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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Friends,

We hope this finds you all safe and well.

The one thing that all of us have hoped and prayed for is an end to this relentless viral onslaught. Launched by our Hon'ble Prime Minister, Mr. Modi on 16th January, the nation-wide vaccination drive was inaugurated by Manish Kumar, a 34-year-old sanitation worker who received the first jab at New Delhi's All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS). Soon, AIIMS Director, Dr Randeep Guleria and other healthcare workers around the nation received the vaccine. Ever since it has been a roller coaster with people thronging to receive the shot and others debating its efficacy and safety. In the midst of all this, the Government has retained its calm and encouraged uptake of the preventive shot, reassuring its citizens of the safety and also, communicating changes in guidelines, as recommended by the WHO.

The COVID-19 pandemic has transformed everything from our work life, to our social spheres, and most importantly the nation's policy initiatives. Analysts opine that it will take more than one year for growth and employment to return to pre-COVID-19 levels in most countries depending on the fruition of policy responses. Though global growth remains on an uptrend, the recent spurt in pandemic cases, again, is a cause for worry.

It is heartening to note that post lockdown, India has witnessed robust recovery among the major economies in recent months. PHD Chamber's Economic and Business Momentum (EBM) Index shows that the economy is rebounding to pre-COVID status. As a fall-out of the COVID-19 pandemic, radical reforms have been ushered in across a range of sectors, with well thought-out measures for easing supply and providing liquidity support. There are expectations of a pick-up in government spending, compounded by consumer demand and resumption of economic activities.

Further, as a result of recovering investor sentiment, the economy shows potential to grow by 11% in fiscal year 2021-22. Indicators such as passenger car sales, cement, steel, consumer durables, capital goods, GST collections, FDI, IT, construction, real estate, railway freight traffic, toll collection, e-way bills and SENSEX have shown marvelous improvement. On the international front, despite a moderate decline of 8.8% in FY 2020-21 as compared to FY 2019-2020, India's exports in FY 2021-22 are projected to







reach USD 545 billion from the current USD 487 billion.

Meanwhile, agriculture continues to show robust growth, with many regions recording healthy precipitation and reservoir levels, increasing acreage of Rabi crops, healthy procurement trends and strengthening of rural demand.

The value of new projects was up 13.2 percent in the last quarter of FY 2020-21 (January -March) over the previous quarter of FY 2020-21, especially in money spent on longterm initiatives like setting up factories and building roads and highways. Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways and Minister for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises was quoted to have said "Tremendous progress has been achieved in building national highways across the country. We have achieved a road building pace of 37 km of highways a day." He further added that New India is in the making with infrastructure which will be at par to that in the US and Europe in the next five years.

I must laud India launching the world's biggest vaccination drive against COVID-19 to break the chain of transmission. With over 89 million COVID-19 doses being administered so far, we have one of the world's largest coverage in terms of vaccinated population. We are also providing vaccines to nearly 80 countries that are in need under the "Vaccine Maitree" initiative. Having said this, I would like to comment that it is a matter of concern that the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic is engulfing India with cases re-emerging in some states including Maharashtra, Kerala, Punjab, Karnataka, Gujarat, Tamil Nadu and Delhi. There is a need to hasten the vaccination uptake in all parts of the country covering all sections of the population in order to arrest the spread of COVID pandemic. I also call upon all stakeholders and citizens to defeat the menace of the ongoing pandemic by getting ourselves vaccinated and following social distancing norms.

We appreciate the Ministry of Finance releasing Rs. 45,000 crores as additional devolution to States in FY 2020-21 in the true spirit of fiscal federalism. This sum comes as a respite for State Governments who have been

facing a difficult financial environment due to a shortfall in tax revenue arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Department of Expenditure has also released Rs. 11,830 crores to States under the scheme "Special Assistance to States for Capital Expenditure", as part of the Aatma Nirbhar Bharat package.

I would like to comment that digital penetration in India during the pandemic has scaled a new high. With approximately 1.2 billion wireless subscribers and 750 million internet subscribers, India is the second largest and one of the fastest-growing markets of digital consumers. It is encouraging to note that the Government is working on Aatma Nirbhar Niveshak Mitra portal to digitally facilitate investors. The portal is in testing phase and the final version will be ready for launch by mid May 2021.

The production-linked incentive (PLI) scheme for select industries aims to lead to an output worth US\$ 520 billion in India in the next five years and workforce in which PLI has been implemented will almost double.

I recommend that structural improvements in export and logistics infrastructure, supply chain management and value chains of MSMEs and start-ups and simplification of various export incentive schemes would go a long way to push the growth trajectory of exports to the next level. Big data analytics are pitted as key technologies for assisting firms in streamlining their supplier selection processes and logistics, especially through automation and the internet of things.

Going ahead, demand creation will have a multiplier effect on enhanced production possibilities, expansion of employment in factories and of capital investments leading to overall enhancement of the Indian economy. The increased spending on infrastructure and the IT sector is likely to rejuvenate the aggregate demand in the economy and mitigate the daunting impact of COVID-19. Also, there is a need to lower interest rates for consumers and businesses, lesser compliances for MSMEs vis-à-vis ease of doing business and economize taxes to increase the personal disposable income of the people.

As part of the PHDCCI "International Week," we were delighted to witness participation from more than 40 countries and around 90 plus exhibitors showcasing their products and services in the virtual exhibition area of the Chamber. We were fortunate to have Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways and Minister for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises address our "National Roads & Highways Summit."

I bring to your attention the newly formed 'Quad', of which India is a proud member along with Australia, USA and Japan. The joint commitment to vaccine, climate change and emerging technologies makes us a force for global good. These times are testing for certain, but I am confident under our Prime Minister's vision and support of internal and external policy drivers. we can unitedly emerge victorious and show to the world how a country of India's magnitude in terms of cultural and geographic diversity, can successfully win these multifaceted battles while also supporting other nations.

Last month, I was honored to interact with Mr. Piyush Goyal, Hon'ble Minister of Commerce and Industry, Railways, Consumer Affairs, and Food & Public Distribution as well as Mr. Arvind Kejriwal, Chief Minister and Mr. Manish Sisodia, Deputy CM of NCT of Delhi. The ongoing work is promising to bring about superlative transformation.

I finally rest my pen with Hon'ble Minister, Narendra Modi's reassuring lines "The post COVID-19 will be about relearning, rethinking, re-innovating and re-investing in almost every field" which resonates extremely well with Mahatma Gandhi's quote, "We may stumble and fall, but shall rise again." I am confident that India shall emerge as a leader amongst the world economies and the PHD Chamber, in continuation with this mindset, will always be a pillar of strength for industry and remain in full support and solidarity with the government to create a New India, an economic powerhouse in times soon to come.

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


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NATIONAL ROADS & HIGHWAYS SUMMIT

Committee of PHD Chamber organized a Virtual National Roads and Highways Summit on March 24, 2021. The focus of this summit was on creation of Green Infrastructure in the country. Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Minister of Road Transport and Highways and Minister for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, was the chief guest at the Virtual Summit.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHD Chamber in his welcome address appreciated the steps taken for the Infrastructure Sector in the Union Budget 2021, especially for the development of Roads and Highways infrastructure which would lead to reduction in trade and transaction costs and boost the overall growth of the Indian Economy. He also mentioned that the development of Green Infrastructure and the use of green technologies in roads and highways development would enhance transportation functionality with ecological sustainability.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber applauded the efforts of Mr. Gadkari, Hon'ble Minister for Road Transport and Highways for achieving the record construction of 34 KM / Day in the current financial year despite the disruption caused due to the pandemic.

Mr. Sudhir Hoshing, Chair, Infrastructure Development Committee, PHD Chamber in his industry perspective mentioned that Green Infrastructure needs the engagement of local communities for success and there is a need to make sure that while planning and designing the green highway projects, the emphasis is on maintaining and preserving the biodiversity.





