ease of doing business. He mentioned that tweaking the ongoing process of keeping the PCR Vans and the police stations separate to the initiative of merging the PCR with the local police stations has proved to be a success as the response time for addressing a complaint by a PCR has been reduced from 8 to 3.5 minutes, and these facilities have increased the satisfaction level of the claimant. He said that the facility of E-FIR has yielded good results and a new provision for house theft has also been

added recently for more convenience. For better-policing people have been associated with different police stations in their nearby areas.

Pertaining to the business world, he added, cases of cheating, forgery, and misappropriation rates are high and also require a lot of investigation, as it is document-based, and working on quick disposal of these cases is afoot. It is an area that is being given more attention by the Delhi Police to ensure a conducive business environment for the industry stakeholders.

He urged each and every citizen to be their silent supporter in reducing crimes. Mentioning that one of the most emerging and widely spread crimes in the world today is Cyber Crime, it has no boundaries and has easy access to deceive people in any country. To address this issue, well-trained staff have been recruited, added Mr. Asthana.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, President, PHDCCI, said that police, a body of officers representing the civil authority of government is a very important body for the society and the country. Police typically are

responsible for maintaining public law order and safety, enforcing the law, and preventing, detecting, and investigating criminal activities. To combat and prevent crime, and make public places safer, especially during festival seasons, by comprehensive patrolling and increasing police visibility the Southwest District Delhi Police started a patrolling operation called 'Satark' in October 2021. Intending to curb the incidents of street crime, Northwest District Delhi Police launched operation 'Sajag' in October 2021. Delhi Police has also adopted a proactive strategy for the prevention of crime. After a detailed study of crime patterns and contributing factors, specific strategies were adopted for specific crimes under the umbrella Operation "Ankush".

Mr. Saket Dalmia, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI stated that India is poised to become a global economic and political power in the next few decades. A country's security environment has a direct relationship with its ability to meet its economic aspirations. A competent police force provides reliable, accessible,



responsive, technology - driven, and trained policing services to the people and also builds appropriate accountability mechanisms. A police force that is value-driven, will promote integrity, set standards of conduct, make efforts to reduce corruption, and ensure that police discharge their duties with fairness and impartiality.

Mr. Sanjeev Agrawal, Vice President, PHDCCI, talked about the tremendous responsibility of the police to serve the community and ensure its safety & security.

Delhi Police has engaged the Quality Council of India (QCI), to lead the nationwide quality movement in India, to conduct a Public Perception Survey using globally tested statistical tools for assessing the quality of citizen services rendered by the Delhi Police.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary-General, PHDCCI, while elaborating on the various initiatives and drives undertaken by PHDCCI to support and uplift the morale of the Delhi police officers during the crucial times of the pandemic, mentioned the several

concrete measures undertaken by Delhi Police to curb incidents of crime such as dynamic identification of crime-prone areas and deployment of police resources, including pickets, foot-patrolling, PCR vans, and emergency response vehicles (ERVs) to enhance visibility. The steps taken also include the identification, surveillance, and arrest of active criminals, integrated patrolling by the local police, the PCR staff, and the traffic police, and community policing programmes.

### WEBINAR ON INTRODUCTION TO ESG TRENDS AND RESPONSES

he Environment Committee of PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry organised a webinar on 'Introduction to ESG Trends and Responses' on April 27, 2022 with Eminent Speaker, Mr. Sanjay Sharma, Director, ESG, Business Head of ECOFAV Services Pvt. Ltd.

Dr J P Gupta, Chair, Environment Committee. PHDCCI welcome remarks talked about the importance of ESG and Net zero goals. # HOW TO HANDLE INSPECTION, SEARCH, SEIZURE AND ARREST UNDER GST & PREPARATION AND HANDLING OF AUDIT BY GST DEPARTMENT



t has been almost five years since the introduction of the Goods and Services Tax (GST), India's biggest tax reform, on July 1, 2017. While the businesses were still struggling to come to terms with the plethora of changes in the GST laws, the pandemic disrupted the business operations. When business entities are struggling for their survival amid pandemic COIVD-19, the GST Department is issuing notices/ summons for conducting GST Audit, inspection, search, seizure and arrest.

With an aim to provide handholding to the taxpayers, the Indirect Taxes Committee of PHD Chamber organized a seminar on "How to handle Inspection, Search, Seizure and Arrest under GST & Preparation and Handling of Audit by GST Department" on May 2, 2022 at PHD House, New Delhi in hybrid mode.

Welcoming the delegates, Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHD Chamber, stated that GST is a game changer and a single tax

regime with the single tax throughout the country. He further stated that provisions for arrests are created to tackle the situations raised by some unscrupulous tax evaders. He said that it is equally important that the provisions relating to search, seizure and arrest are not misused by those in positions of power. He also mentioned that the objective of a GST audit is to close the gap between the tax declared by the taxpayer and the tax legally due.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chairman, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber, in his theme presentation emphasized about the highest ever GST revenue collection of Rs. 1.68 lakh Crores in the month of April 2022. He further discussed the issues under Assessment, Audit and Inspection, Search and Seizure with Arrest provisions under GST. Furthermore, he highlighted how provisional attachment provisions are draconian in nature as stated by the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the case of Radha Krishan Ind and discussed

various measures for preparation and readiness for the taxpayers to handle Inspection, Search, Seizure and Arrest under GST with Preparation of Audit by GST Department.

