"The biggest source of getting the country to a balanced budget is not by raising taxes or by cutting spending. It's by encouraging the growth of the economy." Mitt Romney

On February 1st the Modi government rolled out its interim 2019 budget. A dynamic, inclusive and pragmatic budget, the PHD Chamber warmly congratulates Prime Minister, Narendra Modi and his esteemed ministers for presenting a document that lays the foundation for sustainable growth, development and better quality of life for the people of our country. As 'New India' emerges as the world's fastest growing economy, overcoming international economic turbulence and steadfastly moving towards prosperity, the budget forecasts India's trajectory towards becoming a five trillion dollar economy by 2023 and further double to ten trillion in the next eight years thereafter.

Concurring with the sentiments of our Prime Minister, Narendra Modi, "The Strategy for New India @75 is an attempt to bring innovation, technology, enterprise and efficient management together, at the core of policy formulation and implementation." This would ensure every family has a home with access to water, electricity and toilets; farmers' income double; and the country be free from terrorism, communalism, corruption and nepotism. Such development can only be achieved with engagement with all relevant stakeholders, including the government and industry and mass public participation i.e. a surge of "Jan Andolan."

This budget deserves high accolades for continuing with structured reforms and creating a confidence-building environment in India. It aims to ensure the benefits of development reach up till the last mile, with a thrust on creating a digital economy. Focusing on improving the livelihood of the poor, small and marginal farmers, the middle class, and MSMEs, several avenues for job creation have been proposed. These include schemes such as MUDRA, Start-up India and Stand-up India.

The Chamber appreciates the Modi government for tackling the agrarian crisis by introducing a direct income support scheme for 120 million small and marginal farmer families under which farmers owning up to two hectares will get Rs. 6,000 per year. The setting up of a separate Department of Fisheries would provide sustained attention to the sector that would generate extra income for people employed in the fisheries sector.

We opine setting up of 100,000 digital villages is an important announcement as it shall bridge the urban-rural divide and enhance growth of the rural economy. Increased allocations for MGNREGA to Rs. 60,000 crores would provide rural employment and also create demand. India will reap the benefits of the Digital revolution only when villages are mapped to it.

We also laud the pension scheme launched for workers in the unorganized sector. Named the Pradhan Mantri Shramyogi



Man Dhan Yojana, the scheme aims to ensure workers above 60 years of age receive a monthly pension of Rs. 3000, with government pitching in a matching share of the employee's contribution, up to Rs.100 every month.

The Chamber welcomes the proactive role of the government in providing a great tax relief to the middle class by giving tax exemption of upto Rs. 5 lakh, hike in standard tax deduction and increase in exemption limit on interest income from banks and post offices. This would go a long way to boost consumption demand for mass products as there will be more disposable income in the hands of the consumers.

The relief provided in the form of increased scope for investment into two homes, with benefit of rollover of capital gains tax of upto Rs. 2 crores, once in a lifetime, is a great sop for the common man aspiring to improve their life style. Further, extension in the period of exemption from levy of tax on notional rent on unsold inventories, from one to two years, shall be a huge impetus to the real estate sector.

I truly appreciate the government's 10-year roadmap to improve the ease of living and make India a pollution-free country. By leading the world in transport and energy storage devices and bringing down dependency on imports for energy needs, India shall be a shining example of sustainable development. Electric cars and other energy efficient technologies shall soon be commonplace. Also, the focus on





cleaning of rivers and self-sufficiency in food, all leading to a healthy society, among others are inspiring and promising in building confidence of the people.

With such reforms suggested to cater to the aspirations of the middle class, India will soar to new heights. The Chamber is proud of the hard work and innovative ideas of our youth due to which India has become the world's second largest startup hub. India will benefit from its demographic trend, increase in productivity and improvement in quality of entrepreneurship among the youth.

India's macro-economic environment has improved significantly during the last four and a half years of the Modi government, becoming the sixth largest economy in the world.

Inflation has been contained remarkably, fiscal consolidation is on the right path and foreign investment flows are growing year after year. There is a revival of investment activity in the economy with companies continuing to expand production on the back of strong inflows of new business orders. Exports have recently shown a significant growth with stability in trade deficit. Experts forecast that the Indian economy will grow by 7.2 percent in 2018-19 and is poised to pick up to 7.5 percent in the next two years, benefiting from lower oil prices and a slower pace of monetary tightening as inflationary pressures ease.

Going further, I would like to point out that being the Age of Industrial Revolution 4.0 and age of disruption, access to data is crucial for achieving faster growth driven by digitalization. With increasing usage of artificial intelligence, cloud computing, big data analytics and block chain technology, we are glad that the Indian government is evolving technologies for the benefit of industry, particularly the MSMEs. The National Centre for Artificial Intelligence would be set up as a hub along with Centres of Excellence and an Artificial Intelligence Portal. This shall help leverage emerging technologies at a national level with India specific use cases paving way for Digital India 2.0, propelling India towards becoming a US\$ one trillion Digital Economy by 2025.

Though most of PHD Chamber's suggestions were taken into consideration by the government while framing the budget,

the budget had little or no tax incentives for large corporates. Nonetheless, the announcements made prior to the budget such as exemption from GST for small businesses being doubled from Rs. 20 lakh to Rs. 40 lakh and increase in turnover limit for availing Composition Scheme for Goods shall immensely benefit small businesses and manufacturing.

I must also commend that progressive transformation has taken place through government's structural reforms such as GST harmonization, bank recapitalization and the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code combined with well-developed infrastructure projects such as green field airports, ports, roads, smart-cities, high speed train corridors and digital platforms.

I appreciate that the budget announced a single window clearance for filmmaking for Indian filmmakers as promised by Union Minister for Minority Affairs, Mr. Mukhtar Abbas Naqvi when he presided as Chief Guest last month at the 'Global Film Tourism Conclave' organized by the PHD Chamber at Mumbai.

The Chamber's initiatives towards Skill development received a huge thrust this year when we in partnership with the Government of Jharkhand organized a 'Global Skill Summit 2019' last month at Ranchi. This was an endeavour to promote skilling, employability and entrepreneurship among the youth and develop Jharkhand as the 'Skill hub of India'. The Summit was graced by Ms. Draupadi Murmu, Governor of Jharkhand, Mr. Dharmendra Pradhan, Union Minister, Petroleum & Natural Gas and Skill Development & Entrepreneurship and several other ministers.

With the forthcoming elections, there are bound to be further huge economic promises to different sections of the electorate by the political parties. Having said this, I suggest industry should retain its focus on increasing investments and not be swayed by political slogans as we are on course to becoming a global economic powerhouse. As envisioned by our former Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, "I dream of an India that is prosperous, strong and caring. An India that regains a place of honour in the comity of nations."

uture jobs will have disruptive changes on existing skill sets that will result in creation of new tasks in areas of planning, configuration and maintenance of new technologies. Industry 4.0 models are likely to change many job roles necessitating job redefinition and transformation of business processes resulting in increased output. This needs Hybrid Skilled workforce to harness new and disruptive manufacturing technologies. Industry in future will look beyond formal degrees to identify manpower with the relevant skills for specific roles and capabilities. Future skills create tremendous opportunities for industries and its success will require a thorough understanding of future technologies and the associated skills. Digital transformation & readiness can be realized by analysing current skills and the ability to acquire new skills of the workforce.

In the technical session the following issues were discussed: Skills for future in the era of Industry 4.0; Integrating STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) in the education system; Cross-Industry and Public-Private Collaborations and Quality of training, Standardization of training process and effective assessment.

Lt. Gen Dr. S P Kochhar, CEO, Telecom Sector Skill Council, moderated the session and gave a brief background about future jobs and skills required. H.E. Mr. Ashraf Farhad Shikhaliyev, Ambassador, Republic of Azerbaizan, appreciated the skill development programs launched in India and complimented the talent of Indian youth. Prof Mukti Kant Mishra, President, Centurion University spoke about the innovations happening in skill development and highlighted the initiatives being taken by Centurion University in skill development. ducation is essential for all round human development; skills and knowledge are the driving forces of economic growth and prosperity. Skilling should start at the young age to create ideal employees in this knowledge economy. Formal education system in the learning ecosystem is characterized mainly by content and knowledge accumulation. Skill is the interplay of physical, mental, cognitive, social and emotional distinctiveness. Many countries have implemented vocational education and training system that is creating a smart and employable workforce. There is tremendous scope for skill-based innovations for the not-so-privileged and marginalized sections of society that need to be encouraged to join the mainstream skilling ecosystem. In the contemporary era of Knowledge Economy, a broader perspective of formal education, skills and life-long learning model is the new order.

In the technical session, the following issues were discussed: Role of skills universities in imparting work-integrated training and offering skills-specific courses; International system of Vocational Education in Schools and Higher Education and Institutional mechanism in integrating formal education in skilling.

Brig (Dr) Surjit Singh Pabla, President, Bhartiya Skill Development University, gave a brief background about the theme and moderated the session. H.E. Mr Ricardo A. Berna M, Charge d'Affairs, Embassy of Panama, gave a description on education and skill development ecosystem in Panama. Mr. Raj Nehru, Vice Chancellor, Sri Vishwakarma Skills University enumerated the modifications required in the skill ecosystem in India and how the new University was planning to contribute towards vocational education in Haryana. Mr. Sanjeev Roy, Higher Education & Skill Development, EU Project & UNESCO described the systems followed in European countries and how India can learn from those. Mr. Kamalendu Bali, Senior Director, Concentrix India, gave a perspective of the corporate sector and what the private sector expected from the young workforce. The Roads, Ports & Other Infrastructure and Renewable & Alternate Energy Committee of PHD Chamber organized a conference on 'Transforming Urban Mobility in India & Role of Electric Vehicles' on November 29, 2018 at PHD House, New Delhi.

Chief Guest, Mr. Anil Srivastava, IAS, Adviser (Transport) & Director General, Development Monitoring and Evaluation Office (DMEO), NITI Aayog apprised the delegates that the Centre and States have initiated policy measures for the launch of Electric Vehicles (EVs). He further added that on the cost factor, an investment on one EV becomes yielding within a time span of six and a half years.