Chief Guest, Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Minister for Road Transport and Highways mentioned that while the economy has been the area of focus for any government, there is also need to develop water, power, transport, and telecom which are vital areas for the industrial development and growth of capital investment; which ultimately leads to employment generation and eradication of poverty. He further emphasized that if India has to become an economic super power and build an AatmaNirbhar economy, it should develop worldclass infrastructure. He illustrated that Green infrastructure in line with the triple bottom line framework of people, planet, and profits is the base for environmental, social and economic sustainability. He further informed that In the current financial year 2020-21, the Ministry of Road, Transport and Highways constructed national highways at the rate of 34 KM / Day and by the end March, this will go up to 40 KM/Day. There is significant work being done for road connectivity with the help of the Golden Quadrilateral project; National Highways Development Programme; Bharatmala Pariyojana; Setu Bharatam program and Sagar Mala project.

Mr. I K Pandey, Special Secretary and Director General (Road Development), Ministry of Road Transport and Highways, highlighted the government initiatives towards creation of Green Infrastructure in terms of Roads & Highways.

BRICS Finance Ministers and Central Bank Governors discussed financial cooperation agenda set by India for 2021 - Global Economic Outlook and Response to COVID-19 pandemic, New Development Bank (NDB) Activities, Social Infrastructure Financing and Use of Digital Technologies, Cooperation on Customs related issues, IMF reforms, Fintech for SMEs and Financial Inclusion, BRICS Rapid Information Security channel and BRICS Bond Fund. On the BRICS priorities and agenda for 2021, Hon'ble Finance Minister Ms. Sitharaman informed that the efforts should be made towards delivering outcomes that reflects the needs and aspirations of BRICS in particular and emerging markets and developing economies in general.

GLOBAL ECONOMIC MONITOR

Global economic prospects have significantly improved in recent months, supported by the gradual deployment of effective vaccines, announcements of additional fiscal support in some countries, and signs that economies are coping better with measures to suppress the virus. According to OECD Economic Outlook, March 2021, the Global GDP growth is projected to be 5.6 per cent in 2021 and 4% in 2022, with global output rising above the pre-pandemic level by mid-2021. Strict containment measures could hold back growth in some countries and service sectors in the near term, while others will benefit from effective public health policies, faster vaccine deployment and strong policy support.

Economic health of manufacturing sector, as implied by manufacturing PMI, showed an increasing trend in major economies in March 2021. The US Manufacturing PMI was revised slightly higher to 59.1 in March of 2021 from a preliminary of 59, pointing to the second-highest growth in factory activity on record. Euro zone Manufacturing PMI was revised higher to 62.5 in March 2021, from a preliminary estimate of 62.4 and well above February's 57.9, suggesting operating conditions improved to the greatest degree in nearly 24 years of survey history. India Manufacturing PMI decreased to 55.4 in March 2021, the lowest since last August, from 57.5 in the previous month. Core inflation in most of the major economies recorded an increasing trend in February 2021 as compared to the previous month. The inflation in United States, Germany, Italy, Japan, China and India edged up, while inflation eased in United Kingdom and South Africa in February 2021. Trade balance in major economies in the global ecosystem recorded an improving trend.

CBDT NOTIFIES NEW INCOME TAX RETURN FORMS FOR AY 2021-22

The Central Board of Direct Taxes has notified Income Tax Return Forms (ITR Forms) for the Assessment Year 2021-22. Keeping in view the ongoing crisis due to COVID pandemic and to facilitate the taxpayers, no significant change have been made to the ITR Forms in comparison to the last year's ITR Forms. ITR Form 1 (Sahaj) and ITR Form 4 (Sugam) are simpler Forms that cater to a large number of small and medium taxpayers. Sahaj can be filed by an individual having income upto Rs. 50 lakh and who receives income from salary, one house property / other sources (interest etc.). Similarly, Sugam can be filed by individuals, Hindu Undivided Families (HUFs) and firms (other than Limited Liability Partnerships (LLPs)) having total income upto Rs. 50 lakh and income from business and profession computed under the presumptive taxation provisions. Individuals and HUFs not having income from business or profession (and not eligible for filing Sahaj) can file ITR-2 while those having income from business or profession can file ITR Form 3. Persons other than individual, HUF and companies i.e. partnership firm, LLP etc. can file ITR Form 5. Companies can file ITR Form 6. Trusts, political parties, charitable institutions etc. claiming exempt income under the Act can file ITR-7. WORLD CONSUMER RIGHTS DAY 2021 TACKLING PLASTIC POLLUTION



he Consumer Affairs & Public Health Committee, PHD Chamber organized a Hybrid Event on March 15, 2021 at PHD House, New Delhi on World Consumer Rights Day 2021. The theme of the event was Tackling Plastic Pollution.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHDCCI in his presidential address deliberated about the plastic pollution which is hampering the environment and the ecosystem. The Government is promoting, supporting, and handholding startups to work for biodegradable products as an alternate solution to plastic. He further stated that some startups are working in a very innovative manner for the existing plastic waste management.

Prof Bejon Kumar Misra, Chairman, Consumer Affairs, PHDCCI urged that the performance link incentives should be given to practice zero use plastic globally. He suggested that commitments should be made in a collective manner and we need to be accountable and transparent to reduce the plastic pollution.



Mr. Peter Rimmele, Resident Representative to India, discussed that the usage of plastics played a major role in degrading the entire ecosystem. Rapid growth in plastic production has increased multifold times. Waste management goals follow a circular economy ideal so our framework is to apply the 3R's in Germany. He stated that Germany has banned the usage of single-use plastics intended to reduce plastic waste. To make this a reality, the idea of growth and consumption needs to

be changed and it needs to start at the level of the consumers, he added.

Guest of Honour, Ms. Leena Nandan, IAS, Secretary, Department of Consumer Affairs, Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food, & Public Distribution mentioned that India is taking a leap forward in terms of regenerating our environment and revisiting our way of doing business. Plasticis a danger to the environment so constant innovation, R&D needs to be done in terms of compostable plastic. She stated that the role of BIS is very





proactive, which has mentioned the quality of various packaging materials and classifications. Ms. Nandan further emphasized that we need to have consumer awareness as well as dialogue with MSMEs which play a pivotal role to contribute towards the environment. The consumer has to demand it and the producer has to deliver it and as a nation, we need to talk and think about how we dispose of our products, she further added.

Technical Session

Mr. Jeevaraj G. Pillai, Joint President - Packaging & New Product Development, UFlex Ltd. apprised about tackling multilayer flexible packaging post-consumer waste pollution. Further giving the data insights, he mentioned that around 50% of the garbage is collected by the Municipality and sent to the Landfill. 10% is segregated and more than 40% is uncollected and littered, which needs to be taken up very seriously. Uflex Ltd. has provided dynamic solutions which does the automated segregation of all wastes. He mentioned that Recycling technologies have been developed under the *ATMA NIRBHAR BHARAT*.

Mr. Kartik Kamal Kumar, Director, Electra Koko Tawa Weld Pvt. Ltd. apprised about their innovative sanitary wending machine which helps in reducing the waste in the environment.

Prof (Dr) N. C. Saha, Former Director-Indian Institute of Packaging & Chairman-Foundation for Innovative Packaging and Sustainability mentioned that consumer behaviour has changed continuously. We need to rethink radically on how we use plastics, creating new circular systems that conserve resources, reduce pollution and promote efficiency.

Mr. Satyendra Kumar, Director, Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, said that India has already embarked on multipronged strategy to tackle the plastic pollution. It needs to be supported by the consumers, technological development, and sensitization of masses that will change the behavioral attitude.

Dr Shobhit Jain, Executive Director (Compliance Strategy/Training), FSSAI mentioned that sustainability needs to be focused, so we need to work

in synchronization with the food businesses to push them to recall their usage of plastic packaging and reusing.