Mr. Niranjan Kumar Gupta, Senior Executive Director, S S Kothari Mehta & Company explained the importance of Audit by the Tax Authorities-Section 65 and Special Audit under Section 66. He also explained the importance of audit and Chapter XIII-Audit Schedule sections including 65(3)/101(3), 65(4) and R101(4).

Mr. Rakesh Garg, Partner, SSAR & Associates gave a presentation on legal validity of recovery proceedings in GST; provisional attachment of property or bank account – when, why and recourse available; power to summon persons to give evidence and produce documents; access to business premises; officers to assist proper officers and whether any proceedings can be initiated by CGST authority.



Mr. Sourabh Kumar, Managing Associate, NITYA Tax Associates spoke on legal jurisprudence on search and seizure; constitutional validity of search & seizure by both CGST & SGST authorities and inspection of goods in movement and penalty proceedings u/s 129 & 130 with recent changes in Union Budget 2021.

Ms. Divya Bhardwaj, Senior Associate, IRIS Legal explained when inspection, search and seizure can be initiated; offences – bailable & non bailable and various penalty & imprisonment provisions. She further explained power to arrest under section 69(1); section 132; offences and cognizable and non-bailable & non-cognizable and bailable.

Mr. Sudipta Bhattacharjee, Partner, Khaitan & Co. spoke on legal jurisprudence of coercive actions by the department during search & seizure and collection of tax revenue; constitutional validity of



arrest provisions before adjudication and legal jurisprudence of arrest provisions.

Mr. Karan Sachdev, Joint Partner, Advocate, Lakshmikumaran & Sridharan stated the various assessments under GST viz. self-assessment, provisional assessment, summary assessment and scrutiny of returns, assessment of non-filers of returns.

Ms. Geetika Shrivastava, Executive Partner, TATTVAM Advisor gave an overview on preparation and handling of GST audit; procedure during department audit and proceedings of demand and recovery.

Mr. Pawan Arora, Co-chair, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber pointed out the various offences and Penalties in GST, as well as on Inspection of goods in movement and penalty proceedings u/s 129 & 130.

# NATIONAL COMPANY LAW TRIBUNAL COLLOQUIUM (NCLT): THE ROAD AHEAD

HDCCI was invited for a two-day colloquium organized by the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT), March 26-27, 2022 at Hotel Le-Meridien, New Delhi.

The colloquium was attended by the Judicial and Technical Members of NCLT; Mr. Ravi Mital, Chairperson and Mr. Sudhaker Shukla, Whole-Time Member of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India (IBBI) and Mr. Rajesh Verma, Secretary, Ministry of Corporate Affairs, PHDCCI were invited to share the industry perspective related to the functioning of NCLT. The colloquium was presided over by Hon'ble President, NCLT Chief Justice (Retd.) Mr. Ramalingam Sudhakar.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHDCCI put forth issues



pertaining to NCLT and IBC, faced by corporates in India.

Mr. Sanyal also emphasized the importance of using Mediation for out-of-court settlement of disputes in a speedy and cost-effective manner to the extent possible, besides

suggesting on increasing the strength at NCLT benches, introduction of a single-window system and setting up of e-Courts under NCLT.

Dr Jatinder Singh, ASG, PHDCCI and Mr. Saket Sagar, DS, PHDCCI were a part of the delegation.

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# WEBINAR ON CHALLENGES & OPPORTUNITIES IN IMPLEMENTATION OF IFRS IN INSURANCE SECTOR IN INDIA

anking, Financial Services and Insurance Committee of PHD Chamber of Commerce & Industry in association with Insurance Foundation of India (IFI) & Birla Institute of Management Technology organized a webinar on "Challenges & Opportunities in implementation of IFRS in Insurance Sector in India" on May 6, 2022.

Mr. S K Sethi, Co-Chair of BFSI Committee, PHDCCI and Founder & CEO, Insurance Foundation of India welcomed all the eminent speakers, members and distinguished guests and moderated the session. Ms. B. Padmaja, Deputy General Manager (F&A) Department (Life), Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India was the Chief Guest where as Mr. Shrenik Baid, Partner Accounting, Advisory Services, Deloitte, Mr. Simon Shau Ming Dai, Partner Actuarial, Deloitte, Hong Kong, Ms. Bahroze Kamdin, Partner, Deloitte; CA C.S. Nanda, Co-Chair BFSI

Committee, Institute of Chartered Accountant of India; Dr. Abhijeet Chattoraj, Dean (SW&SS), Professor & Chairperson, Birla Institute of Management & Technology, and Mr. Manoj Kumar Pandey, Associate professor of Insurance, (BIMTECH) were the eminent speakers in the webinar and shared their perspective.