Mr. Manoj Kumar, IAS, Managing Director, Delhi Transport Corporation, Govt.

of NCT of Delhi informed that DTC would float tenders to procure about 1,000 EVS, possibly in January 2019. He also exuded confidence that with the procurement of EVs, these would begin to roll down on Delhi roads in the month of June 2019. He indicated that the Corporation is finding the cost of electric vehicles on the higher side and has requested manufacturers to cut down costs so that more and more EVs are plied not only on the roads of Delhi but also in other States. He concluded his speech by saying that charging facilities should be widely available so that recharging does not become a problem or inconvenience for both operators and users.

Mr. D.K. Aggarwal, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber appreciated the policy measures being initiated by the government relating to e-mobility that would help in combating pollution.

Mr. Ashish Mohan Wig, Chairman, Roads, Ports & Other Infrastructure Committee, PHD Chamber shared the fact that if the government's 2030 objective is met, India could save Rs. 8 lakh crores in imports of petrol and diesel for the automotive industry over the period, after considering some level of domestic manufacturing of batteries.

Mr. Paramjit Anand, Founder, Ascentaz briefly explained the EB-5 visa program, which provides a golden opportunity for investors and their entire family to get permanent residency in the US. This is possible to get after investment is made in government approved commercial projects in the US economy.

Mr. Anand added that due to dramatic increase in demand for EB-5 visas, the State Department plans to impose a Final Action Date (FAD) for India no later than June 2019 – it could well be earlier. Once FAD has been imposed, Indian nationals will likely wait a long time to come to the US, even though their petitions have already been approved.

He explained how to qualify for the EB-5 program, how immigrants can invest directly in a job creating business or can invest through regional centers approved by USCIS to promote economic growth in the designated areas. He also briefly explained the current projects in Las Vegas for making investment under EB-5 program. The event was supported by Ascentaz.

Participants interacted at length on India's imports of olive oil and table olives from countries such as Italy, Spain, Turkey and Tunisia, etc. as well as about the different categories of olive oil and the HS Codes under which India imports them. Mr. Niraj, Secretary of Indian Olive Association informed the delegates about the rising import duty on olive oil in India in order to safeguard the domestic olive oil industry.

Mr. Vikram Gera, Co-chairman, International Affairs Committee for Central Europe, PHD Chamber suggested that Turkey should look at the Indian market as a long-term strategy and the need to undertake marketing strategies by organizing awareness campaigns and road shows in order to educate Indian consumers and target markets such as modern retail stores, premier clubs and restaurants about the Turkish olive oil. As India has a trade deficit with Iran which traditionally has been dominated by import of Iranian crude oil, it is necessary that other sectors could be explored to enhance trade in the coming times. Keeping in view Iran's vast natural gas resources and India's LNG capacity, gas could be an important part of future ties, going forward.

Dadachanji Memorial Debate on Constitutional Morality

he Indian Judiciary System has in the recent times expanded its horizons in directions that may impinge upon Parliament's law-making or lead to unpredictable judicial decision-making. Repeated use of the phrase "Constitutional Morality" in the Supreme Court judgments that have emerged in 2018 (the GNCT Delhi v. Union of India case, the Navtej Singh Johar case about s.377 IPC, the Sabarimala Judgment) gave rise to a debate titled "Ideas like Constitutional Morality are subjective and widen the scope for judicial discretion, delay and uncertainty in the law" on December 8, 2018 at New Delhi.

The debate was hosted by Amir Singh Pasrich, Chairman, Law & Justice Committee, PHDCCI & Managing Partner, I.L.A. Pasrich & Company and Mr. Satyajeet Krishnan, Area Director, North and General Manager Taj Mahal, New Delhi. Hon'ble Mr. Justice Madan B. Lokur, Judge, Supreme Court of India was the Guest of Honour, while the keynote speaker was Mr. K. K. Venugopal, Attorney General of India. The debate was moderated by Mr. Vikram Chandra, Founder, Editorji Technologies.

Mr. Amir Singh Pasrich gave a eulogy on Mr. J.B. Dadachanji who was his mentor and senior. He described Dadachanji's moral courage and integrity which were universally known facets that he brought to every court room and corporate table.

Mr. Pasrich said "There is nothing dangerous about the phrase Constitutional Morality, but when we divorce the word Constitutional from the word Morality and look at morality separately out of context from the constitutional scheme, we could have one outcome in Court No.1 and a different outcome in Court No.2." Towards the end of his introductory remarks on the debated topic he added "Ultimately, the battle between the two sides of the debate is only a battle between lawyers wanting certainty and lawyers wanting the flexibility of doing complete justice and equity."

Mr. Justice Madan Lokur spoke about the need for courts to intervene to protect public interest, protect fundamental rights and particularly rights of the child.

Cases like the Sabarimala Judgment, or the GNCT of Delhi case and the decision to read down s.377 of the Indian Penal Code amongst many others have been very influential precedents that chart-out a course of widened and widening judicial discretion which was a major factor leading to the formulation of the current topic of debate. The topic was brought about at the suggestion of one of India's most acclaimed constitutional lawyers, the present Attorney General of India, Mr. K.K. Venugopal who also gave a keynote address on 'Is Constitutional Morality a further tool in the armoury of the Supreme Court for expanding judicial review?'

Mr. K. K. Venugopal spoke extensively about the expansion of the Supreme Court's role both through use of phrases like the "the basic structure of the constitution" introduced in 1973 with a 7 to 6 majority judgment of the Court in the Kesavananda Bharti case, and that India's first Prime Minister Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru had feared that the Court would become a "third chamber of parliament". Mr. Venugopal referred to the oft resorted to power of the Court for expanding its jurisdiction ruing that there was no limit on this power. He felt that the newly developing concept of constitutional morality can be very dangerous and one can't be sure where it will lead us to.

The topic presented remarkable intricacies and was debated by eminent Senior Counsel including Mr. Tushar Mehta (Solicitor General of India), Mr. Salman Khurshid (Former Union Minister for External Affairs), who spoke for the motion and Ms. Pinky Anand (Additional Solicitor General of India) and Mr. K. V. Viswanathan (Sr. Advocate and former Addl. Solicitor General of India) who spoke against the motion. The closing remarks were given by Ms. Indira Jaising (Former Additional Solicitor General of India).

Mr. Vikram Chandra, Founder of EditorJi Technologies spoke about the uncertainty in the law which must be protected against especially as it leads to delays.

On behalf of the Taj, Mr. Satyajeet Krishnan, Area Director, North and General Manager Taj Mahal, New Delhi, said "This is the second time, the Taj Mahal, New Delhi has supported this lively legal debate aimed at securing a better tomorrow through discussions about contemporary issues."



The Capital Market and Commodity Market Committee of PHD Chamber organized a Knowledge Session on Interoperability among Clearing Corporations on December 28, 2018 at PHD House, New Delhi.

Mr. Abhi Narayan Mishra, Principal Director (Finance & HR), PHD Chamber mentioned that the interoperability norms assume significance in the wake of the disruptions in the functioning of stock exchanges and respective Clearing Corporations (CCPs) in the recent past.

Mr. D. K. Aggarwal, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber highlighted that regulators are continuously changing the landscape of capital market and introduced various reforms in the last two years. Some of the major reforms introduced are Integration of membership of equity and commodity; Creation of universal exchanges; Rationalization of charges for mutual funds; Fast return of money from new issues, etc. He informed that SEBI has recently issued norms for interoperability among CCPs which will be operationalized by June 1, 2019.

Mr. Narinder Wadhwa, Alternate President, Commodity Participants Association of India (CPAI) talked about the opportunities and issues involved in Interoperability. He mentioned that norms will not only aid traders to take benefits of margin but will also reduce post-trade costs of trading firms by optimizing the use of capital. He hoped that in the coming years, there will be a more vibrant financial market with greater stability and effectiveness.

Mr. Piyush Chourasia, Chief Risk Officer, Head – Strategy and Compliance Officer, Indian Clearing Corporation Ltd.



Participants

gave a detailed presentation on the 'The Way Ahead: Interoperability'. He discussed about the Introduction to Interoperability; Membership structure; Interoperability scenario; Netting efficiencies and Mitigation of systemic risks and Failure of Exchange / CCP along with the advantages.

Ms. Devika Shah, MD & CEO, Indian Clearing Corporation Ltd. highlighted that CCPS will have to establish peerto-peer link for ensuring interoperability. She mentioned that obligation system, settlement process, surveillance systems, sharing of client data, sharing of product information, default handling process and dispute resolution process will also be part of the agreements.

Mr. Neeraj Kulshrestha, Chief of Business Operations, BSE Ltd. in his address stated that interoperability will rationalise margins across exchanges and products. He highlighted that now exchanges will have to ensure that stock brokers are mandatorily subjected to a risk reduction mode on utilization of 85% of the broker's collateral available for adjustment against margins.

Mr. Manoj Kumar, CGM – Market Regulation Department, SEBI mentioned that at present, different bourses have their own CCPs, but the interoperability would permit trading members to clear trades through a firm of their choice.

Mr. Sushil Chandra, Chairman, CBDT assured India Inc. that the objective of the

government is to enhance tax base and CBDT is working on a model to widen the tax base. He also informed that the CBDT has collected digital information of the tax payers and it is being matched with the Department's data banks to find non-filers of returns. He further added that the Department is serious on Benami property and has attached 1777 properties including those of bank accounts since the implementation of the Act. He said that 'India has different treaties with around 72 countries for automatic exchange of information to stop tax evasion'.

Mr. Akhilesh Ranjan, Member (Legislation), CBDT stated that the government is willing to make tax laws very simple and with ease of compliance to bring more and more tax payers in the system of tax base.

Mr. Rajeev Talwar, President, PHD Chamber stated that the New Direct Tax Law will make taxation more progressive and the Task Force on revamping Direct Tax Law has been constituted as the New Direct Taxes Code will be in sync with the economic conditions of the country, prevailing international best practices, ease in carrying out business, reduction in avenues of litigation and above all be less cumbersome.

Mr. Anil K Chopra, Chairman, Direct Taxes Committee highlighted that the world is moving steadily towards global adoption of new standards on automatic exchange of information, making a seachange in the process of receiving and utilizing information, especially pertaining to Indians having financial accounts in offshore financial jurisdictions. He also discussed the rights and obligations of tax payers and tax administrators and increased efficiency. Further, he gave some suggestions to the constituted Task Force on how to redraft the Direct Tax Law.

Hon'ble Justice Mr. Badar Durrez Ahmed, Former Chief Justice, Jammu & Kashmir High Court in the valedictory address highlighted upon the 'Tax system for making India a Competitive Preferred Destination'. He also stressed on simplifying taxation, rationalizing its structure and simplifying tax laws.