Mr. ShyamJaju, Chairperson, Global Summit COVID-19 elaborated about the proactive efforts taken by India during the pandemic. He requested industry and the consumers to take the issue forward and strategize on the solutions towards the ecosystem.

EASING COMPLIANCE OF BIS CERTIFICATION

he Bureau of Indian Standards organizeda Workshop on "Easing Compliance of BIS Certification" in BIS Headquarters (in physical as well as virtual mode) on March 3, 2021. The main objective of this workshop was to address the issues faced by Industry in 'Implementation of Quality Control Orders (QCOs) issued under BIS Act, 2016' to ensure fair, equitable and consistent outcomes for consumers and to also facilitate timely and effective grievance redress mechanism for Industry and other Associations.

Three Technical Sessions, namely, Standardization, Testing Activities and Certification & Implementation of QCOs were held. Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHD Chamber, participated in the session addressed by Mr. Piyush Goyal, Hon'ble Commerce and Industry Minister.

The inaugural session commenced with the welcome address by Mr. Promod Kumar Tiwari, Director General, BIS. He stated that there


should be ease in regulatory burden and further rationalization for reducing the compliance cost of the Industry. He emphasized that there should be good coordination between industry and BIS.

Mr. Dev Prakash Goyal, Cochairman, MSME Committee, PHD Chamber, said that while making draft specifications for up - gradation or new development, small scale actual users should be involved. He opined that specifications should be made simpler and easier to work. He also moderated Technical Session-2 on 'Testing Activities' and stated that there is a need to increase the number of testing labs in India. He further mentioned that testing costs are too high for MSMEs and should be reduced. In Technical Session-3, he opined that BIS should be more accessible to Industries at their work place through industry associations for better guidance and to understand their limitations in working.

Mr. Piyush Goyal, Hon'ble Commerce and Industry Minister, in the concluding session shared his views regarding significance of MSME sector in India's economic growth as it is a backbone of our Economy. He asserted that the Government after taking inputs from the MSME sector has to comply with international quality standards for the long term sustainability of India's MSME sector. He said that there is lack of liquidity in MSME sector so the need of the hour is to have capital sustainable scheme, especially for the Textile Industry along with DPIIT and BIS to help the MSME sector. Henceforth, the MSME sector should meet International standards and the BIS norms and there should be more frequent interactions between DPIIT, BIS and Industry body.

In the concluding session, Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHD Chamber submitted suggestions on implementation of mandatory BIS certification for various steel and steel products till March 2022; single window for the BIS related queries; less availability of desired raw material quality for meeting the BIS requirements; BIS approval on all imported products; no challan for vehicles transporting a single product across India; increase in number of authorized test labs for certification, among others.







RETAIL 360°- FUTURE OF RETAIL

he Retail Committee of PHD Chamber organized a virtual panel discussion on 'Retail 360°-Future of Retail' on February 19, 2021. The discussion presented by Hindware Appliances and Powered by Doorset Group giving an overview of how the Retail companies will reboot their business models and diversify their strategies to enhance the consumer experience.

Mr. Shashwat Somany, Chairman, Retail Committee, PHD Chamber in his welcome address mentioned the proactive efforts taken by the expert committee for the retail segment. He stated that Business is very unusual at the current time and the retailers want to successfully navigate the winds of change to remain relevant and profitable in this new environment. They need to embrace the fact that they are already omnichannel

organizations and provide a holistic omnichannel experience to their customers, from online marketing to in-store purchases to mobile loyalty apps and home or in-store fulfilment. He added that consumers are going to be a lot more thoughtful regarding which brands they engage with and how they spend their money in 2021. Loyalty dynamics are shifting, both in brands and channels, as people try new products and new ways to shop.

Mr. Saurabh Bansal, Co- chair, Retail Committee- PHD Chamber while delivering the vote-of- thanks mentioned that with consumer shopping behavior changing during Corona, the purpose of the retail store is shifting and brands are accelerating the omnichannel transformation. Given consumers' price sensitivity, value remains the primary reason for consumers to try new brands as

well as new places to shop. He added that desire for individuality and shift towards sustainable living is driving the uptake of do-it-yourself formats.

BRIDGING ARTIFICIAL BOUNDARIES: THE NEW IDENTITY OF RETAIL (OMNICHANNEL)

Mr. Sameer Dhingra, Director-Retail & CPG-JAPAC Goggle Cloud, moderated the webinar and stated that store transformation is trending and now the race to the survival is digital maturity. He underlined that organization readiness to adapt the business models is the need of the hour.

Ms. Riddhi Adlakha, Head- Digital Marketing-Tata Consultancy Services, stated that consumer behaviour around us is changing exponentially and this shift in consumer behaviour is



not only in the present time but should be looked in futuristic perspective. She mentioned that although the brands are moving into the digital stores, the fact is that we need to invest in digital infrastructure and mapping the factors together to give the omnichannel is a difficult task. She pointed out that since Data is available in a fragmented manner, henceforth we need to focus more on the investment in digital infrastructure.

Mr. Harshvardhan Chauhan-Vice President, Marketing & Omni Channel, Spencers Retail & Nature's Basket, mentioned that the digital transformation is less executed but more talked about. We need to consciously relearn the 4p's of marketing as industry professionals. No matter, how much the brand value is there, store is a multi-sided platform where store travels to the consumer. The new age brands are phygital and thus there is a need of presence of brands everywhere. He suggested the need to be agile to keep the consistency in innovation cycles. 4p's together redefine the futuristic outlook of classical marketing. He stated the stores of future will be customer centric and technology will be leveraged to a greater extent to enhance the customer experience.

Mr. Smerth Khanna, Business Head- Dabur India, stated that the uniqueness of the consumer pattern needs to be focused.

Mr. Jiten Mahendra, Senior Vice President Maketing- Max Fashion India, highlighted about the current mandate of the industry that is moving towards digital. The biggest challenge in digital mode is to increase your basket size.

RETAIL REFOCUSED: REALIGNING YOUR CONSUMER COMPASS

Ms. Pooja Jain, Director, JIMS, moderated the session and said that there were massive changes in impact dimensions, buying patterns have changed but consumer sentiments remain the same. She asserted that the future lies in the seamless integration of online and offline segments. revamped its logistic affairs to reduce the carbon footprint and as a brand, it has emerged victorious amid the pandemic season.


PM'S MESSAGE ON WORLD HEALTH DAY

ARBITRATION NORMS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE SECTOR



he Infrastructure Development Committee of PHDCCI organized a virtual conference on 'Arbitration Norms for Infrastructure Sector' on January 28, 2021. Hon'ble Justice, Mr. Dipak Misra, Former Chief Justice of India was the Chief Guest at the occasion.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI in his welcome address deliberated about the importance of Arbitration in India, that is the preferred dispute resolution mechanism in resolving disputes in infrastructure projects. He remarked that Arbitration Awards are routinely dragged with procedural delays, challenged and taken up to the Supreme Court of India. Infrastructure Projects are dealt with various statutes including the Indian Contract Act, Transfer of Property Act, various labor laws, etc. There is a need to frame a unified construction law for Infrastructure Projects for balanced contract conditions, timely payments and speedy dispute resolution, underlined Mr. Multani.

Mr. Sudhir Hoshing, Chair, PHDCCI Infrastructure Development Committee in his industry perspective mentioned that time taken in Arbitration of Infrastructure Projects in India has come down considerably to

6 months from 8 months. Major issues in implementation of Infrastructure Projects which result into disputes, conflicts and arbitration are majorly due to land for projects not made available on time, delay in shifting of utilities that leads to increase in project costs and idling of labour and construction machinery at the project site and poor quality of DPRs.