Mr. Ravi Bhatia, Co-chair, BFSI Committee, PHDCCI appreciated the topic and graced the occasion with his presence.

Ms. B. Padmaja, Dy. General Manager (F&A) Department (Life), Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India explained the origin of IFRS in India and the opportunities for various stakeholders like auditors, actuaries, chartered accountants, data analysts and investors. She said that India gave commitment at G20 summit to implement global accounting standards in India to keep transparency in accounting system

and to build confidence of investors with transparency in accounting system. Working on IFRS 17 started in 2010 in India and now it's in final stage of implementation. IASB issued final accounting standards in June 2020. Internal and external expertise crisis is a big challenge for implementation of IFRS.

Mr. Shrenik Baid, Partner Accounting-Advisory Services, Deloitte, addressed the session and explained that IFRS will bring a wide change in accounting of the insurance sector. He emphasized that actuaries and CFOs need to work together for accounting in IFRS. He explained that IFRS 17 on insurance contracts is the first common global insurance accounting standard which is to be globally adopted effective January 1, 2023. IFRS is single accounting model for all types of insurance contracts.

Mr. Simon Shau Ming Dai, Partner Actuarial, Deloitte, Hong Kong explained that for implementation of



IFRS companies should first interpret the new standards and accordingly draft the accounting policies. Financial impact analysis and gap analysis is very important for implementation of IFRS. Project considerations for IFRS are cost, operational complexity, governance, team and management difficulties. He highlighted the key challenges in implementation of IFRS are system performance, data requirements, stochastic modeling, reinsurance, unbundling, modifications, contract boundary, actual versus expected.

Ms. Bahroze Kamdin, Partner, Deloitte, highlighted that the taxation and compliance are big challenges for implementation of IFRS In India. She also highlighted that income tax provisions need to be considered before implementation of IFRS and also talked about the relevant provisions of first schedule to the Insurance Act. She explained about tax provisions for both Life and Nonlife insurance companies. Insurers may face significant uncertainty in determining taxable income for the calculation of taxes. She said that Canada and Singapore have implemented IFRS with some adjustments.

CA C.S. Nanda, Co-chair BFSI Committee, Institute of Chartered Accountant of India, explained that IFRS will bring transparency and consistency in accounting system across the countries. Investors will be more confident to invest in our country due to reliability of the accounting system. He highlighted two important

accounting standards for insurance sector are financial instruments and insurance contracts. He highlighted that ICAI has approached IRDAI in providing support for problems faced by insurance companies in implementation of IFRS.

Prof. (Dr) Abhijit K. Chattoraj, Chartered Insurer - Dean (SW&SS), Professor & Chairperson, Program of Insurance Business Management at Birla Institute of Management Technology(BIMTECH), moderated the panel discussion. He highlighted that the insurance industry in India could not adopt IFRS 4 in the first place. The current accounting standard, i.e. Ind AS, revolves around Ind GAPP. He raised the issue of how the insurance industry will transit to the IFRS 17 straightway. He felt that implementing IFRS 17 in India would be a daunting task and it would have a significant impact on the taxation part of the industry. He asked a panellist whether the insurance industry complied with IFRS 9 and 15. The panellist answered affirmatively. He asked another panellist to throw light on the preparations to transition the current rule-based accounting standards to the principle-based accounting standards as envisaged in IFRS 17. The panellist assured the viewers that it would happen gradually. He asked another panellist to what extent the transition to IFRS 17 would be viable for small life insurance companies with less than 1% of the combined market share to go for IFRS 17, given the massive cost of implementation. The panellist affirmed that there are prefixed rigorous criteria for a company becoming eligible to go for IFRS 17 standards.

Prof Manoj Kumar Pandey, Associate Professor of Insurance, BIMTECH talked about the cost implication of the implementation of IFRS on industry. He highlighted the poor business volume of majority of the insurance companies in India.

Mr. S K Sethi, Co-chair of BFSI Committee, PHDCCI and Founder & CEO, Insurance Foundation of India in his keynote address said that this knowledge session is unique in many ways. He emphasized on the need of implementation of IFRS in India in the Insurance sector. He said that IFRS will bring accuracy, transparency, uniformity and comparability to Indian investors as well as foreign investors. He said that if IFRS would have been implemented in India then valuation of LIC IPO would have been around 25% more than the present valuation. He said that IFRS is very common in the international world and they are more confident on it. He said that IFRS is already implemented in the NBFC sector and feedback is positive for IFRS. He said that India is having good number of chartered accountants in the country and they are ready to contribute their expertise to the regulator and ICAI.

## GEO-POLITICAL DISTRESS: ECONOMIC IMPLICATIONS FOR INDIA

he Industry Affairs Committee, Economic Affairs Committee and Foreign Trade and Investment Committee of PHD Chamber jointly organized a programme on 'Geo-Political Distress: Economic Implications for India' on May 4, 2022 at PHD House, New Delhi.