India towards a Shared Prosperity: Economic Agenda for the Next 5 Years

The Economic Affairs Committee of PHD Chamber organized a session on 'India towards a Shared Prosperity: Economic Agenda for the Next 5 Years' on December 18, 2018 at PHD House, New Delhi. Dr. Ajay Chhibber, Former Economist, World Bank and Visiting Scholar, Institute of International Economic Policy, George Washington University, US addressed the session.

Mr. Rajeev Talwar, President, PHD Chamber said that India is the fastest emerging economy in the global economic system and highlighted that the lead macroeconomic indicators are on a very positive trajectory i.e. industrial production is growing, retail inflation is under control and exports have recently shown a significant growth with stability in trade deficit. He also informed that on the policy front, the government has announced many reforms such as Jan Dhan Yojana, Skill India, Start-up India, Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, Digital India and Swacch Bharat Mission. The historic implementation of GST has started bearing fruitful outcomes. He highlighted the importance of discussing economic agenda for the next five years for building a prosperous and sustainable India in the coming times.

Dr. Ajay Chhibber highlighted that GSDP of Maharashtra presently is higher than what the GDP of India was in 1991 and there has been a huge transformation in India in many different ways. He also said that to compete globally, India will have to become very competitive. He stressed that India would become a US\$ 4-5 trillion economy by 2025, having double percapita income and citizens of the country would be better off overall. He stressed that India needs to create employment opportunities to address the demographic dividend entering the job market.

He also suggested that if all business surveys are collected such as World Economic Forum, IMD competitiveness index, among others, a collection of indicators could be done through which it would facilitate in identifying where India is lagging which is actually an indicator of India's shared prosperity. He highlighted the Quadrilateral- 4 broad baskets, where India needs to get much more competitive. He also verbalized that human capital is thought in terms of only education and health, but now a realization has begun towards sanitation which is important.

Further, Dr. Chhibber highlighted that the teething problems with GST are over.

His experience with GST around the world is that once GST reform stabilises, it would end up increasing public resources by about 3-4 percent of GDP. He highlighted the importance of the tourism sector and said that the sector needs to perform better in mobility services (which is a low hanging fruit and huge job creator), warehousing and logistics. India is clearly positioned for the next five years in mobility services, warehousing and logistics sectors. He said that for India, logistics and infrastructure are the bottlenecks. He concluded by emphasizing the need for addressing the regulatory system in India.

Mr. D.K. Aggarwal, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber highlighted that currently it is the Age of Industrial Revolution 4.0 and age of disruption. With upcoming usage of artificial intelligence, cloud computing, big data analytics, blockchain technology, it is necessary that India adopts such technologies to be competitive. He emphasized that Digital infrastructure is also of equal importance along with physical and social infrastructure.

Interactive Session with H. E. Frank G. Wisner, Former Ambassador of US to India



H.E. Frank G. Wisner, Former Ambassador of US to India being felicitated by Dr. Lalit Bhasin, Chairman, Americas Committee, PHD Chamber

The America's Committee of PHD Chamber organized an interactive session with H. E. Frank G. Wisner, Former Ambassador of US to India on December 6, 2018 at PHD House, New Delhi. Dr. Lalit Bhasin, Chairman, Americas Committee felicitated H.E. Mr. Wisner by presenting a memento.

H. E. Frank G. Wisner, Former Ambassador of US to India commented that 2018 has been a difficult and stressful year for India as well as for the United States with similar challenges.

Mr. Wisner stated that coping up with rise in China's power and how it will use economic growth, military resources and how China will deal with its neighboring countries are all issues of concern. He questioned as to whether China will become a global power with one belt and one road starting in the East and stretching all the way to the English Channel. He pointed out that China's territorial rise in the South China Sea has threatened to displace Japan from North China Sea. China with significant economic and increasing military strength is moving its power to influence the way the world relates to it. He said he was looking for implications of China's progess in relationship with India.

Regarding the situation in the Middle East, Mr. Wisner stated that as of now, persistent civil war in Yemen, Syria and Libya is due to continued activities of Islamic Fundamentalists. He said that some degree of stability is returning, yet conditions do not predict long-term stability due to Islamic opposition. The Former Ambassador pointed out that there are more refugees in the world today, like Rohingyas in India. Migration is upsetting European politics. In US and Latin American countries, migrants are heading towards the American border which is creating social disturbances and there is disagreement among Americans about basic rules of international commerce and trade.

H.E. Wisner considered climate change as an overwhelming global problem and said that the consequences are increasing across the globe without a clear road map as to how to deal with these issues.

He underlined that Indians and Americans grew up in a liberal international order, democracy, free speech, tolerance, democratic practice, elected government, rule of law and free exchange of goods and services around the world. He added that since mid 1990s, there is great transformation in Indian and American relations as American Presidents have come to India and Prime Ministers of India have visited the US. As communication is at the highest political level, he was optimistic that better days of Indo-US relationship are still ahead.

Ambassador Wisner's colleagues, Mr. Frank R. Samolis and Mr. Robert S. Kapla also addressed the participants on trade and political issues pertaining to India and US relations.

He was accompanied by a delegation from Iran comprising of representatives from Iran-India Chamber of Commerce, Iran Chamber of Commerce, and Agriculture, Industries, Mines Chabahar Free Zone Organization, Iranian Rail Industries Development Co., FPSCO Group, Mapna Group and GASSO Group. The objective was to discuss the areas of bilateral trade and cooperation between Iran and India and to explore the possibility of signing a MoU between PHD Chamber and Iran-India Chamber of Commerce and forming a working committee for

continued interaction.

Mr. Raieev Talwar. President. PHD Chamber apprised the delegates about PHDCCI and also about its first international office at Bahrain for 6 GCC countries. He also spoke on the historical relationship between India and Iran and said that Iran is among India's major trading partners with Iran's trade with India exceeding US\$11 billion and India's trade with Iran exceeding US\$3 billion in 2017-18. He also highlighted that India is the fastest growing economy in the world and depends on Iran for oil but there is an immense scope for India to import other products from Iran apart from oil.

Mr. Ebrahim Jamili, President, Iran-India Chamber of Commerce sought cooperation for making Iranian companies aware of the business opportunities available in India along with the Indian companies interested to do business in Iran. This could be by way of participation

in each other's trade fairs and exhibitions. Mr. Talwar apprised the delegation about PHDCCI's partnership with ITPO this year and ways of promoting India-Iran trade in the India International Trade Fair. He also said that that time is opportune for India to explore oil in Iran and Iran can guarantee the supply of energy to India.

Mr. Jamili emphasized on signing a MoU and forming a Working Committee between the two Chambers. Mr. Parham Rezaei, Vice President, Iran-India Chamber of Commerce will be the nodal point of the working committee from Iran-India Chamber of Commerce while Mr. Vivek Agarwala, Co-chairman, International Affairs Committee for Africa, Gulf and SAARC will be the nodal point of the working committee on behalf of PHD Chamber. The Working Committee would have full support of the Chahabar Free Trade Zone while the real players would be the private companies of both the countries.

According to Mr. Jamili, major bottlenecks in India-Iran trade comprise of banking, issues relating to bureaucracy, red tape and delay in exchange of commercial documents which hinders growth in trade between India and Iran.

Mr. Talwar assured to take up these issues in his meeting with the RBI Governor and felt the need to establish more banking channels in order to promote economic cooperation between the two countries. He also informed that India has got discriminatory tariffs for Iranian goods, however, Iranian products are not in competition with Indian goods and in fact complement each other.

On the issue of Transhipping, Mr. Jamili wanted collaboration with small Indian shipping companies to encourage trade between the two countries. Mr. Rajeev Talwar stated that joint ventures do exist between the Shipping Corporation of India and the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines which needs to be followed up and revived. Mr. Jamili highlighted the importance of Chahabar Port for India and invited PHD Chamber to mount a private sector delegation to Iran on February 26, 2019 for the Chahabar Day.

Mr. Ebrahim Jamili pointed out that there exists immense potential for making trade in aluminium industry profitable for both the countries. Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal suggested for a meeting with NALCO in this regard.

Iranians expressed interest in engaging India's technical expertise to

construct railroads and rail wagons. Issues highlighted by Indian companies were on export of fertilizers as well as raw materials for fertilizers from India to Iran, seeking clarity on Iranian policy on import of fertilizers and connecting with the right fertilizer companies in Iran. The two Chambers assured full support to each other in introducing reliable companies respectively and in continuing their efforts to increase bilateral trade and cooperation between India and Iran.

Seminar on Risk Management in Agri Commodities Market through Options

The Capital Market and Commodity Market Committee of PHD Chamber organized a seminar on 'Risk Management in Agri Commodities Market through Options' on January 10, 2019 at PHD House, New Delhi.

Mr. D K Aggarwal, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber highlighted that futures trading in Agri-commodities was re-introduced for the benefit of farmers in 2002. These options help in fair price discovery and provide a mechanism to hedge price risk volatility. He also mentioned that in January 2018, NCDEX introduced the first option contract in Agri-Commodity in Gwar Seeds and now four Agri commodities are being traded in the market. He stressed upon the need for creating more awareness of the mechanism to the farmers.

Ms. Shivani Gupta, Deputy Secretary, PHD Chamber mentioned that the options can be a valuable weapon in the farmer's arsenal in the tactical war for survival.

Mr. Sanjay Rawal, President, Commodity Participants Association of India informed that for the country's progress, farmers and other value chain producers need to get proper education of trading techniques, otherwise the rationale of commodity market will be left behind.

He added that SEBI has taken various steps to improve the health of the market such as introduction of institutional participation to increase liquidity and participation. Mr. Ashish Shrivastava, Head, Quant & Market, NCDEX talked about the advantages of options market in risk management and strategies to be used and call options along with case studies for hedging risks.

Interactive Session with Chief Election Commissioner of India

he Managing Committee of PHD Chamber organized an interactive session with Mr. Sunil Arora, Chief Election Commissioner of India on January 16, 2019 at PHD House, New Delhi. Mr. Rajeev Talwar, President, PHD Chamber introduced Mr. Sunil Arora, an IAS officer from Rajasthan cadre of 1980 batch. He has served in several eminent positions such as Secretary, Ministry of Information & Broadcasting, Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship and Ministry of Information & Broadcasting; Chairman & Managing Director of the then Indian Airlines; Chairman of Rajasthan State Industrial Development & Investment Corporation and as Additional Chief Secretary, Government of Rajasthan among several other senior positions.