Mr. Ashish Wig, Mentor, PHDCCI Infrastructure Development Committee spoke on the issue of trust deficit among the stakeholders in infrastructure projects and the need to develop trust among stakeholders in order to minimize litigation and disputes.

Ms. Priya Hingorani, Senior Advocate, Supreme Court of India & Chair-PHDCCI Law and Justice Committee pointed out that the drafting of Infrastructure Projects agreements has improved but still more needs to be done in drafting of Infrastructure Contracts.

Chief Guest, Hon'ble Justice Mr. Dipak Misra, Former Chief Justice of India in his keynote address stated Arbitration is a human institution established for a kind of economic balance, it needs to have minimum time and maximum sustenance. With

regard to infrastructure contracts, he suggested that they should be made mutually to avoid any confusion. He further emphasized that the idea of infrastructure arbitration needs to be propelled so that the process of arbitration is facilitated.

In his concluding remarks, Mr. Alok Krishna Agarwal, Founder, Sheldon Law Firm & Chair-PHD Legal and ADR Cell stated that major issues in drafting Infrastructure contracts happen due to departure from standardized contract or norm, absence of documentation of activities, deliverables and deviance from contract conditions within a project.

A Panel Discussion on 'Multiparty Arbitration in Infrastructure Disputes' was moderated by Mr. Arjun Chaudhuri, Senior Journalist and Mediator, Delhi Dispute Resolution Society, Delhi Govt. REGULATIONS, QUALITY STANDARDS, CONTROLS FOR MEDTECH

he Health and Pharmaceutical Manufacturing & Medical Devices Committee, PHDCCI in association with the Department of Pharmaceuticals, Ministry of Chemicals & Fertilizers, organized the fourth series of Self Sufficiency in Medical Technology on "Optimum Regulations, Quality Standards, Controls for MedTech" on March 12, 2021.

Mr. Adil Zainulbhai, Chairperson, Quality Council of India (QCI) said that India is the pharmacy of the world which is a sunrise sector with lot of opportunities to be recognized and tapped during this transition period. He also said that many Indian companies are meeting International standards for the betterment of quality & safety and the government should also support Medtech Industry for its growth and expansion. He added that QCI should look forward to collaborate and work together with CDSCO and BIS for further standardization for the Medtech Industry. He also mentioned that we need different Acts for medical technology sector and urged industry and industry associations to get together and make their points visible to QCI to make the process faster and smoother.

While welcoming all the panellists, industry leaders and delegates, Dr N Subramanian, Chair, Health Committee, PHDCCI & Director, Services, Medical Indraprastha Apollo Hospitals said that defects or disturbances in the functions of medical devices may expose patients to serious risks which is particularly true for devices which transfer energy or pharmaceuticals to patients; hence safety standards must be high for all medical devices and the devices should be safe, reliable and well suited for their intended purposes.

Dr Sameer Gupta, Co-chair, Health Committee, PHDCCI said that emphasis should be on quality and ease of getting regulatory approvals. He urged that all safety standards must be very high for all medical devices as it deals with patients life.

Mr. Sumit Kumar, Scientist-C-Medical Equipment & Hospital Planning Department, Bureau of Indian Standards explained about the role of BIS is to ensure about the availability of Indian standards and harmonization of Indian standards at the International level. He further mentioned that BIS is pleased to announce that they have developed

more than 250 standards in the last 2 years itself with all stakeholders and more 90 standards are in the pipeline.

Mr. Manish Airan, AVP- Quality & Regulatory, Transasia Bio-medicals Limited said that better co-ordination is expected among all the three bodies, CDSCO, BIS and QCI. The QCI involvement in developing reliable testing infrastructure & approval process will make the standards more trust worthy.

He further mentioned that public procurement agencies including GEM, need to be educated on the Indian standards so that the need of CE and USFDA can be eliminated. He suggested that standards must be developed keeping public health and safety in mind so that the best product is available at the optimum cost. The standards must be constantly upgraded on the quality and performance expectations; this will help Indian manufacturers to become more competitive and the product more export worthy.

Dr Rajiv Chhibber, Vice President External Affairs at Sahajanand Medical Technologies Pvt. Lt. said "The Indian government has announced several initiatives and policy measures to boost the medical devices sector, however, there is more potential to build policy certainty to accelerate growth of the devices sector.

Dr Harvinder Popli, Director, Delhi Pharmaceutical Science & Research University delivered the vote-ofthanks to all the panelists.

The webinar was designed with the aim of knowledge sharing on efficient and proven water stewardship efforts, policies and practices by water positive corporates and provide an overview on Corporate Water Stewardship (CWS) tools and industry best practices to facilitate adoption of CWS among corporates.

The webinar was co-moderated by Mr. Jafar Alam Ahmed, Consultant, Oxfam India and Dr Ranjeet Mehta, Deputy Secretary General, PHDCCI.

In his welcome address, Mr. Mohit

Jain, Chairperson, MSME Committee, PHDCCI emphasized that time has come for promotion of best practices for water management and its conservation both in industries and society as a whole. In this venture, civil societies, NGOs, Government including State Governments and other arms and institutions associated with water management conservation will have to play an equal role. He advocated that water management and its conservation and reduction of pollution will have to be linked with economics of sustainable water And thus Water management. Stewardship Council will be an ideal mechanism in this direction.

Mr. Varun Gupta, Director, Kent RO Systems Limited and Chairperson Water & Solid Waste Management Committee, PHDCCI underlined the need for a Corporate Water Stewardship Council.

He also pointed out that concerns about water in private sector are rising and essential ingredients in operations of industry are viewed very seriously for qualitative and quantitative management and usage of water. He said that long-term sustainable water strategies are being evolved in almost all industries for critical water management and its consumption.

Mr. Ranjan Dhingra, Co-chair, Water Committee, PHDCCI associated with ROTARY in his presentation emphasized that several focused areas for sustainable water management and its consumption are being identified to serve humanity and



transform lifestyle so that security of water is well managed in the evolving precarious situation. PHDCCI, ROTARY and other stakeholders are associated with one another for judicious water management. Check dams, rain water harvesting, transformation of water bodies are some of the areas in which serious attention is drawn of all stakeholders in close collaboration with the Ministry of Jal Shakti. Mr. Dhingra also informed that crores are being planned to be invested in water management and consumption across the country by ROTARY.

Mr. Mukunda Upadhyay, Programme Officer, Oxfam India, in his observations suggested a dialogue for better and judicious water management and consumption should go on until it becomes conclusive.

Ashish Bhardwaj, Coordinator, Alliance for Water Stewardship (AWS) New Delhi, India said the mission of the AWS is to promote responsible internal (organizational) and external (watershed) actions undertaken to optimize water benefits for society, the environment and the economy. The International Water Stewardship Standard is intended to provide water stewards with an approach for evaluating existing processes and performances within their sites (or facilities) and watersheds, and ensuring that responsible water stewardship actions are taking place.

Mr. K K Sharma, Whole time Director Head EHS at DCM Shriram Ltd. demanded incentives for water stewardship and called for practices that should be adopted for sustained business operations. According to him, DCM industries strictly follow the guidelines of the governments in UP, Rajasthan, Gujarat and Telangana where they operate. The focus of the group is to reduce pollution, recycle and reuse water, adopting holistic approach for water conservation and availability.

Mr. Pankaj Satija, Chief Regulatory Affairs, Tata Steel Ltd. informed that Steel plants are set up in coastal areas because they need water in plenty for various manufacturing processes. Most of the steps that Steel industry take for its water management are as per policies and directions of Governments. The Steel industry takes water issues with all seriousness as part of its Corporate Social Responsibility and works very closely with communities around its manufacturing base.

Mr. Narendra Jain, Vice President, Jubilant Life Sciences Ltd. demanded proper and fair regulation for water management from host of agencies which include Center Groud Water Authroity, National Green Tribunal and the like.