Mr. Saket Dalmia, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber in his welcome remarks shared his view on macroeconomic stability due to the ongoing geopolitical distress. He stated that the Indian Economy is expected to remain resilient on the back of its inherent strengths, strong economic fundamentals and growth promising sectors.

Ms. Bindu Dalmia, Chairperson, National Committee on Financial Inclusion and Literacy, NITI Aayog said that regardless of geopolitical distress, India has an opportunity to play a bigger role in terms of leadership and governance. The emerging situation of geopolitical coming from Russia and China leads to industries exodus which provides new opportunities as industries are looking to relocate.

Prof Ajay Chhibber, Renowned



Economist and Distinguished Visiting Scholar, The Elliott School of International Affairs, The George Washington University, highlighted that the rising inflation will put a brake on growth. Moreover. higher oil prices will affect the Current Account Deficit.

Dr. Abheek Barua, Chief Economist and Executive Vice President, HDFC Bank pointed out that there is a possibility that the demand effects of a global slowdown will pull commodity prices down. The RBI has tightened its monetary policy recently, by raising interest rates in order to counter high inflation in India and to defend the rupee from the negative impact of the rise in the dollar.

Dr. Shamika Ravi, Non-Resident Senior Fellow - Governance Studies Program, Brookings Institution Washington D.C. and Former Member-Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister of India, said that India needs to build and strengthen self-reliance; food security, defense security and energy security. Energy security is one of the areas of concern for India given its large reliance on energy imports.

Mr. Dhanendra Kumar, Chairman, Competition Advisory Services and Former Executive Director for India, World Bank stated that rise in energy prices has posed a greater threat to the oil-importing countries.

Dr Nilotpal Goswami, Director General, Comptroller & Auditor General of India, Government of India, said that with the ongoing Geo-political development, countries are facing an increasingly interconnected global security environment marked by the growing spectrum of great power competition. Efforts are being taken to deal with the changing climate and rapidly evolving technology within the context of the evolving world order.

Mr. Sandeep Aggarwal, Chair, Industry Affairs Committee, PHD Chamber said that the global order is undergoing severe challenges and setbacks. He suggested that India should focus more on technological advancement and development. India has the potential for manufacturing goods and services at the domestic level and exporting them across the globe.

Mr. Deepak Pahwa, Chair, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber raised the issue of continuous rising import duties and higher raw materials in the wake of the crisis.

Mr. Ashish Ghosh, Co-chair, Economic Affairs Committee, PHD Chamber said that the economic fundamentals of the Indian economy are strong and resilient and capable of handling the spill-over effects of global headwinds with minimal impact.

## ORGAN DONATION AND TRANSPLANTATION-REALITY VS. LEGALITY

HDCCI organized a conference on 'Organ Donation and Transplantation- Reality Vs. Legality' at PHD House, New Delhi on April 27, 2022.

Dr. Anil Kumar, Additional DDG, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, National Organ and Tissue Transplant Organization (NOTTO) highlighted that hospital doctors face problems in identifying and certifying brain stem death in North India. In law, provisions are mentioned but practically not implemented. There are certain myths and misconceptions present

among the masses which need to be addressed. Solutions necessary for these problems can be addressed by proper implementation of laws, identification & certification of brain stem death said, Dr. Anil Kumar.

Dr. Sameer Gupta, Co-Chair of Hospitals & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI stated that there is a wide gap between patients who need transplants and the organs that are available in India. An estimated around 1.8 lakh persons suffer from renal failure every year, however the

number of renal transplants done is around 6,000 only. An estimated 2 lakh patients die of liver failure or liver cancer annually in India, about 10-15% of which can be saved with a timely liver transplant. Hence about 25-30 thousand liver transplants are needed annually in India but only about one thousand five hundred are being performed. Similarly, about 50,000 persons suffer from Heart failures annually but only about 10-15 heart transplants are performed every year in India. In the case of Cornea, about



25,000 transplants are done every year against a requirement of 1 lakh. He urged the whole fraternity that one deceased donor can save up to eight lives through organ donation.

Dr Deep Goel, Co-chair, Hospitals & Diagnostics Committee, PHDCCI moderated the panel discussion session and said that twenty-five years after India passed the legislation to legalize brain death, deceased donor transplantation remains underdeveloped while the country has established formidable capacity for living donor transplantation. He further said that the donor & their family should receive indirect incentives from the Government as they are the real national heroes.

Dr Harsha Jauhari, Renal Transplantation Surgeon, Sir Ganga Ram Hospital, talked about the struggles and blocks fraternity faced in the organ transplantation. Earlier process was unregulated and lack of acceptance was associated with transplantation. Emotional resistance

was one of the main problems. For making the process more regulated and acceptable, uniform declaration of death certification is required which will make the process smooth.

Dr. Abhideep Chaudhary, Senior Director & HOD, HPB Surgery & Liver Transplantation, BLK-MAX Super Speciality Hospital, mentioned that the main problem in this field is of understanding. He said we are as good as other western countries in terms of infrastructure, expertise and processes, the only hurdle we face is understanding among the society. Awareness about success and possibility of transplantation should be promoted.