Mr. Sunil Arora talked about the various current aspects of election process and need for electoral reforms in the country. He highlighted that the parliamentary form of Government adopted by India is more of a political system which reflects the spiritual ideal of harmony. He said that discourse of democracy is deepening through the active participation of various stakeholders. He also discussed about the elections conducted during his tenure in Himachal Pradesh, Gujarat, Tripura, Meghalaya, Nagaland, Karnataka, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Mizoram, Rajasthan & Telangana. He further stated that the two major rolls of election in India are EVM & VVPAT and the Electoral Roll and the two broad pillars of election house are Legal & Constitutional and Managerial & Administrative aspects. He informed that though 600 people are directly employed at the Commission in Delhi but at the time of elections, more than 1.2 million people work collectively for conducting elections in India.

He highlighted that the Commission has taken up several new initiatives in the recent past, such as use of State owned Electronic Media for broadcast/telecast by Political parties, checking criminalization of politics, computerization of electoral rolls, providing electors with Identity Cards, simplifying the procedures for maintenance of accounts and filling of the same by candidates and a variety of measures for strict compliance of Model Code of Conduct for providing a level playing field to contestants during the elections.

He also stated that Electronic Voting Machines have been developed to facilitate easy polling and counting and these machines provide full safeguards for ensuring secrecy of ballot and against tampering of machines apart from ensuring rapidity of poll and instantaneous results. He also stated that the abuse of 'Money Power' in election entails certain risks like uneven playing field, lack of fair competition, political exclusion of certain sectors, co-opted politicians under campaign debts and tainted governance with rule of law undermined. According to him, curbing the use of money power during election process is a major challenge in view of its inherent complexities involved.

He also mentioned that with the emergence of use of social media for election campaigning and also certain violations of the Electoral Law in the social media, regulation of social media has become important in the interest of transparency and level playing field. He said that the Commission has been suggesting to the Government that there should be a similar prohibition or restriction on opinion polls as there could be several manipulated opinion polls which could impact the voting pattern.

Chief Guest, Dr. Asgar Hassan Samoon, Principal Secretary, J&K stated that Livestock is an emerging sector in the economy of J&K and plays an important role in the socio-economic development of the State. He further added that despite making it a mass campaign in the last few years, the State has failed to emerge as a self-sufficient market for basic requirements of poultry, mutton, eggs and milk.

Mr. Bilal Kawoosa, Chairman, State Expert Committee for MSME, Agriculture & Allied Agriculture mentioned that the Chamber has provided this unified platform for value addition & creating employment avenues. He also added that industry sustains on two factors- raw material and demand for the product. Mr. Kawoosa said that the biggest impediments in the sector are Poultry rates and Private Public Partnership Hatcheries need to be created for which government support is required.

Mr. Bilal Ahmed Bhat, Director, Industries & Commerce, Kashmir highlighted the need to have a single window act as all these segments are linked and connected to one another.

Dr. Tahir Beigh, Joint Director, Research Animal Husbandry stated that the focus has been upon the rearing part while issues related to feed & fodder were ignored. As per the Statistics provided, daily requirement of the feed & fodder at the district level is about Rs. 9 Lakhs/day. Also feed being a major component, fodder banks are needed so that feed & fodder requirements are provided as incentives to producers.

Dr. Riyaz Ahmed, Joint Director, Poultry cum LPP in his presentation said that the Poultry sector has completely changed. Backyard Poultry was a part and parcel of life, but now is wholly dependent upon broiler Chickens.

Dr. Mehraj U Din Rather, (KAS), Director, Sheep Husbandry Dept. Kashmir said that the Agriculture Commission of India developed a Wool Centric Policy. The State's economy is now shifting its focus from Wool Centric Policy to Sheep Centric Policy and in the next five years, J&K will be a self-sufficient state in terms of producing to meet its own demands/ consumption.

Mr. R.N. Pandita, Director, Fisheries Dept. J&K in his presentation said that the scenario of Fisheries in the State has completely changed. The State is producing Brown & Rainbow Trouts. The Department's focus is now shifting towards farming, value addition and developing infrastructure.

Dr. Mohammad Yusuf Chaproo, Director, Animal Husbandry, Kashmir mentioned that the problems, situations, issues & grey areas mentioned above are being addressed, yet we need to support every stakeholder of this industry so that these issues are resolved at the grass root level.

Dr. Asgar Hassan Samoon, (IAS), Principal Secretary, Animal, Sheep Husbandry, Fisheries & Transport Department stated that the vision & mission of the Department should be laid by its stakeholders. He added that a roadmap of this sector should be laid out with main focus on marginal & small farmers/producers.

GeM helps in improving the quality and efficiency of the products and services on offer, particularly the ones sourced from the MSME sector. He further said that MSMEs can bid for market tenders free of cost through the e-Procurement portal which would allow MSMEs to actively participate in various Government Procurement programs.

Mr. Hitesh Popli, Head West Invoice-Mart highlighted that a business needs cash to grow smoothly and the growth of small businesses in India is constrained due to lack of liquid funds. The need of the hour is a solution which lets MSMEs unlock working capital without the hassle of applying for loans and to facilitate this, the Reserve Bank of India has launched TReDS (Trade Receivables Discounting System). The platform is named "Invoice mart", a digital platform which connects MSME suppliers (sellers) and their corporate buyers to multiple financiers which enables sellers to sell their invoices to financiers, thus unlocking working capital quickly, without impacting their relationship with buyers.

Dr. Preet Mohinder Bedi, Head Academia Industry face, Guru Nanak Dev University talked about the importance of linkage between industry and universities.

Mr. D.K Aggarwal, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber highlighted that the State Government is providing incentives



Single-Window Opens for Indian Filmmakers

Filmmakers seem to be happy as this year's Budget has extended the single-window clearance provision to Indian producers, apart from the existing foreign producers. This means that the pre-production period for making films will reduce since the time spent on seeking permissions will come down. This will also play a huge role in boosting tourism in the country. Most of the permissions required from the central and state government agencies are expected to be received from a single online application. Currently, a film takes between 18 and 24 months from script to screen, and a large part of this, almost six months goes into pre- production which constitutes getting permissions from different authorities to allow on location shooting. With the introduction of single- window clearance provision, the pre-production windows are expected to reduce significantly. This will have an impact on the operational cost of the film, and studios will be able to release films faster, keeping the script fresh in case of topical themes.





BUDGET SETS STRONG STRIDES INTO THE FUTURE

Dr. S P Sharma, Chief Economist, PHD Chamber



The budget for 2019-20 with a focus to boost consumption and to help India to become a US \$ 10 trillion economy has opened new avenues for every segment of the Indian economy. While maintaining fiscal prudence path at 3.4% of GDP, the agronomics has become the forefront with a bonanza of Rs. 6000 per year for each of 120 million small farm owners. Along, 30 million middle class will be benefitted by rebate in income tax on income of Rs. 5 lakh per year. Also, the unorganised sector has not left aside by earmarking Rs. 3000 per month as a pension after the age of 60 years.

While this is a boost to consumption let growth of the economy, higher inflationary expectations cannot be ruled out, going forward. The major short term and medium term costs would be Rs. 20,000 crore in FY 2018-19 and Rs. 75,000 crore in FY 2019-20 for direct transfers to farmers; Rs. 18,500 crores for annual tax sops to middle class. However, the election year budget is a dream budget of the Indian economy that would go a long way to give a big push to economic growth trajectory through consumption, agriculture, unorganised sector and middle class.

Increase in investment in one residential house to two residential houses with the benefit of rollover of capital gains tax up to Rs 2 crores, once in a lifetime is a great reform for the housing and construction sector. This would enhance the employment opportunities for the unskilled, semi-skilled and skilled workforce in the country. Also, extension in the period of exemption from levy of tax on notional rent, on unsold inventories, from one year to two years, from the end of the year in which the project is completed is encouraging as it will give an impetus to the real estate sector.

Increase in allocation to Rs. 64,587 crore for capital expenditure in railways would not only modernize the railways but would give an impetus to Make in India and create employment opportunities. Digitalization of one lakh villages in the next five years would enhance speed of the economy and spread awareness of the policy environment at the grassroots level. This will help in the percolation of dynamic policies announced by the government at the village level and push transparency in the system and reduce further corruption in the economy.

The increased allocations for MGNREGA to Rs. 60,000 crore in 2019-20 would enhance rural employment and rural demand and give impetus to rural incomes and reduce the poverty further which would go a long way to uplift the standards of living of masses.

As the focus of the government to

enhance the export growth trajectory and to explore new possibilities for the promotion of exports, fisheries are an area which can be explored. The budget proposal for a separate department of Fisheries would provide sustained and focussed attention to the sector which would improve the standards of living of people employed in the fisheries sector.

Budget is a win-win situation not only for the consumers and producers, but also for the markets. As the focus of the budget is to boost consumption, markets are expected to gain in the long run with enhanced demand in the economy and increased price cost margins of the businesses.

The ten dimensional vision for the next decade really shows the confidence of the government to transform India to the next level with the strong and sustainable growth trajectory. Vision for social infrastructure for a \$10 trillion economy and to provide ease of living is the wellthought reforms for the next 10 years to enhance the human development and standards of living. The other dimensions such as Digital India, Pollution-free India, Rural Industrialization, Cleaning of the rivers, self sufficiency in food, vision of a healthy society among others are inspiring and promising in building confidence of the people.

The other developments such as the government is equally concerned about the national security of India as the defence budget would be crossing Rs 3 lakh crore for the first time in 2019-20. The self-employment schemes including MUDRA, Start-up India and Stand-up India would create employment opportunities as well as harness energy of the youth. Under MUDRA Yojana 15.56 crore loans have been disbursed amounting to Rs. 7,23,000 crore. Ease of doing business for local film producers vis-a-vis a single window clearance mechanism would further boost the entertainment industry and its contribution to GDP growth.