Mr. Mitesh Pandya, AVP-Sustainability & CSR, Vedanta Resources Limited, advocated that Water management policies should be framed keeping in view that India is a developing economy in which its industries will become operational with fair treatment from all relevant quarters.

Ms. Rashmi Naik, Founder CSR Links said that water management practices should be positive on manufacturing. There are certain companies that are doing excellent work on water management and these need to be emulated by other organizations in different verticals.

Mr. Shobit Chepe, TROSA Lead (Consultant), Oxfam India, in his closing remarks emphasized on the importance of using water as a natural and shared resource in a way that is sustainable and is socially and economically beneficial to all. This can be achieved through responsible use of water and convergence of efforts by different stakeholders, in which corporates can play a very important role as a catalyst for change.

E-CONCLAVE ON DEMYSTIFYING AI AS AN ENABLER FOR MSMES

RTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE is the catalyst that empowers MSMEs to scale up and grow their business faster. While large-scale enterprises have long begun using new technologies like machine learning and artificial intelligence (AI) to streamline their business processes, MSMEs are still trying to understand if AI technology holds any solution for them. On this note, PHDCCI organized an e-Conclave on 'Demystifying AI as an Enabler for MSMEs' on February 5, 2021.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI, in his welcome address mentioned that the MSME sector can assist to realize the target of proposed National Manufacturing Policy of raising the share of manufacturing sector in GDP from 16% at present to 25% by the end of 2022 by digital tools like AI, ML, Robotics and Industry 4.0 technologies.

Mr. Deepak Pahwa, Chair, Innovation Committee, PHDCCI stated

that advancement in ML and Al-driven technologies are assisting entire business pipelines, in smart decision making.

Mr. Vinay Thakur, COO, National e-Governance Division (NeGD), Ministry of Electronics and IT (MeitY) mentioned that use of AI is going to change the way we live. India is having the world's biggest database like 'Aadhaar' and 'Land Record' with around 75 Crore data, PDS around 32 Crore data and many other databases such as PFMS, NREGA and Election Data.

Mr. Arun Kumar Jha, Director General, National Productivity Council (NPC), DPIIT, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, mentioned that it is important to implement AI in MSME sector at a high pace. He said that out of 6.3 Crore MSMEs, only one percent have websites and there is a dire need to implement AI and tech tools for MSME growth and competitiveness.

Mr. Subodh Sachan, Director, Software Technology Parks of India (STPI), Ministry of Electronics and IT (MeitY), stated that India is committed to achieve a US\$ 5 trillion economy by 2024; 10% of this economy will come from implementation of Data and AI in four basic sectors viz. agriculture, banking, finance & consumer retailing.

Mr. V K Mishra, Co-chair, Innovation Committee, PHDCCI, corroborated that 'Artificial Intelligence is Social Development of Science'.

Mr. Arnab Thakur, India Director-Strategy, Prosus Fintech mentioned that from implementation perspective, Al in MSME requires three key components, Data, Availability of Al, Specific Computing Scale and Access to the advancement of R&D.

Mr. Ashvani Shukla, CEO, Aeron Systems Pvt. Limited presented case studies of AI implementation in MSMEs.

Mr. Sunil Kumar Goel, Founder, BZAIT India mentioned that AI is being increasingly used in Customer Analytics such as Customer Attrition, Demand Management, Cross-Selling and Customer Segmentation.

Mr. Ankur Bansal, Co-chair, Innovation Committee, PHDCCI moderated the technical session on 'SCOPE OF AI FOR INDIAN MSMEs' while Dr Jatinder Singh, Director, PHDCCI delivered the vote-of- thanks to the guests.







MEETING OF STAKEHOLDERS ON FARM REFORM LAWS SUBMISSION OF JOINT COMMENTS TO SC COMMITTEE



he Agriculture Committee of PHD Chamber organized a virtual meeting of stakeholders on 'Farm Reform Laws' on February 9, 2021.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHD Chamber while speaking on the importance of the agriculture sector, mentioned that Farm Reform laws adopted have the best of intentions for improving farmers' rights and enhancing their remuneration. However, farmers' agitation led the Supreme Court to form a committee of experts to make recommendations based on stakeholders' comments.

Mr. Pradeep Multani highlighted that India has a definite advantage to be a global food hub as there still exists under-utilized capacities in agriculture productivity.

Mr. Nand Kishor Aggarwal, Chairman, Agriculture Committee, PHD Chamber stated that industry stakeholders need to write to the committee made by the Supreme Court to support them and the reforms created are in the interest of the farmers.

Chief Guest, Mr. Prashanta Kumar Swain, Joint Secretary Marketing and Agriculture Marketing Advisor said that Farm Reform laws are going to help farmers and their income and production will improve. He mentioned that we need to improve our exports and processing. The market needs to increase its capacity and APMC needs to reorient as a service provider so that existing volume increases by providing additional services that will benefit the farmers and their costs get minimized.

Mr. Vijay Sardana, Advocate High Court and Agriculture Policy Expert while giving major highlights of the new laws mentioned that these reforms are in favor of increasing farmer's income, reducing exploitation and middlemen interferences. Talking

about the Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020, he mentioned that this reform permits inter-state trade movement of farmers' produce beyond the physical premises of APMC markets and other markets notified under the state APMC Acts. It will also lead to direct and online buying and selling of agricultural produce. As per the Act, the State Governments are prohibited from levying any market fee on farmers, traders, and electronic trading platforms for trading farmers' produce in an outside trade area.

While giving an overview about the Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020, he mentioned that this Act creates a national framework for contract farming through an agreement between a farmer and buyer before production of any farm produce. Provisions have been made for Risk Mitigation. The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020, regulates the production, supply and distribution of a whole host of commodities it declares 'essential' to make them available to consumers at fair prices. He clarified that the law will not lead to hoarding by big businesses as is being perceived.

The meeting was moderated by Mr. Mallika Verma, Director, Agriculture, PHD Chamber and was attended by many industry stalwarts pan-India.





PROMOTING E-COMMERCE EXPORTS - SUGGESTIONS FOR THE NEW FTP

he Consumer Affairs Committee of PHD Chamber organized a virtual panel discussion on February 24, 2021 focusing on the Government's call for suggestions for the New Foreign Trade Policy 2021-2026 on promoting e-commerce exports.

Mr. Labayendu Mansingh, IAS (Retd.), Former Secretary, Consumer Affairs and also ex-DGFT, while highlighting about the complicated challenges in the FTP policy which includes logistics, stated that the government is drafting a separate chapter for E-commerce in the New Foreign Trade Policy 2021-26. According to Mr. Mansingh, the new FTP would be a major initiative for the growth and development of the sector and bringing competitiveness in the country.

Mr. Ajay Dua, IAS (Retd.), Former Secretary, DPIIT (formerly DIPP), stated that the pandemic has shown the important role of E-Commerce and means to reach out to people especially amid the period of lockdown. He emphasized the need to involve States as far as exports are concerned on the same lines of the subject matter of Industries which are currently under the control of the State Governments. He also requested the regulatory bodies to acknowledge the nature of E-commerce in India's growth story going forward and suggested all stakeholders to come together to plan a facilitative role in aiding and nurturing the E-commerce sector.

Ms. Arpita Mukherjee, Professor & Economic Policy Researcher, ICRIER reiterated that E-commerce platform is acting as a catalyst to integrate

SMEs into the global supply chain. Ms. Mukherjee highlighted the need to bring clarity in the definition of E-commerce, subject to clearances in line with the Ministry.

Mr. Tarun Dewan, Executive Director, Sports Goods Export Promotion Council highlighted the role played by the Sports Export Promotion Council in providing support to manufacturers especially MSMEs on boarding and selling goods through E-commerce during the pandemic and how FTP could play an important role in clearly defining the role of EPCs in promoting E-commerce exports.