Dr. Anil Aggarwal, Director Professor and Head, Gastrointestinal Surgery, G B Pant Hospital, said that accessibility and affordability are the main roadblocks in organ transplantation. Major chunk is being denied because of lack of funding. Dr. Agagrwal urged the society to come forward and work together in this

direction.

Dr Suresh Rao KG, Co-Director, Institute of Heart & Lung Transplantation, MGM Hospital, Chennai, mentioned that certification is not a big problem in South India but we should work on licensing and right of a person to donate.

Mr. Saurabh Sanyal, Secretary General, PHDCCI mentioned that Organ donation is very helpful for the grieving process. Many donor families take relief and consolation due to organ donation. Most noteworthy, a single donor can save up to eight lives. Organ donation can also improve the quality of life of many people. Similarly, donating organs could mean removing the depression and pain of others. Most noteworthy, organ donation could also remove the dependency on costly routine treatments. Organ donation is a noble deed and shows the contribution of an individual even after death.

Dr Ravi Rathod, Joint Secretary, PHDCCI, moderated the session.



## EXCERPTS FROM VICE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH ON THE AGRICULTURAL SECTOR

Vice President, Mr. M. Venkaiah Naidu on May 14, 2022 at the gaduation ceremony of the Agri-Business Management programme of ICAR – National Academy of Agricultural Research Management (NAARM) called for enhancing the quality and capacity of agricultural research in the country to achieve substantial gains in agri-productivity in the long-term. He said, "Every effort should be made by the agricultural researchers, policy makers, entrepreneurs and scientists to make agriculture climate-resilient, profitable and sustainable for farmers and to ensure nutritional security." He called upon agricultural universities to encourage students to visit villages and know the actual farm issues firsthand. "We must imbibe the slogan 'Lab to Land' of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi to bring research benefits to farmers to enhance production and incomes', he said.

The Vice President touched upon various emerging challenges of Indian agriculture such as reducing availability of water, climate change, soil degradation, loss of biodiversity, new pests and diseases, fragmentation of farms, among other issues, adding that this makes "the task of agricultural research even more critical in the coming years." To tackle these challenges, Mr. Naidu called for a "paradigm shift in our research approach" and aim for excellence in technological innovation, human resources, and extension services. He also suggested investing in critical areas such as genomics, molecular breeding, and nanotechnology. He called upon ICAR institutions to bring out synergies between agriculture and modern technologies, such as drones and Artificial Intelligence and develop scalable products.



# CONFERENCE ON MEDICAL DEVICES RULES (MDR-17) — REGULATION OF MEDICAL DEVICES | FACILITATING EXPORTS OF MEDICAL DEVICES

he Chandigarh Chapter of PHDCCI organized 3rd in the series, an interactive video conference on 'Medical Devices Rules (MDR-17) – Regulation of Medical Devices | Facilitating Exports of Medical Devices' on 27 April 2022.

The objective of the session was to apprise manufacturers, traders/distributors, importers, clinical establishments, healthcare professionals and general public on global environment for medical devices and acceptance of medical devices abroad.

Col. Rajiv Bhargava (Retd.), Associate Director, Indian School of Business welcomed all the distinguished speakers and participants. While moderating the session, he highlighted that MDR 17 has become pertinent for all the manufacturers of medical devices. India having great potential for exporting medical devices, the Indian medical device industry which is currently 11 billion USD is expected to be 25-30 billion USD by 2025 growing more than 15 percent as against 5 percent global growth.

Mr. Suvrat Khanna, Co-chair, Chandigarh Chapter of PHDCCI, while delivering the welcome remarks stated that the Indian medical device sector is highly dependent on imports with 75-80% imports from countries such as the US and China. He further added that GOI's newly introduced PLI scheme in medical device manufacturing aims to encourage domestic manufacturing, attract significant investments and reduce

reliance on imports in this industry. Prof. Anil Kumar Gupta, Regional Convener, Healthcare Committee, PHDCCI, pointed out that India already being a leader in Pharma Sector and with the available resources and demand for medical devices, has a great capability to grow exponentially and become a hub for medical devices & exports. The time has come where manufacturers need to seek help offered by the Government of India and take initiatives to boost exports.

Mr. Rajesh Maheshwari, CEO, National Accreditation Board for Certification Bodies (NABCB), New Delhi made a presentation on how NABCB facilitates international acceptance of certificates. He apprised participants on Regulatory Landscape for medical devices in



India; Regulatory Authorities for medical devices and Medical Devices QMS (MDQMS) Scope Sectors. In addition, he gave a flow chart of Indian medical device market, Conformity Assessment & Risk and Synopsis of the Ecosystem for Accreditation & International Recognition Framework & Trade scenario.

Mr. Avijit Das, Senior Director, National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL) emphasised on the importance of testing in the medical device industry, as well as getting Testing Labs certified by NABL, which will aid in preventing dumping and assisting domestic manufacturers in avoiding legal and quality issues.