In a nutshell, the trek to a US \$ 10 trillion economy would definitely require a double digit economic growth of which manufacturing sector should grow at least 12% with a support of 5% growth of agriculture and maintaining a trend growth of services sector at around 8 to 9%. At this juncture, the delivery of the announcements would be crucial for the fruitful outcomes at the ground level. Directly and indirectly, budget has focussed to create conducive job environment in India by involving unskilled, semi-skilled and skilled workforce in the productive and promising areas of Indian economy, such as giving impetus to housing and construction sector, opening a new department for the fisheries and boosting consumption to promote growth of manufacturing and then services and finally the enhanced production possibility frontiers in the economy, which will lead to higher, strong and sustainable growth trajectory. The budget has clearly identified the roadmap to become a US\$10 trillion economy.

ndia remained significantly resilient in the post Lehman Era. The trend growth remained benign during the period of 2009-2018 (post ten years) as compared with the period of 1999-2008 (pre ten years) whereas the largest economy, the United States of America experienced a decline in its GDP growth rate and the rising economy, China witnessed a significant fall in its growth rate of post-crisis decade when compared with that of the pre-crisis decade. The fact is that India is now the fastest moving emerging economy in the World economic system and poised to become a USD 10 trillion economy in the next eight years.

This article attempts to analyse the long term growth trend of the top ten leading economies of the world including USA, China, Japan, Germany, UK, India, France, Brazil, Italy and Canada.

Lehman Crisis



It has been over a decade since the Wall Street giant- Lehman Brothers went down, triggering the infamous global financial crisis. September, 2008 was a time of a synchronized global turmoil. Hard-wearing institutions such as Bear Stearns Companies and Lehman Brothers Holdings vanished and even topnotch names such as Morgan Stanley, Goldman Sachs Group and Merrill Lynch & Co. staggered on the edge. The picture was no different in Europe. Famous old financial institutions such as Roval Bank of Scotland, Fortis and Lloyds Banking Group faced a catastrophe. Ever since then, the entire world got into its firm grip. The failure of Lehman Brothers in 2008 stirred global markets. Characterized by contracted liquidity in the global credit and housing market, triggered by the failure of mortgage companies, investment banks, and government institutions which had heavily invested in subprime loans- the US Meltdown of 2008 gradually extended over a period of time and eventually brought the entire world under its grip.

The crisis became truly global because of two main transmission mechanisms: the sudden rise in risk aversion (and financial market volatility) was transmitted worldwide. Moreover, the sudden drop in demand, especially for capital intensive goods, was transmitted rapidly along the global supply chain. Outcomes of the crisis are not just limited to financial and housing markets. Its consequences have spread around the world and affected almost all aspects of people's lives, with several significant socioeconomic impacts such as:

• By incidence of the financial crisis, companies tried to reduce their expenses. So as a solution they reduce the number of their employees, resulting in increasing the unemployment rate.

• The crisis has had both inflationary and deflationary effects in the world. It caused people to have less credit to finance their purchases, so by diminishing trades and decrease in demand, prices come down (deflation). On the other hand, to repel the crisis some governments resorted to excessive quantitative easing i.e., injected money into society, thus increasing inflation rate in some countries.

With none of the biggest economies prospering, there was no obvious engine to pull the world out of its recession, paving the way for a rough recovery. Massive monetary and fiscal stimulus prevented a depression, but the recovery has remained feeble. GDP is still below its pre-crisis peak in all the leading economies. Even after a decade of the financial crisis, its multiplier effects are still rippling through the world economy.

While many economies saw output losses relative to pre-crisis trends, the post-crisis experience varied across countries. Advanced economies and commodity-exporting low income developing countries were harder hit than others. Some countries suffered severe banking crises as part of the global financial panic, while others saw weaker activity in advanced economies reverberated globally through trade and financial channels. According to the World Economic Outlook of IMF (October, 2018), among the economies that experienced a banking crisis in 2007–08, about 85 percent are still operating at output levels below pre-crisis trends.

India in the World Ecosystem

The US Meltdown of 2008 gradually extended over a period of time and eventually brought the entire world under its grip. Before USA could recover, Europe was in the crisis; before Europe could come out of the slowdown, Japan got affected by it; before Japanese economy could pick up, China faced a slowdown; before China could pull through the financial catastrophe, India adopted two revolutionary reforms of demonetization and GST. Unlike many other developing countries of the world, India has shown considerable resilience to the global economic crisis by maintaining one of the highest growth rates in the world.

India's growth rate has increased from 6.9% (average) in the pre-Lehman crisis era (1999-2008) to 7.4% (average) in the post-Lehman crisis era (2009-2018). Long-term growth trend of the Indian economy has been very strongly supported as a result of the dynamic policy environment by the government and calibrated measures undertaken by the financial institutions. The economic growth rates of the other leading economies have declined during the same time period. However, the extent of decline in growth rate is a matter of their resilience, how each leading economy has performed on the basis of the parameter of their GDP growth rates.

When comparing GDP growth rate across the pre-Lehman and Post-Lehman decade, it can be observed that India is the only country whose GDP growth rate has increased in the post-Lehman period, with the average GDP Growth rate at 6.9% from 1999 to 2008 to 7.4% between 2009 and 2018. All other nine countries have experienced a fall in their economic growth rate due to the financial crisis of 2008. China's growth rate has been consistently the highest among the top 10 economies in both the eras at 10.1% in the pre-crisis period and at 7.9% in the post crisis period, followed by India. In both the periods, Indian economy moved with the second highest rate of growth, after China. On the other hand, USA, UK and France have experienced a fall in their GDP growth rate when compared across the two eras.

Over the years, there have been persistent supply-side shifts in the factors of production across all the advanced and emerging economies. Sluggish Investment across the world led to slow economic recovery due to the shortfalls in the capital stock and slower technology adoption.

China's economy has experienced major structural shifts that span the 2008 crisis and an associated transition to slower, albeit still-robust, growth. In the post-crisis decade of 2009-2018, though Chinese economy has grown by 7.9% (average) but when compared to the precrisis decade of 1999-2008, it has shown a weak resilience with a 2.2% decline in its economic growth rate. Further, as per the IMF database, the size of the Chinese economy has increased tremendously from US\$ 4.6 trillion (year 2007) to US\$ 13.5 trillion (year 2017), but India, surpassing China, has exhibited the highest degree of resilience to the global turmoil of 2008. On similar lines, as per the World Economic Outlook of IMF (October 2018), in the United States, a slowdown in total productivity growth that predates the 2008 crisis has contributed to its lower potential growth over time.

India is not only one of the fastest moving economy in the world ecosystem, but over the years, it has also grown from strength to strength. India is the only country whose economic growth rate has increased whereas the other leading economies have witnessed a fall



in their economic growth rates. In terms of resilience of the GDP growth rate to the financial crisis of 2008, it can be observed that after India, Germany and Japanese economies are strongly resilient with a 0.2% decline in each of their respective economic growth rates whereas Brazil has shown the lowest level of resilience with a fall of 2.3% in its economic growth rate.

Way forward

Several countries took unprecedented and exceptional policy actions to support their economies after the 2008 financial meltdown. These actions-specifically, quasi-fiscal measures to support the financial sector, including bank guarantees and capital injections-helped temper postcrisis output losses. The extraordinary policy actions to prevent a second Great Depression have had important side effects. The extended period of ultralow interest rates in advanced economies has contributed to the buildup of financial vulnerabilities. And the large accumulation of public debt and erosion of fiscal buffers in many economies point to the urgency of rebuilding those defenses to prepare for the next downturn. The ability of each economy to respond to the next crisis depends crucially on addressing such side effects of the exceptional policy efforts of the last ten years.

Specifically, for India, the dynamic policy environment during the past few years has paved the way for the Indian economy to achieve a double digit growth rate in the coming years. Despite the challenges at the domestic front and from the global economic environment, India's long term trend exhibits a stable and resilient economic growth. Our Budget for 2019-20 has already envisaged a rise in the size of Indian economy to USD 10 trillion in the next eight years. Indian growth story is expected to be a mass movement through the collective efforts from all the sectors, with a broad-based balanced development across all regions and states, by bridging the gap between public and private sector performance. Going ahead, a constant focus on reforms in agriculture sector, continuous policy facilitation to MSMEs and improvement in export infrastructure in terms of logistics and procedures would go a long way to foster a strong and sustainable growth trajectory in the coming times.



s we have witnessed over the last few decades, due to massive urbanization, increasing income levels and changing demographics, there has been increasing pressure on transportation, housing, land, and other urban services to accommodate the future population. The government estimated the total urban housing shortage at 18.78 million units in the 12th year plan (The Technical Group on Urban Housing, 2011). Within these 18.78 million units, the housing shortage amongst the Economically Weaker Section (EWS) and the Lower Income Group (LIG) is extraordinarily high with a 96% share of the total shortage. According to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation (MHUPA), EWS and LIG typically have annual housing income ceilings of INR 100,000 and INR 100,000-200,000 respectively. To meet this housing shortage, the government estimated at least 16.29 million new affordable housing units were needed, whereas 12.67 million houses were needed to decongest existing homes with undesirably high occupancy.

Realizing this problem, Affordable housing has taken a centre stage in the National Agenda of the Government. The Government's commitment to have housing for all by 2022 is the vision which presents dramatically different opportunities and requirements in front of the stakeholders and realizing this dream can be a step towards building a brighter India. This Transformational Scheme of "Housing for All by 2022" was launched by Government of India on 17th June 2015 under Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojana (PMAY) with an aim to provide affordable housing to urban poor.

Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojna (PMAY)- Housing for All 2022

While efforts to provide low-cost housing have been made for many years, the PMAY launched in 2015 provides a fresh impetus. The PMAY-Urban (PMAY-U) subsumes all the previous urban housing schemes and aims at 'Housing for All' to be achieved by the year 2022. Housing shortage of 20 million is envisaged to be addressed through the PMAY-U.

The mission has four components:

A- In-situ slum redevelopment (ISSR):

This uses land as a resource. The scheme aims to provide houses to eligible slum dwellers by redeveloping the existing slums on public/ private land. A grant of INR 1 lac per house is provided by the central government to the planning and implementing authorities of the states/UTs under this scheme.

B- Affordable housing in partnership (AHP):

This aims to provide financial assistance to private developers to boost private participation in affordable housing projects; central assistance is provided at the rate of INR 1.5 lac per EWS house in private projects where at least 35% of the houses are constructed for the EWS category.

C- Credit-linked subsidy scheme (CLSS):

This scheme facilitates easy institutional credit to EWS, LIG and MIG

households for the purchase of homes with interest subsidy credited upfront to the borrower's account routed through primary lending institutions (PLIs). This effectively reduces housing loan and equated monthly instalments (EMI).