Mr. Divya Siraslewala, Director, Divya Global Pvt. Ltd. highlighted about the compliance and regulatory challenges & burdens an exporter faces with respect to payment & credit issues on E-commerce platforms, and he suggested that FTP should come out with clear provisions to simplify the same.

Mr. Kautak K Singh, Head – Customs & Trade Consulting, DHL Logistics Pvt. Ltd., highlighted the significant difference in logistics cost, 14% in India as opposed to a 8-10% cost in European & American countries. He therefore stressed on the need to have a cost competitive, effective logistics solution for E-commerce exports that would give Indian exporters the competitive edge as they sell to other countries.

Prof Bejon Misra, Chairman-Consumer Affairs & Public Health, PHDCCI in his welcome address stated that The New Foreign Trade Policy (FTP) should be used as a tool in the foreign policy to strengthen India's competitiveness and to produce best of quality standard products and then harmonize with the world.

Ms. Mallika Verma, Director-Agriculture, Food Processing & Consumer Affairs & Public Health, PHDCCI in her concluding remarks spoke on the role of industry chambers in offering suggestions to the Government bodies and recommended that PHDDCI will surely provide the memorandum of suggestions for the New FTP 2021-26.









COMPETITION LAW RECENT DEVELOPMENTS & IMPACTS

he Corporate Affairs Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on 'Competition Law - Recent Developments and Impacts' on March 3, 2021. Dr Sanjay Kumar Pandey, Advisor (Law) & Head - Advocacy Divison, Competition Commission of India (CCI) was the key note speaker at the webinar.

Other eminent panelists present were Mr. Dhanendra Kumar (IAS), Founder Chairman, Competition Advisory Services (I) LLP & Former Chairman, CCI; Mr. Vivek Agarwal, Partner, Competition Law, DMD Advocates; Mr. M M Sharma, Head-Competition Law & Policy Practice, Vaish Associates Advocates and Ms. Aditi Gopalakrishnan, Partner, AZB & Partners.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI mentioned

that the anti-trust regime in India is relatively young and hence most trade associations and MSMEs are unaware that the legacy practices which had become a way of business for them are illegal. Going forward, the developing jurisprudence, coupled with the CCI's increased focus on outreach programmes will surely help to change attitudes of corporates. As a sequence, PHDCCI is ready to partner with CCI for promoting and ensuring compliances.

Mr. Naveen N D Gupta, Chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI mentioned that the outburst of COVID-19 pandemic has immensely impacted businesses across the globe. Nonetheless, this pandemic has created many opportunities for sectors dealing in essential commodities like healthcare, pharma, telecom, FMCG and retail.

Mr. P K Rustagi, Co-chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI in his theme address highlighted that maximization of consumer welfare should be at the center of both competition policy and law. He suggested to rationalize the penalties being imposed by CCI and also to provide cooling period, if there is no cartel in the investigation. While talking about leniency norms of CCI, he suggested that there are numerous concerns that need to be delved into meticulously.

Dr Sanjay Kumar Pandey, Advisor (Law) & Head - Advocacy Divison, Competition Commission of India in his key note address highlighted that since the objective of a competition authority is to promote and ensure competition, it benefits all market players, consumers and the economy. He apprised that CCI advocates for equal participation of all enterprises in a viable competition and will always be a friend of MSMEs. He highlighted that the Competition Amendment Bill 2020 has path breaking reform to statutorily recognize the Green Channel Process to enable fast-paced regulatory approvals for vast majority of mergers and acquisitions that may have no major concerns regarding appreciable adverse effects competition. Further, the bill will also expand the scope of the Competition Act to include the digital markets through inclusion of hub & spoke arrangement and buyer's cartel.

Mr. Dhanendra Kumar, (IAS), Competition Founder Chairman, Advisory Services (I) LLP & Former Chairman, CCI shared his special insights on Efficacy of Competition Law in the Digital Economy. He highlighted that e-commerce, home delivery of goods & various services, tele-consultation in healthcare sector, etc. helped in a big way during the pandemic. He suggested that there is a need to upgrade the regulations in Competition Act to accommodate the new normal and certain sections of the Act which will be adhered to in letter and spirit.

Mr. Vivek Aggarwal, Partner, Competition Law, DMD Advocates gave a presentation on Benefits and Risks of Competition Law for MSMEs. While covering the risk areas, he talked about bid rigging; trade associations & joint commercial decisions and restrictions imposed on



dealers especially for retail price.

Mr. M M Sharma, Head-Competition Law & Policy Practice, Vaish Associates Advocates talked about the data privacy and competition covering whether sharing of personal data by WhatsApp and Facebook is a competition law issue or not.

Ms. Aditi Gopalakrishnan, Partner, AZB & Partners gave a presentation on

Competition Law Enforcement: trends and Compliance. She talked about the Horizontal & Vertical Agreements along with key cases of Abuse of Dominance in the market.

Mr. Aseem Chawla, Co-chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI while summing up the session mentioned that competition provides benefits to the economy, improves resource allocation and efficiency

as well as increases the ability to compete internationally. Ms. Ranjana Aggarwal, Co-chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI delivered the vote-of-thanks to the speakers, sponsors and delegates for making the webinar a great success.



Mr Deepak Pahwa. Chair. Innovation Committee, PHDCCI in his introductory address mentioned that AR, VR and MR are the most effective technologies these days that will define the future of industry. He said that skills such as navigation, survival and teamwork in challenging situations can be achieved with striking realism using these technologies. No other technology can provide this level of engagement or experience in the same immersive way as VR.

Mr. Sebastien Loze, Simulation & Training Industry Manager, Epic

Games asserted that many sectors of industry are using simulation technologies. Simulators are coming up with various challenges and opportunities. He also mentioned that from Space exploration to healthcare there is a dire need for R&D to develop simulation applications.

CONSTITUTIONAL VALIDITY OF SEARCH, SEIZURE AND ARREST IN GST — CAUTIONS AND PRECAUTIONS

he Indirect Taxes Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on "Constitutional Validity of Search, Seizure and Arrest in GST – Cautions and Precautions" on February 19, 2021.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Chamber President, PHD lauded the government's legislative methods to mitigate the effects of tax evasion and apprised that the provisions for arrests are created to tackle the situation raised by some unscrupulous tax evaders. He stated that these provisions may appear very harsh but are necessary for efficient tax administration and also act as a deterrent and instil a sense of discipline. He underlined that it is equally important that the provisions relating to search, seizure and arrest are not misused by those in position of power and coercive behaviour cannot be justified under the provisions of GST.

Mr. Bimal Jain, Chairman, Indirect Taxes Committee, PHD Chamber said that "Reasons to believe, for conducting search and seizures under GST should be based on reasonable material and should not be fanciful or arbitrary". He shared that while conducting search and seizures, there have been numerous interventions of gross abuse of power by GST officers and they record the statement of

assessee through force and coercion to put allegations on taxable person.

He also cited that recently, the Gujarat High Court has pulled up the GST officials for their alleged pressure tactics to achieve tax collection targets.

He further deliberated when inspection, search and seizure can be initiated; what are the Offences termed as – Bailable & Non Bailable; what the Penalty & Imprisonment provisions are and Legal Jurisprudence on Search, Seizure and Arrests provisions under GST.

Mr. V. Lakshmikumaran, Founder & Managing Partner, Lakshmikumaran & Sridharan explained the Legal Jurisprudence on Search and Seizure & the Constitutional validity of Search & Seizure by both CGST & SGST Authorities. He felt that there is a need to balance the powers of the State in cases of Search/ Raid. He observed that the "reasons to believe" must be justifiable and fair. He explained that when two or more authorities have concurrent jurisdiction on a subject matter, in such a case, the one exercising the powers must act responsibly and in a fair and just manner. The other authority in such case, should keep their hands off the search operations. He further explained the provisions of Section 67(1) and Section 69 of CGST Act alongwith Articles 14, 19, 20 among others of the Indian Constitution in relation to Search, Seizure & Arrest provisions.