Mr. M G Sathyendra, Consultant & Trainer Global Certifications in his presentation spoke on medical device compliance for exports to the EU and the UK, as well as the Restricted Substances in products placed by the EU and the applicability of MDR 2017 and regulatory requirements to the entire medical device market in the

European market.

Mr. Hemant Bhardwaj, Founder & President, Global Medical Devices Experts Foundation, spoke on the export requirements for Medical Devices to US as well as explained USFDA FRAMEWORK and FDA Regulation of Medical Devices. He also outlined the five steps for commercialization of medical devices in USA.

Mr. Bansi Mahajan, Expert on Non-Sterile Surgical Instruments, Mumbai, while highlighting issues confronting non-sterile instrument manufacturers proposed simplifying the certification process by grouping non-sterile instruments into one category, replacing ISO 13485 with a simplified version of ISO Certificate such as 90001 and levying one registration fee for all the medical devices.

Mr. P.K.Minocha, Director, Meril Life Sciences Pvt. Ltd., Chala Gujarat while sharing the Industry Perspective on the Challenges being faced by medical devices Manufacturers mentioned that medical devices and equipment market is growing at 5.4% per year and currently 65 - 70% devices are imported. He stated Regulatory Certifications, High Cost in manufacturing facilities; Time Consuming Clinical Trials and Absence in high-tech local R&D capabilities are some of the challenges that need to be addressed.

Col. Rajiv Bhargava (Retd.), Associate Director, Indian School of Business in his vote-of-thanks to all the distinguished speakers advised participants to have their products tested and accredited by certified regulatory bodies.

More than 100 participants from Pan India including Policy makers/ Government organizations, medical devices manufacturers, medical devices procurement agencies/ organizations, medical devices testing, quality monitoring organizations and Associations of Industry attended and benefited from the programme.



## INDIA-UAE COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT ENTERS INTO FORCE

The historic India-UAE Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) which was signed between the two nations on February 18, 2022, officially entered into force on May 1, 2022. Secretary, Department of Commerce, Mr. BVR Subrahmanyam flagged off the first consignment of goods comprising of Jewellery products from India to UAE under the India-UAE CEPA at a function in New Customs House, New Delhi. Gems & Jewellery sector contributes a substantial portion of India's exports to the UAE and is a sector that is expected to benefit significantly from the tariff concessions obtained for Indian products under the India-UAE CEPA. Overall, India will benefit from preferential market access provided by the UAE on over 97% of its tariff lines which account for 99% of Indian exports to the UAE in value terms, particularly from labour-intensive sectors such as gems and jewellery, textiles, leather, footwear, sports goods, plastics, furniture, agricultural and wood products, engineering products, pharmaceuticals, medical devices, and automobiles. As regards trade in services, Indian service providers will have enhanced access to around 111 sub-sectors from the 11 broad service sectors. CEPA is expected to increase the total value of bilateral trade in goods to over US\$100 billion and trade in services to over US\$15 billion within five years.

managing self and also illuminated the indispensable qualities necessary to become a leader.







Industry stands together with the government to streamline the next course of industrial movement with focus on MSMEs, the coming times will be crucial in establishing India as the global economic destination of the world


n India, the government and industry are aligned in recognizing the specific financial needs of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs). Noticeably, RAMP is an intervention designed on the basis of the UK Sinha-led Reserve Bank of India's Expert Committee Report (June

As identified, RAMP has to substantially augment Union Ministry of MSMEs capacity at the national level along with scaling up implementation capacity in key industrial states including Gujarat, Maharashtra, Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu. Underlined as per the mandatory World Bank processes, **Environment and Social Assessment** (ESSA) should be smooth for the compliance-conscious Indian enterprises that deftly deal with environmental and social standards.

Facing unprecedented challenges with the severe disruptions with COVID-19 pandemic, MSMEs in India awaited a scheme to handhold the industry in the post-pandemic economic rebounding processes besides creating the bright spots for the economy in the long-run. The new emerging scenario is finding prompt response at policy front and India's political leadership under the visionary Prime Minister Narendra Modi is a source of inspiration for driving the

he concept of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) has gained significance in recent years. The growing focus on CSR has changed the attitude of businesses worldwide, including India. In its oldest forms, CSR in India included the concept of corporate philanthropy and the Gandhian Trusteeship model. In 19905, liberalization of the Indian economy adopted a multi-stake holder approach where companies and organizations were held responsible for all kinds of stakeholders. CSR allows an organization to be socially accountable not only to itself but also to its stakeholders, including the public. To engage in CSR means that a company operates in such a way that enhances the society and the environment. CSR is a vast concept and through CSR programs, businesses can benefit society and thereby boost their brand value. CSR is important for the company because such activities build a stronger bond between employees and corporations, boost their morale, and help both employers and employees to feel more connected to the surrounding world.

CSR has been a leading topic for many organizations, national and international. In today's world, success in business not only depends on profitability, growth rate or brand recognition. A company is also looked upon by how its activities

impact the society at large.

One of the many reasons for a company to embrace CSR practices is to have a socially conscious image. Consumers, employees, and stakeholders prioritize CSR while choosing a company or a brand, and they hold such companies accountable for effecting social change with their beliefs and practices.