D- Beneficiary-led construction or enhancement (BLC):

This scheme involves central assistance of INR 1.5 lakh per family for new construction or extension of existing houses for the EWS/ LIG

The Government envisages building affordable pucca houses with water facility, sanitation and electricity supply round-the-clock. Under PMAY, it is proposed to build 2 crore houses for urban poor including Economically Weaker Sections and Low Income Groups in urban areas by the year 2022 through a financial assistance of Rs. 2 trillion (US\$31 billion) from central government. This scheme is converged with other schemes to ensure houses have a toilet, Saubhagya Yojana electricity connection, Ujjwala Yojana LPG gas connection, access to drinking water and Jan Dhan banking facilities, etc.

The scheme aimed for urban areas with following components/options to States/Union Territories and cities:-

- Slum rehabilitation of Slum Dwellers with participation of private developers using land as a resource;
- Promotion of affordable housing for weaker section through credit linked subsidy;
- · Affordable housing in partnership

with Public & Private sectors and

 Subsidy for beneficiary-led individual house construction or enhancement.

Besides this, Government of India has been taking several initiatives through budget to provide housing for all.

Apart from the Infrastructure status to affordable Housing, there is another push to low cost housing through Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY). Under the scheme, government has announced an interest rate of only 4 per cent would be charged on loans above Rs 9 lakh and 3 per cent on amount above Rs 12 lakh. However, there is ambiguity whether those not falling under EWS (Economically Weaker Section) or the LIG (Low Income Group) segments would be the beneficiaries. The government has also extended the time of completion of such projects from 3 years to 5 years. Thus, more projects will now be eligible for profit-linked income tax exemptions. So far, we have seen limited participation from private developers in the affordable housing segment despite high demand. Profit-linked exemption along

with the infrastructure status for affordable housing will push developers to undertake more affordable housing projects, thus increasing private player's participation in the sector.


The criteria for low cost / affordable housing has been changed from built-up area of 30 / 60 sq mtrs to carpet area of 30/60 sq mtrs, thus making the low cost - affordable housing segment more lucrative for the builders and also making the segment more attractive for the buyers. With the change in criteria from built-up area to carpet area, the purchasers get more spacious homes and the builder is able to market the property to a larger segment of buyers. The 30 sqm limit will apply only in case of municipal limits of 4 metropolitan cities while for the rest of the country including the peripheral areas of metros, limit of 60 sqm will apply.

Affordable housing finance is estimated to be a 6 lakh crore business opportunity by 2022, by when the Government seeks to achieve housing for all citizens. Due to the big push from PMAY to create housing for all, a new group of Affordable Housing Finance Companies has emerged, which is now serving low-income, urban informal customers using an innovation pioneered in India-field-based credit assessment. These companies have grown from a combined loan book of close to Rs.1,000 crores (\$200 million) in March 2013 to over Rs.27,000 crores, in December 2017, at an average loan ticket size of Rs.9.3 lakhs and have facilitated the ownership of more than 230,000 affordable homes. Access to home ownership for lowincome households has freed up existing rental stock in urban areas and created employment opportunities for informal and unskilled workers. Statistics show a sharp increase in loan disbursements and launching of new projects in the segment in 2016-17. The Credit linked subsidy scheme has proved to be quite effective in improving the affordability factor among the Economically Weaker Section.

Finally, with all these initiatives of Government of India to give shelter to all by 2022, we hope there will be tremendous boost to GDP as the housing sector growth is directly related to around 265 other ancillary Industries.

Reimbursable Advisory Service Launched on Public Transport Services

Union Minister for Road Transport & Highways, Shipping and Water Resources, River Development and Ganga Rejuvenation Mr. Nitin Gadkari was quoted to have said that reforms are being brought-in to optimize capacity utilization and to reduce congestion on roads as well as higher levels of road safety and service standards in the country. Speaking at the conclusion of a legal contract for procurement of the Reimbursable Advisory Services (RAS) from World Bank for enhancing the effectiveness and efficiency of the Public Transport Sector in New Delhi on January 31,2019, he said that the States need to improve their public transport strategy especially in urban areas. Mr. Gadkari said the future belongs to electric and bio- fuel based transport vehicles as these are cost effective, pollution free and cut import bill on petroleum products. He suggested that using Ethanol and Methanol is also a good option and cited the example of Nagpur, where bio-CNG is being produced from fruit and mutton waste. For intercity transport, he advocated adopting broad-gauge metro, for which rolling stock is readily available.



TOURISM CANVAS: Hill Stations of the North East

The North Eastern Region is bestowed with varied natural beauty in abundance and is home to a large number of hill stations having immense tourism potential. These hill stations are far away from the hustle bustle and pollution of the rest of India. Hill stations of the North-east encompass a serene environment depicting rich and diverse indigenous culture offering experiences of a lifetime. Most of the hill stations have remained largely unexplored as tourism destinations. Here we enumerate some of the famous hill stations of this region:

GANGTOK

G angtok, the capital of Sikkim is a unique hill resort of northeast India situated at an altitude of 1700 mts. The town is famous for its scenic beauty and spectacular views of the Kanchenjunga mountain and Himalayan Mountains. Tsuglhakhang Temple situated on the ridge is an important tourist destination. A museum within the Namgyal Institute of Tibetology situated at Deorali includes a great collection of ancient statues and artifacts of Tibetan works. The Do-Drul Chorten is a white pagoda with prayer wheels all around surrounded by dormitories for young monks with butter lamp galleries. The Chorten is itself capped by a glided tower its rising steps signifying the 13 steps to attain nirvana. The picturesque Nathu La situated on the silk route at the Indo-China border also offers the mesmerizing view of Chumbi valley of Tibet. A winding road from Nathula Pass leads to the beautiful Tsomgo Lake, a glacial lake encircled with





high mountain peaks and flowery meadows. The Menmecho Lake is covered by snow covered mountains surrounding the Jelep La pass. Kyongnosla Alpine Sanctuary and Zuluk Wildlife Sanctuary are well known, stocked with rich and rare species of flora and fauna.

PELLING

small Hamlet in West Sikkim is a popular hill station standing on top of a ridge. Tourists can get stunning views of Kanchenjunga Mountain range. Other landmarks include Pemayangtse Monastery and Sangachoeling, the second oldest gompa in Sikkim. Rabdentse, three kms away from Pelling is the second capital of Sikkim. Sangachoeling, known as the place of secret spells is the second oldest monastery in Sikkim. Khecheopalri Lake stands at a height of 6,400 feet offering a visual treat during the annual Khecheopalri Mela.



achen, the most beautiful towns in North Sikkim is an attractive tourist spot, well known for its Lachung monastery. Lachen is endowed with natural beauty, pineclad mountains & peaks and popular places for Buddhist pilgrims and tourists. The town is famous for the gateway to the sacred Guru Dongmar and Tso Lhamu lakes. Lachen provides expeditions to Chopta Valley, Green Lake, Cho-lamu, Guru Dongmar Lake and Shingba Rhododendron Sanctuary.





HAFLONG

aflong Hill, the only hill station in Assam located in Dima Hasao district is known as White Ant Hillock, with blue hills, scenic rivers and rumbling waterfalls having a tribal population. The Haflong Lake is great for boating. Jatinga close by is known for its mysterious bird's suicide. Thuruk, 38 kms from Haflong is known as a trekker's paradise whereas the town of Maibang with its picturesque landscape is a 50 kms drive from Haflong. The Ramchandi Temple is the most famous attraction of Maibang. Other places surrounding Haflong are Umrangso Valley comprising of a hot water spring and Tea estates. Panimoor, a beautiful place comprises of surging waterfall formed by river Kopili, a sacred site for Dimasa tribe.





TAWANG

awang is a hill town situated in the northwestern part of Arunachal Pradesh. The Sela Pass is the highest motorable pass in the Northeast. Important tourist sites include the Jaswantgarh War Memorial in memory of Jaswant Singh Rawat martyred during the Indo-China war and Tawang Gompa- largest monastery in India situated at a picturesque location on top of a hill surrounded by a valley on one side and a sharp cliff face on the other. Tawang being the birthplace of the sixth Dalai Lama is also home to a number of Buddhist shrines that includes Urgelling Gompa, Sange Ryabgelling Shrine, Khinme Monastery, Singshur Nunnery as well as the Taktsang Gompa. Other places to visit are Tawang War Memorial and Nuranang Falls.

ZIRO

Ziro is a quaint old town in Arunachal Pradesh, home to Apa Tani tribe and famous for its pine hills and rice fields. The town has been shortlisted by UNESCO as a World Heritage site. Ziro Valley mesmerizes everyone with its natural charm peppered with sprawling rice fields, quaint villages and rolling green hills. Talley Valley Wildlife Sanctuary, a tourist destination is home to various endangered species. The Meghna Cave Temple is 5000 years old and offers a stunning view of the Ziro Valley. Other places for sightseeing include the high altitude Tarin Fish Farm, Daporijo, camping destination, Hapoli, centre of all the town's activities, Ziro Puto and Dolo Mando hillocks.





KOHIMA

Cohima, the capital city is a perfect hill station with serpentine roads. The Catholic Cathedral at Aradura Hill is home to the biggest wooden cross in the country. The Nagaland State Museum is a one-stop treasure trove offering a glimpse of Naga culture. The Zoological Park abounds in rich flora and fauna of Nagaland. The War Cemetery situated at the middle of Kohima is a place of historical outing. Ruzaphema, with colorful bazaars and a wide range of tribal handicrafts are exquisite and unique in their own way. The terraced field of Khonoma village produces 20 types of paddy, presenting a beautiful view.

AIZAWL

izawl, the largest city as well as the capital of the state of Mizoram stands like a citadel perched on gorgeous ridges, 3715 feet above sea level. The city is situated on a ridge flanged with the Tlawng river valley to its west and the Tuirial river valley to its east. Aizawl is the storehouse of all important Government offices, State Assembly House and Civil Secretariat. Important tourist sites include Berawtlang Tourist Complex, Zoological Garden and Mizoram state museum. K V Paradise is considered as the modern Taj Mahal of Aizawl is also worth a visit. A drive to Durtlang Hills with verdant slopes offers a picturesque view of the city. Bung and Paikhai are beautiful picnic spots near Aizawl..