Mr. J K Mittal, Advocate, Supreme Court of India made a comprehensive presentation on Coercive actions by the Department during Search & Seizure and collection of tax revenue. He felt that if the assessee's jurisdiction has been assigned to Central Tax Officers, the State Tax Officers have no jurisdiction over the said assessee and this should be respected and treated as such. He felt that the genuine taxpayers' should be treated with respect and should not be coerced unnecessarily.

Sudipta Bhattachariee. Mr. Khaitan & Co in his Partner. presentation discussed provisions of Detention & Confiscation of Goods in the light of changes introduced by Finance Bill, 2021. He highlighted the various proposed changes/ amendments in Section 129 & 130 of the Central Goods and Services Tax Act and the key implications and issues that may arise due to the changes proposed. He felt that higher penalty proposed under Section 129 of the Act is harsh, extortionate and onerous. He highlighted the factual situations in which the courts have held the detention of goods as illegal and disproportionate.





Mr. Saket Patawari, Executive Director, Nexdigm (SKP) made a presentation on Post Budget Suggestions on GST & Customs w.r.t. Union Budget 2021-22. He felt that it is important for the Government to clarify on the nature of activities / transactions to be considered as 'supply'. Further, in case of cooperative societies and clubs, clarity should be provided on GST

implications on contributions raised by members for common expenses. He further highlighted that in case of supplies to SEZ for authorized operations, proper mechanism be setup for suppliers to know whether supplies made to SEZ units are for authorized operations or otherwise. He shared that there are numerous issues which were left unaddressed in the Union Budget. He added the need to address backlog of litigations and provision for National Appellate Authority for Advance Rulings (NAAR) should be notified and it should be ensured that they start functioning to provide finality to matters involving conflict advance rulings.

The session was moderated by Mr. R Sridhar, Consulting Editor, TIOL and attended by around 450 participants.

INDUSTRY EXPECTATIONS FROM FORTHCOMING NEW FOREIGN TRADE POLICY 2021-26

he Foreign Trade and Investment Committee of PHD Chamber organized a webinar on "Industry Expectations from Forthcoming New Foreign Trade Policy 2021-26" on February 23, 2021, in virtual mode under the Chairmanship of Mr. Vishal Dhingra and Co-chairmenship of Mr.Nirmal Khandelwal and Mr. Sanjay Beswal.

Mr. Rajeev Kher, Former Commerce Secretary and Distinguished Fellow, Research and Information System for Developing Countries, expressed his views regarding the dynamics of the domestic and global world economic developments and its impact on international trade. He expressed that in the digitalised era amid COVID-19 scenario and new economic nationalism, there is an urgent need to restructure FTP to derive enhanced international trade benefits. He suggested that Foreign Trade policy should be sector specific for making India Aatmanirbhar and resilient from international shocks.

Dr Ram Upendra Das, Head and Professor, Centre of Regional Trade, CRIT, DOC, MOC and Industry, Government of India, stated that the new policy could create a better platform for international trade if operational hurdles regarding vocal for local and ease of doing business status of India with other countries could be resolved. He suggested that

New Foreign Trade Policy should cater to employment generation and exporters. He also briefed about the benefits of RODTEP scheme, which replaced the MEIS scheme.

Prof Dr Surender Munjal, Associate Professor of International Business and the Director of the James E. Lynch India and South-Asia Business Centre stated that many of the FTAs (Free Trade Agreements) have been counterproductive so India should move in synchronisation with foreign players. The duty structure on the goods needs to be restructured. He raised the concern of transaction cost in shipment, which ultimately impacts the MSME sector and this sector should be protected and sector specific issues should be addressed in the new foreign trade Policy.

Dr Niti Bhasin, Associate Professor, Department of Commerce, Delhi School of Economics, DU, stated that in recent years international trade dynamics has changed and the post-pandemic era has created opportunities for India. She also talked about huge potential of India in textile and apparel exports. She suggested that for promoting exports and making India export competitive in international markets, there is a need to provide incentives to exporters. She suggested that India should promote traditional sectors within the pharmaceuticals sector, such as Ayurveda

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHD Chamber delivered the welcome remarks and said that there is a significant need to discuss the topical issues which will strengthen exports and boost the economy.

Mr. Saket Dalmia, Vice President, PHD Chamber, said that international trade is moving very fast and MSME sector needs to be strengthened at the same time. Indian companies have to be agile to the new environment. He stated that industry was facing problems in MEIS scheme but RODTEP is going to ease international transactions, hence it is required to streamline the FTP in this respect.

Mr. Vishal Dhingra, Chairman, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber, stated that the Government should focus on foreign related reforms and Industry should focus on export promotion in the coming year.

Mr. Nirmal Khandelwal, Cochairman, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber, suggested that the New Foreign Trade policy should address major issues of trade and investments at this juncture arising due to the changed economic order in the post Covid era.

Mr. Sanjay Beswal, Co-chairman, Foreign Trade and Investment Committee, PHD Chamber, mentioned that there is a need to review the RODTEP scheme. He raised the concern of non-compliance in the tax system. He also stated that the foreign trade policy should not be from a particular department, it should be in synchronization with all trade bodies and all Ministries.









INTERACTIVE SESSION WITH PROGRAMME DIRECTOR FOR IGC INDIA PROGRAMME, INTERNATIONAL GROWTH CENTRE

r Pronab Sen, Programme Director for IGC India Programme, International Growth Centre interacted with the Managing Committee members of PHDCCI on February 17, 2021.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHDCCI introduced Dr Pronab Sen, who earlier held positions as Chairman of the National Statistical Commission, Principal Economic Adviser at the Planning Commission and also as Secretary, Ministry of Statistics & Programme Implementation.

Dr Sen expressed his gratitude for the opportunity to interact with the Members of PHDCCI. He highlighted that the government has managed to clear all its liabilities between Rs 1.7 lakh crores and Rs 3 lakh crores in terms of outstanding payments. Dr Sen mentioned that it was welcoming to see that the central government took radical steps to ensure that its Account books are healthy. Most of the earlier governments used to go reasonably slow on making payments for the work done by the private sector.

Dr Sen said that lot of the payments in the fiscal stimulus package were actually the repayment of outstanding bills. It's a great step that the government has taken now at this time of crisis. If the government would have delayed it further even by one year, then every rating agency in the world would have given us a junk bond status. Dr Sen further mentioned that in the financial budget, a lot of

crucial things fail to find mention like the employment figures and the MSME initiatives.

He explained that during financial slowdowns earlier, a lot of small entrepreneurs used to survive due to the Mudra loans. While the larger corporations would still find access to borrowings now, the MSME sector still faces issues as far as credit is concerned. Unless steps are taken for the MSME sector to bounce back, in the next 2-3 years, huge stagnation is expected in demand for goods and services.

FUTURE OF DIGITAL BANKING IN INDIA: CHALLENGES AND WAY FORWARD









he Banking, Financial Services & Insurance Committee, PHD Chamber organized a virtual conference on 'Future of Digital Banking in India: Challenges and Way Forward' on March 10, 2021.

Welcoming the delegates, Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHD Chamber stated that the banking landscape will undergo a complete overhaul in the coming years and observed the scenario will be far more competitive, innovative and efficient in delivering consumers' expectations. He shared that over the last decade, lower operating costs and enhanced efficiencies that come with digitisation have facilitated increased innovation and heterogeneity in the banking sector, notably through the rise of digital-only banking models, either as digital offerings from incumbent banks, bank-fintech partnerships or as licensed digital-only banks.