A company that takes CSR seriously signals to both investors and partners that it is interested in long-term and short-term gain. CSR is related with environmental, social, and governance (ESG) metrics which help external analysts quantify and analyze any company's social initiatives and it becomes a key factor for investors to show consideration and interest.

Therefore, to ensure CSR authenticity, a company must look upon its values, its mission and determine what kind of initiatives best align with the business goals, vision, and culture, for example, to save the environment by reducing carbon footprints and participating in eligible local causes like eradicating poverty, promoting education, women empowerment and so on.

CSR is a continuing commitment by businesses to integrate environmental as well as social concerns in their business operations. Global changes keep on challenging businesses around the world to look beyond financial performance, and to incorporate social and environmental concerns into their strategic management and operations.

The CSR law in India came with guiding principles and requirements around constitution and functions of CSR committees, responsibilities of the board of directors and around the utilization of the CSR funds and certification by CFOs.

In 2010, the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) released ISO 26000, a set of voluntary standards in order to help companies implement Corporate Social Responsibility. ISO 26000 clarifies what social responsibility is and aid organizations translate



CSR principles into practical actions. The standard is aimed at every type of organization, regardless of their location, size, or activity. Since many key stakeholders, worldwide, contributed to the development of ISO 26000, this standard indicates international consensus.

In August 2013, the Companies Act 1956 was replaced by the Companies Act 2013. The New Act introduced significant changes affecting company formation, governance, and administration, and incorporated an additional section i.e. Section 135 - clause on Responsibility Corporate Social obligations ("CSR") for companies listed in India. The clause covers the essential prerequisites regarding the execution, fund allotment and reporting for successful project implementation.

Every Company to which CSR is applicable is required to constitute a CSR Committee of the Board which shall consist of 3 or more directors, out of which at least one director shall be an independent director. However, if a company is not required to appoint an independent director, then it shall have 2 or more directors in the Committee; 2 directors in case of a private company having only two directors on its Board; and at least 2 persons in case of a foreign Company of which one person shall be its authorized person and resident in India and

another nominated by the foreign company.

Functions of the CSR Committee include formulating and recommending to the board activities which shall be undertaken by the Company, recommending the amount spend on such activities and monitor the formulated CSR policy.

per the disclosure requirements, companies need to disclose the amount they are spending on new and ongoing projects, amount of fund unspent, impact assessment reports and capital assets created or transferred. Further, information on **CSR** Committee constituted, the details of the Committee and approved CSR projects shall be disclosed on the website. Non-compliance of disclosure requirements attracts penalty.

Further, in April 2014, the Companies (Corporate Social Responsibility Policy) Rules, 2014 were enacted to give effect to the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Government of India vide Circular No. 10/2020 clarified that spending of CSR funds for the purpose of COVID-19 is an eligible CSR activity.

The CSR Amendment Rules, 2021 attempts to achieve the motive of monitoring CSR operations effectively. These Rules include- if

CSR amount remains unspent, it shall be transferred to CSR account, mandatory filing of e-form CSR-1 for entities engaged in CSR activities and companies having an average CSR obligation of Rs. 10 crores or more in 3 preceding years to undergo an Impact Assessment.

Recently, the Government vide notification dated 11 February 2022 amended the Companies (Accounts) Amendment Rules, 2014 and made provision regarding a report to be furnished on Corporate Social Responsibility in Form CSR-2 to the Registrar. Further, MCA vide notification dated 31 March 2022 clarified that Form CSR-2 for the preceding financial year 2020-2021 should be filed separately on or before 31 May 2022.

Some of the CSR initiatives in India include- launching countrywide initiative 'Project Drishti' by Reliance Industries Ltd., initiatives by Tata Group in healthcare projects and programs for poverty alleviation, BEACON programme by Tata Chemical, Tribhuvandas Foundation by Amul and Supplementary Learning Centres for education of children by ITC.

Regardless of the size of a company, socially responsible practices can benefit the business and also impact positively on the world.

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rbitration is alternative dispute resolution to litigation. To get justice through litigation, it is expected to take more time, that's why Arbitration has been a preferred mode for relief against disputes. It is being highlighted everywhere that Arbitration gives relief to the disputants in expeditious manner in a cost-effective mode with the flexible procedural requirements and disputant's autonomy. As regards the duration of the Arbitration, it has been witnessed in the past that the average duration of Arbitration could be around seven years which of course is improving now but story is not much different for enforcement of awards. Here below is the case study which speaks how serious delays are taking place in enforcement even after awards.