SHILLONG

Shillong known as the 'Scotland of the East' is the capital of Meghalaya which derives its name from Lei Shyllong, an idol worshipped at the Shillong Peak. The hill station is known for its picturesque sights with numerous waterfalls, exciting mountain peaks, crystal clear lakes and golf courses. Shillong is also famous as the music capital of India, with musical events throughout the year. The Police Bazaar is the main attraction of Shillong where shops sell exquisite artifacts and handicrafts along with eclectic clothing. The Ward's Lake, a horseshoe-shaped lake is an important landmark of Shillong. Lady Hydari Park is known for its well kept garden, zoo, deer park and a museum. Other places to visit are Spread Eagle Falls, Laitlum Canyons and bamboo plantations.



SOHRA

Solver a popularly known as Cherrapunjee is the wettest place on earth, set upon a plateau on the southern slopes of the state. Heavy monsoon rains over these mountains makes the region one of the rarest bio-diverse vegetations in the world. The prominent place to visit is Mawkdok Dympep Valley View, located in the midst of a deep gorge, with hills rising on either sides. Other places of tourist attractions include Thangkharang Park, Seven Sisters Falls, Nohkalikai Falls, Dainthlen Falls, Eco Park, Nongsawlia, Ka Khoh Ramhah, Kynrem Falls, The Lawshynna Cave and Mawsmai Cave which is an only fully lit cave.

Policy Pronouncements and Developments

GOI sets up Indian Institute of Skills

he Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship has approved the proposal to set up Indian Institute of Skills (IISs) in three locations viz. Kanpur, Mumbai and Ahmedabad on Not-for-profit Public Private Partnership basis. The IISs are conceptualized with an objective to provide advanced skills in highly specialized areas - defence, aerospace, oil & gas and other emerging business domains - to develop highly skilled technical manpower to meet the demands of organizations that are currently operating and likely to set up their production/ manufacturing & business facilities in India. The government will provide access to its land to the private partners through a licence. The licence would stipulate, inter alia, the expectations from the private partner in terms of performance outcomes such as a minimum of 5000 students passing out every year five years after commencement of operations, with campus placement of at least 70 percent of the trainees on a monthly salary/income level based on the current levels of wages for comparative positions.

India takes over operations of part of Chabahar Port in Iran

The GOI took over the operations of a part of Shahid Beheshti Port, Chabahar in Iran during the Chabahar Trilateral Agreement meeting held there on December 24, 2018. The heads of Indian, Iranian and Afghanistan delegation jointly inaugurated the office of the Indian SPV - India Ports Global Chabahar Free Zone (IPGCFZ), at Chabahar.

Formulation of a new Labour Code

The Labour Ministry has prepared a Labour Code on Industrial Relations, by simplifying, amalgamating and rationalizing the relevant provisions of the following three Labour Laws:- The Industrial Disputes Act, 1947; The Trade Unions Act, 1926 and The Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1946. At present, the Code is at pre-legislative Stage.

Impact of Trade Agreements

Some industry associations including those relating to steel have expressed concerns on imports under bilateral free trade agreements with Japan, Korea and ASEAN. Steel imports from these countries include high grade steel, which are not manufactured domestically. The volume of trade, including both exports and imports with these countries has increased since the signing of the bilateral trade agreements. The domestic industry has benefited from the trade agreements due to cheaper import of raw materials and intermediates from these countries for stimulating value added domestic manufacturing. The trade agreements have adequate trade remedial provisions for dealing with certain surges in imports that might threaten domestic industry.

Benefits of RCEP Agreement

he Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP), which is a proposed Free Trade Agreement between ten ASEAN member states and their six Free Trade Agreement (FTA) partners namely India, Australia, China, Japan, New Zealand and Republic of Korea, is expected to provide market access for India's goods and services, exports and encourage greater investments and technology into India. It would also facilitate India's MSMEs to effectively integrate into the regional value and supply chains. On the other hand, India is not a member of the Asia-Pacific Economic Co-operation which is a grouping of twenty-one countries in the Asia Pacific region with an aim to deepen and strengthen economic and technological cooperation amongst APEC member countries.

Amalgamation of Vijaya, Dena and Bank of Baroda

he Union Cabinet has approved the scheme for amalgamating Bank of Baroda, Vijaya Bank and Dena Bank, with Bank of Baroda as the transferee bank and Vijava Bank and Dena Bank as transferor banks which will come into effect on April1, 2019. The amalgamation will be the firstever three-way consolidation of banks in India, with the amalgamated bank being India's second largest Public Sector Bank. The amalgamation will help create a strong globally competitive bank with economies of scale and enable realization of wide-ranging synergies. Leveraging of networks, lowcost deposits and subsidiaries of the three banks has the potential of yielding significant synergies for positioning the consolidated entity for substantial rise in customer base, market reach, operational efficiency, wider range of products and services and improved access for customers. The Board of the transferee bank shall ensure that the interests of all transferring employees and officers of the transferor bank are protected.

Myanmar offers visa on arrival for Indian nationals

The Myanmar government has introduced new regulations to facilitate easier access for tourists to visit the country. Indian nationals can now enter Myanmar with visa-on-arrival (VOA) at Yangon, Mandalay and Nay Pyi Taw International Airports. The fee for the visa on arrival is 50 USD.

Tourism Malaysia and Malindo Air launch 'Malaysia Fantastic Deals'

Tourism Malaysia, along with Malindo Air has launched 'Malaysia Fantastic Deals' package. The campaign has been designed in partnership with several popular hotels and a restaurant in Malaysia to offer a total of five packages catered specifically to the Indian market. The package includes 10 percent discount on Malindo Air fares from Chennai, Delhi, Mumbia and Kolkata. The partner hotels include Sunway Hotel & Resorts, Meritus Pelangi Beach Resort and Spa Langkawi, Lexis Hotel & Group and Atmosphere 360 Revolving Restaurant KL Tower.

More hotels in Russia become 'India Friendly'

A new batch of hotels in Moscow and Saint Petersburg became 'India Friendly' in 2018 to encourage more Indians to visit the destination. The 'India Friendly' programme has been conceived and operationalised by Russian Information Centre (RIC) that identified the need to welcome Indian tourists. The hotels include Azimut Hotel Olympic, Moscow, Radisson Royal, St Petersburg and Alfa Izmailovo, Moscow.

Space Activities Bill

The Government has invited suggestions from the public/stakeholders regarding the draft Space Activities Bill, 2017. The objective of the Space Bill is to facilitate the overall growth of space activities in India with higher order of participation of public/nongovernmental/private sector stakeholders. The Bill provides for establishment of a regulatory mechanism through an appropriate body, by the government for the purpose of authorization and licensing of space activities. The provision on liability for damages caused by space activities of licensee, provides for a risk sharing mechanism, by which the government may determine the quantum of liability to be borne by the licensee.

GOI and ADB sign \$31 Mn Agreement to develop Tourism and boost Jobs in Tamil Nadu

The GOI and the Asian Development Bank (ADB) signed in New Delhi a Loan Agreement for US\$ 31 million to build-up the Tamil Nadu's State Tourism Industry and boost visitor arrivals. The Project is expected to improve the tourism infrastructure in Tamil Nadu and also help the State in preserving the natural and cultural heritage. The project would boost economic opportunities for the local people and will generate extra jobs in Tamil Nadu, especially through skills training and community-based activities targeting the poor and women. The project will support the conservation and restoration of eight heritage monuments, one museum, three temples, and a pond. It will build various facilities at the sites, including information centers, rest centers, and toilet blocks, with facilities served by solar-powered lighting and energy efficient lighting. The total cost of the project is \$44.04 million, of which the government will provide \$13.04 million. The completion date is around June 2020.

Cabinet approves Agriculture Export Policy 2018

he Cabinet has approved the Agriculture Export Policy 2018, aimed to double the income of farmers by 2022. Exports of agricultural products would play a pivotal role in achieving this goal and in order to provide an impetus to them, the Agriculture Export Policy will aim to double agricultural exports and integrate Indian farmers and agricultural products with global value chains. The Cabinet has also approved the proposal for establishment of a monitoring framework at the Centre, with Commerce as the nodal department and representation from various ministries. departments, agencies, and representatives of concerned state governments, to oversee the implementation of the new policy.

Ease of Doing Agri-Business Index

The Government has been reorienting the agriculture sector by focusing on an income-centeredness approach which focuses on achieving high productivity, reduced cost of cultivation and remunerative price on the produce, with a view to earn higher profits from farming. To ensure that reforms are implemented at a desired pace by all States/UTs, the government decided to rank the States through an Index i.e. Ease of Doing Agri-Business. A concept note along with parameters for developing an Index has been circulated to all States/UTs inviting their views. The concept is to consider farming not solely as a production oriented activity carried out to achieve food security, but as a business activity carried out by the farmer as an entrepreneur. Agriculture being a State subject, state governments undertake development of perspective plans and ensures effective implementation of the programmes. The government supplements the efforts of the state governments through various Schemes/ Programmes. The index will obviously help in fostering agriculture among states by promoting a competitive spirit amongst the States.

Promoting IPR in Defence Sector

everal Ordnance Factories and Defence Public Sector Undertakings (DPSUs have been carrying out innovative research on the development of certain materials, components / sub-assemblies / assemblies leading to performance upgradation of the existing system / platforms. With the primary objective to boost Intellectual Property culture, vital for encouraging inhouse Research & Development in such organizations, an Intellectual Property Rights Facilitation (IPF) Cell was established under the Department of Defence Production in April, 2018. As part of this initiative, Department of Defence Production launched the "Mission Raksha Gyan Shakti" in November, 2018 to encourage DPSUs Ordnance Factory Board to boost IPR culture in their organizations to promote self-reliance in defence sector. During the period July to December 2018, 304 IPRs were filed and 8838 personnel have been trained for this purpose.

SEBI eases norms for clubbing investment limits by FPIs

Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) recently approved a series of measures that range from easier rules for clubbing foreign portfolio investment limits to allowing mutual funds to segregate illiquid and distressed assets. Under the new norm, clubbing of investment limit for FPIs will be on the basis of common ownership of more than 50 percent or common control. The clubbing would not be applicable to entities having common control, if the FPIs are appropriately regulated public retail funds. Public retail funds include insurance companies, pension funds, mutual funds and unit trusts to open retail subscriptions. SEBI has also allowed mutual funds to create segregated portfolios of debt and money market instruments, subject to various safeguards. This facility will be available to mutual funds based on credit events.

Government Unveils vision for the Next Decade

The government unveiled its vision for the next decade in the 2020-30, listing thereby ten most important dimensions in 2030. With this comprehensive tendimensional Vision. The government will create an India where poverty, malnutrition, littering and illiteracy would be a matter of the past. India would be a modern, technology driven, high growth, equitable and transparent society. The dimensions of Vision-2030 outlined in the budget are as follows:

- To create physical and social infrastructure for ten trillion dollar economy and to provide ease of living.
- Digital India led by the youths with innumberable start-ups and million of jobs.
- To make India pollution free by focusing on Electrical Vehicles and renewables.
- Rural industrailisation using modern technologies to generate employment.
- Clean rivers, with safe drinking water to all Indians and efficient use of water in irrigation using micro-irrigation techniques.
- Besides scaling up Sagarmala, India's coastline and ocean waters will power development
- Through our space programme Gaganyaan, India becoming the launchpad of satellites for the World
- Self sufficiency in food production and producing food in the most organic way.
- A healthy India by 2030 and a distress free health care and wellness system for all.
- Employees working with elected Government, transforming India into Minimum Government Maximum Governance nation.

GOI's Anti-black money measures

The government in its 2019 budget disclosed that anti-black money measures during the last four and half years in the form of Black Money Law, the Fugitive Criminal Offenders Act, and Demonetisation, have brought undisclosed income of about Rs 1,30,000 crore to tax. These measures have also led to seizure and attachment of assets worth approximately Rs 50,000 crore, and compelled holders of large cash currency to disclose their source of earnings. During this period, Benami assets worth Rs 1,600 crore were attached.



Workshop on Information Security Management System in Industries - Cyber Crime

PHD-KAS and Madhya Pradesh Committee of PHD Chamber organized a workshop on 'Information Security Management System in Industries -Cyber Crime' on December 5, 2018 at Bhopal with the objective to promote safe use of computer applications and create awareness on cyber related issues (Computer and Internet uses, protection against Cyber Crime & Cyber Security and IT operations with rules and laws).

Mr. Kunal Giani, Director, Sarva Foams and Chairman, Industry Affairs Committee, MP State Chapter, PHD Chamber stated that as industries adopt advanced technologies, they are facing threats and challenges and thus need to protect their data and information from frauds and hackers.

Mr. Rajiv Kumar, Dy. General Manager, State Bank of India said that customers should be alert about their banking transactions and must use safe and secure net-banking practices and must immediately alert banks about unwanted transactions. State Bank of India has launched an app 'Quick' to 'switch off' and 'switch on' debit cards so that customers can prevent unwanted transactions.

Mr. Sudhir Agrawal, SP-Cyber Cell and Mr. LPS Bhadouriya, Inspector, Cyber Cell, Madhya Pradesh Police focused on the role of Cyber police to provide

protection from cyber crimes whether the crime is financial or general in nature. Police acts only on the information provided by the victim, banks and telecom companies to search the fraudsters, which is totally unknown. He suggested public to use strong passwords and not respond to messages or emails that are obscene, belligerent or threatening. The cyber police are always available to help public against every fraud.

Mr. Yashdeep Chaturvedi, CEO, Cyber Law Pioneers (Cyber Law Expert) talked about legal aspects of cyber security and cyber crimes. He suggested that industries must adopt Information Security Management Systems to protect their data/information and prevent them from cyber frauds or hackers. Industries can opt for ISO 27001 but they can also choose cost effective Information Security Management System by assessing gap analysis according to their nature of operations and size of unit, which needs auditing by a certified third party agency.

PHDRDF SKILL DEVELOPMENT

HDRDF has been undertaking skill development programs with various corporate organizations with an aim to enable the underprivileged youth to be economically independent. These programs include training in: stitching & tailoring, beauty culture, computer literacy including tally software, spoken English language and soft skills.

A. PHDRDF- Donaldson India Filter Systems Private Limited

Donaldson Filters India Pvt Ltd and PHD Rural Development Foundation Donaldson Skill Development are running a Skill Development Centre since last three years in village Mohammadpur Gurjar in Sohna block of Gurugram district. Training in two courses, Stitching & tailoring and Beauty culture are being provided to the ladies and adolescent girls at Mohahammadpur Gurjar and other 6-7 nearby villages i.e. Sohna Dhani, Hariyahera, Raiseena, Samp ki Nangli etc. Two new batches consisting of 20 students in each course were started in January 2019. These batches will be completed in June 2019.

B. PHDRDF-TCI Foundation

PHDRDF and TCI Foundation have partnered for the project titled 'Enterprise Development - Low Cost Sanitary Napkin Production Enterprise by Women Self Help Group' which aims to address the dual purpose of economic empowerment for women and provide low-cost sanitary napkins to rural women and adolescent girls in and around Jamhar Village, Khunti District of Jharkhand. Eight women have been engaged for the project and are enrolled in women SHG model. After training, women have started manufacturing the pads independently. Production of sanitary pads is in full progress. Efforts are under way for promotion of the product.

PHDRDF WATER MANAGEMENT

PHDRDF has been constantly working towards recharging of ground water table through construction of Rain water harvesting structures.

A. PHDRDF-Coca Cola Foundation



PHDRDF and Coca Cola Foundation, Atlanta partnered to promote sustainable Solutions for water resource management with surface water conservation and ground water recharge through construction of six check dams in Indore, Dhar and Hoshangabad districts of Madhya Pradesh. Now, five check dams have been duly completed out of which four dams are filled with water during the monsoon season. Out of these five check dams, Gwal Baba Wala check dam in Hoshangabad was completed in January 2019. Now, only one check dam of this project is under construction and will be completed by March 2019. The villagers are very happy with the amount of water being contained in the dams and have been appreciative of Coca Cola Foundation for supporting the project. These check dams will hold 457,950 cu mts of water and will impact the lives of 7800 people.

B. PHDRDF – HEG Ltd

Out of the partnership of PHDRDF and HEG Ltd, construction of Bainada wala check dam in Alwar, Rajasthan was completed in January 2019. The dam will impact 850 acres of land and will benefit around 2835 people in one village including 350 households. The water holding capacity of this check Dam will be 50,000 cubic meters. The Dam has been duly completed.

C. PHDRDF- SS Kothari Mehta & Co.: Partnership of SS Kothari Mehta & Co. and PHDRDF has continued for more than a decade contributing towards water harvesting projects. Out of this partnership, one more check dam Dantodi Wala in Alwar is being constructed. The check dam will have a water holding capacity of 1,68,000 cubic meters and will benefit 4500 people. The dam is under completion.

D. PHDRDF – **Hero Future Energies Ltd:** PHDRDF and Clean Wind Power, Group Company of Hero future Energies Ltd has come together to construct water harvesting structures in district Pratapgarh of Rajasthan. Two check dams are being constructed in Pratapgarh in the vicinity of their manufacturing unit. These check Dams will benefit around 6027 people in three villages. Out of the two dams, construction of one dam has been completed.

E. PHDRDF – Rotary Club of Delhi, South-Central :The Rotary Club of Delhi, South Central and PHDRDF have come together for construction of three check dams to be constructed in Jaipur, Rajasthan. The check dams are Pagthoda wala, Garh Wala and Bajrangbali Wala. In all, 12360 people will benefit with construction of these check dams. Construction of all three check dams has been initiated and will be completed by February 2019.

F. PHDRDF – **Rotary Club of Delhi, Megapolis:** PHDRDF and Rotary Club of Delhi Megapolis have partnered to construct a check dam 'Kali deh Wal' in Jaipur Rajasthan. The construction of this check dam is in progress. In all, 1648 people of two villages will benefit by this check dam. A team of more than 20 Rotarians is expected to join the field team at site for "ShramDaan" for 2-3 days.

1,777 benami properties attached in last 2 years, says CBDT chief

kew Delhi, December 19 The Income Tax Department is committed to clamp down on benami property transactions and has, in the last two years, attached 1,777 benami properties, a top CBDT official said.

The properties attached include bank accounts and the total value of confiscated properties is about ₹6,500 crore, Sushil Chandra, Chariman, Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT), said,

Inaugurating a conference on 'Tax Laws and Systems in India and Way Forward, organised by the PHD chamber of Commerce and Industry, Chandra assured India Inc that the Govemment was committed to widening the tax base and will ensure that genuine taxpayers are not harassed by tax officials.

Chandra also said CBDT has been collecting digital information of tax payers and have strong channel through which the information of tax payers have been gathered. This information is being matched with the Department's data banks to find the non-filers of returns.

Stating that the Income Tax Department has been taking stringent action against tax evaders, Chandra said the Govemment had last year filed

4,500 prosecution cases against tax evaders as well as the persons who did not file returns in time and about 68 per cent were convicted.

To avoid enforcement action, taxpayers must give right information at the time of filing returns, he said.

On bogus refund claims, Chandra said the Income Tax Department has introduced additional checks to prevent outgo towards bogus refund claims based on fraudulent investment declaration in the returns. Chandra maintained that the Department will resort to non-intrusive mechanisms to widen the tax base.

Of the 6.87 crore returns filed last year, there were 1.06 crore new tax payers. Till date, as many as 6.13 crore returns have been filed by taxpayers this fiscal.

Asserting that tax evasion will not be tolerated, Chandra said foreign assets should be declared in the tax returns failing which prosecution will be initiated.

This year less than 0.5 per cent cases are taken for scrutiny. Till date, refunds have been made to 2.4 crore persons which is 53 per cent higher than last year and amount refunded stood at ₹1,26,000 crore so far.

INDIA INC ON Monday said it hopes for a smooth transition and "an approach acceptable to all" after the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Governor Urjit Patel's resignation, citing liquidity and credit offtake issues in the financial sector.

Patel, who had a run in with the government over autonomy of the central bank, resigned on Monday from his post.

"Any views expressed will be termed political. However, the government has to think about what kind of signals it will send out. If the replacement is by a capable person this will all blow over," PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry President Rajeev Talwar told PTL

In a brief statement, Patel said he had decided to step down with immediate

Industrybody CIIsaid, "The governor has said it is his personal reason. We are looking forward to a smooth transition which leads to good results in terms of an approach that is acceptable to all and good for the economy."

We do not believe that there has been any sort of interference in the functioning of the RBI. Everyone has a right to give their inputs and it should not be seen as interference."

The chamber said there are at present issues in the financial sector, liquidity and credit, although the currency seems to be well under control.

"CII is certain that the resignation of the Governor would be well handled and there would be no major disruption owing to the change at the helm of the regulatory institution," the industry body said.

Assocham Secretary General Uday Kumar Verma said it was "inappropriate" to make a comment on the matter. terming it as an issue between the government and the RBI.