- Arbitration Area: Construction / Projects
- Parties: Respondent is large industry and Claimant being consortium of contractors with one foreign company as partner
- Amount: Large Value
- Dispute: LD's were imposed for Delay in the project unilaterally by the client

#### **Important Events:**

- Project duration: 30 months
- Actual Project Completion: In mid-

#### 2014

- Arbitration invoked: In mid-2016
- Appointment of tribunal: Early 2017
- Award pronounced: In mid-2018
- Challenge in HC by losing party: In-2018
- As on date i.e., in 2022: Still in High Court
- Enforcement when? Totally uncertain

#### Major events of delays at each stage of Arbitration:

Stage 1: Formation of tribunal Activity: Appointment of Arbitrators Reasons for delay:

- Resistance by the defendants to appoint their nominee
- Defendant sought extensions for nominating an arbitrator
- Seeking court for appointment under Sec 11 and as no specific timelines for disposing of Sec 11 matters
- Defendant argued that there is no dispute and no need for appointment of arbitrators
- Defendants sought for time in courts for filling replies and multiple extension sought

#### Suggestion:

- Timelines where court interferences are there to be stringent
- Allow high imposition of pendentlite interest terms that would make defendant be liable for speeding

- Tribunal to also look in the genuineness of the extension request and disallow / allow appropriately
- · Timeline to be adhered



Activity 2: Availability of tribunal

Reasons for delay: Delays in availability of tribunal, due to individual 'N' no. of reasons.

Suggestion: Conduct the proceeding online, irrespective of place of availability

#### Activity 3: Listing of witness

- Reasons for delay: The defendants seek extensions for finalisation
- Suggestion: Corrective actions are required

#### Activity 4: Evidence hearing stage Reasons for delay:

- Defendant counsel taking cross examination for long duration seeking irrelevant questions only with aim to extend the timelines of the case.
- Defendant counsel has put forth huge no. of questions during cross examination continuing the case for 6 months alone for evidence stage, however, making the arbitrators clueless on the evidence rendered leading to ineffective evidence hearing

Suggestion: Tribunal shall have control on the counsel and fix timelines to the counsel for evidence stage.

Activity 5: Resignation/sickness/death of arbitrators,

Reasons for delay: Delay due to restarting the entire process

Suggestion: Corrective actions required

#### Stage 3: Post Arbitration

Activity: Sec 34, Dishonouring the arbitral award

#### Reasons for delay:

- Client filed application under Sec 34 challenging the award
- After two months, High Court directed client to deposit the amount in court.
- Client filed Special leave petition in Supreme Court against deposit of amount order.
- SLP dismissed by the Supreme Court and directed Client to honour the HC order for depositing the amount. It took 3 months for the order.
- EP filed by contractor to draw the amount against BG and Court

- allowed, taking 2 months.
- Hearing continuously postponed either for filing pleadings, nonavailability of counsels etc. and still remained to be disposed off till date.
- Defendants are seeking to challenge under Sec 34 in court, only with aim to delay the process Suggestion:
- Allow high imposition of pendentlite interest terms that would make defendant be liable for speeding up the case to avoid implications arising out of delay in concluding the case.
- More prevention measure to be taken.

#### Conclusions:

- Enforcement from 2016 is still pending and no resolution.
- Un-controlled delays are happening in Arbitration and post award.
- Case study displays many lacunas in Arbitration system. This could be reference and feedback for corrective actions by concerned authorities on Arbitration law.



urinder Dayal was a brilliant engineer. If getting through the grueling entrance test for Jamalpur (Special Class Railway Apprentices College) wasn't enough, he went on to top the course and bagged the Railway Board Chairman's gold medal. He rose fast in the organization, got one good posting after the other and landed the plum job of the head of a coach factory.

With diligence and sharp observation, Surinder the one to expose an old 'temporary recruitments' racket in the factory. The main accused were identified summarily discharged. and The "aggrieved" party of course didn't take it lying down. They had been humiliated and hit below the belt. Their long standing source of income - hefty commissions from the appointees - had been stopped. They wanted to avenge this; they had to teach the big boss a lesson. The driver was shot first and then our friends. Surinder was hit in the legs and Neetu got a bullet in her neck. Suddenly head lights of a bus shone and the killers escaped in the darkness of fields next to the road. The bus crew and passengers were extremely helpful; Railway authorities took charge promptly and swung into action. Our friend and his wife - both critically injured - were transferred, under strict security, to a good hospital in Ludhiana.

When the killers learnt that their prey had survived, they panicked; promptly picked up the 2 Dayal kids from home and rushed to the hospital. They tried every trick - escorting children, offering to donate blood to get near Dayals, and finish their

agenda; luckily security was strict and they couldn't succeed. An eye witness, who could probably recognize them, was indeed bad news for them. Of course Railways - as requested by Dayal himself - never pursued the 'attempt to murder' case.

Dayals survived and - thanks to a benevolent railway minister received excellent treatment and long-term physiotherapy in UK - recovered rapidly. Surinder became wheel chair bound for life but fine otherwise. He resumed duty, did well again, rose up the ladder and finally ended up as a Judge in the Central Administrative Tribunal (CAT). Meantime, the dismissed employees went to court and finally their case came up in CAT. And, you guessed it, the case landed in Surinder Dayal's lap.

This is when, Judge Surinder Dayal, gave a noting on the file, "Being the victim myself, of an attempt to murder, arising out of the dismissal, I am an interested party and can't hear this case."

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