Mr. Ravinder Pandey, Deputy Managing Director (Strategy) & Chief Digital Officer, SBI said that Digital banking is the future of India but it is equally important to safeguard the interest of all stakeholders. He emphasized that Cyber security is

extremely critical for the success of digital banking. It is the objective of banks to create and win the customers' trust, such that all transactions are routed through banks as is presently done by multiple payment apps. Fintech has bought about changes in the customer mindset. Digital Banking helped enhancing customer relationship, engagement and satisfaction and helped in reducing operating costs, processing cycle time, among others.

He suggested three areas in fintech that need to be intertwined to make it a success – payment & remittance; process improvement – compliance & risk management and customer engagement.

Mr. Jyoti Prakash Gadia, Chairman, BFSI Committee, PHD Chamber emphasized on the value of customer experience and satisfaction. He felt that it is now the era of paperless credit and is extremely important that customers be granted easy loans without much hassles.

Mr. Kamalendu Bali, Vice President-Business Solutions, Concentrix emphasized that fintech companies will take different shapes and forms in India in the next 5-10 years.

Mr. Amit Tewary, COO, LoanTap Financial Technologies Pvt. Ltd. felt that for all NBFCs and fintech companies, to stand out, the key is to provide customized and omni channel support to the customer.

Mr. Manish Chaudhari, Chief Strategy Officer, Poonawalla Finance, emphasized that digital banking is a transformation exercise for betterment of banking. He felt that user experience & level of personalization that customer gets will drive the future banks. Technology is changing in a very fast mode so speed of innovation on the digital side is crux of the digital banking and it is very important to catch up the speed to stay ahead.

Abhishek Mr. Kothari, founder. Flexiloans Technologies Pvt. Ltd, highlighted that Customer experience is the key and we can segregate the customer into four segments - amount sensitive, those who are looking for particular amount of loan; rate sensitive, those who are looking for best interest rate; experience sensitive, those who are looking for user friendly process and speed sensitive, those are who are looking for less time in processing the loan. Analyzing data over the long period using Data science, Artificial intelligence, technical algorithm model and alternate data is very crucial these days to find out the insight on the customer.

Mr. Mrutyunjay Mahapatra, Ex-MD & CEO, Syndicate Bank, explained that essentially a custodian of data, a performer of authentication and probably stamping of trust are the basics of banking scenario. Now we are moving from purity to hybrid. Just like the Industry 4.2, banks 4.0 are knocking at our door. He explained that 4.0 means banks are moving from product to channel to platform and finally to services.

Mr. Bijay Murmuria, Co-chairman, BFSI Committee, PHD Chamber felt that the Digital Banking thrives on financial inclusion and financial growth. He observed that Covid pandemic has provided a real test towards the penetration and ability of digital banking. He felt that digital banking holds a bright future.







ELECTRIC VEHICLE TECHNOLOGIES SUMMIT

HDCCI organized the Electric Vehicle Technologies Summit on March 18, 2021 in virtual platform to deliberate on the roadmap and sensitize stakeholders to move towards a low-carbon transport ecosystem.

Mr. Vivek Kumar Devangan, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Power while deliberating on the need for electric mobility and its adoption in countries like US, Japan and China, mentioned that India is also becoming a forefront player in the adoption and implementation of electric vehicles and is collaborating with countries around the world. He shared that India has achieved its energy surplus capacity and now it is time to utilize it to meet the requirements of electric vehicles.

Talking about the challenges faced in e-mobility, Mr. Devangan mentioned that we need to reduce emissions and conserve energy in the coming years. Mr. Devangan emphasized that charging infrastructure is a critical area of focus for electric vehicles and its setup is pivotal in a lot of cities of India.

Mr. Sudhendu J. Sinha, Advisor, Infrastructure Connectivity and Electric Mobility, NITI Aayog, while sharing his governance perspective towards R&D, mentioned that our technologies need to have the best of global standards, produce low carbon emissions and be less

dependent on import from other countries. He mentioned that R&D has played a major role in EV and is on the thrust of National Mission on Transformative Mobility and Battery Storage. He apprised that NITI Aayog has attempted to create an ecosystem in which R&D has become a focus area and is involving educational institutions in the field of transformative mobility and other R&D areas.

Mr. Anshuman Mohanty, Economic Advisor, Transport Research Wing, Ministry of Road Transport and Highways, mentioned that when we talk about Aatma Nirbhar Bharat, the objective is to produce in India and be less dependent on foreign countries. He underlined that India needs to cater to all electronic segments including IT, Medical, Power, Aerospace, etc. and produce electronic items and ensure their quality standards as well.

Dr Shankar Akella, General eMobility and Manager, EV, Technology, Ashok Leyland Limited in his technical presentation deliberated about EV Vehicles' batteries and types of charging. He discussed the electric vehicle charging infrastructure in India for 2, 3 and 4- wheeler vehicles and buses where the infrastructure set is available in selected cities but vehicles need to increase to cater to the demand.

Mr. Ravi Singh, Business Head-North and East Region (Certification/ Training/Sustainability), TUV India Pvt. Ltd. in his presentation on standard and certifications landscape for electric vehicles discussed the standard governance structure; compliance requirements and key reference standards applicable to electric vehicles; EVSE; plugs, receptacles, and connectors, and batteries.

Mr. Raj Gaurav Batra, Co-chair, ICT, and Electronics Committee, PHD Chamber discussed India's EV Policy to boost electric mobility and focus on creating electric charging infrastructure. He suggested that there needs to be a lower GST on EVs. He mentioned that India has three key strategic imperatives to look at EVs which have higher carbon emissions; fuel security risk and lower power demand. Talking about ET Technology trends, Mr. Batra shared that 2W and 3W will grow faster along with CVs. Passenger vehicles growth will be albeit a little slow. He suggested that IoT integrations will help connected vehicles and LED lighting in EVs is the way to go as Energy consumption is required. There is a need to build infrastructure for charging stations and battery swapping models, he further added.

EXCHANGE TRADED FUNDS (ETFS): RISING PARADIGM FOR INVESTORS



he Capital Market & Commodity Market Committee of PHDCCI organized a Virtual Knowledge Session on 'Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs): Rising Paradigm for Investors' on March 23, 2021.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI said that the rising retail participation, broadening of the product basket, reinforcing investor sentiments and support from the government and SEBI serve as a promising opportunity that today's investors should capitalise upon ETF. He also suggested that the investors should educate themselves about ETFs so that they can take informed investment decisions.

Mr. Vijay Bhushan, Chair, Capital Market & Commodity Market Committee, PHDCCI mentioned that young investors who are not altogether familiar with the intricacies of the financial markets might be well-served by investing in ETFs that tracks the broader market. Sector

funds enable investors to take bullish or bearish positions in specific sectors, while inverse ETFs and leveraged ETFs make it possible to incorporate advanced portfolio management strategies.

Mr. Hemen Bhatia, Deputy Head-ETF Business, Nippon Life India AMC mentioned that in 2020, the Indian market had 93 ETFs across various asset classes. Equity ETFs are the most popular and manage assets of over Rs 1.74 lakh crores across 73 schemes which is followed by debt ETFs that manage assets of over Rs 30,500 crores. He stated that though the increased rationale and product attractiveness of ETF are pulling in more investors to its side, the awareness about ETFs is still quite low in India.

Mr. Sameer Desai, National Lead-ETF Sales, Nippon Life India AMC in his presentation on ETF, mentioned that in less than three decades, ETF has been able to generate 8 trillion funds which is remarkable in financial service history. He highlighted that provident funds can increase equity allocation from 5% to 15% through investment in select ETFs along with No STT on buying and negligible STT on selling of ETFs.

Mr. Gaurav Kapoor, Vice President & Head-North, National Stock Exchange of India Ltd. gave a presentation on NSE Indices and Indian ETF Industry. He stated that in the Indian market, the first ETF was launched by Benchmark Mutual Fund in December 2001 and it tracked the Nifty 50 Index. He talked about the Smart beta ETFs, which is built on traditional ETFs and tailored the components of the fund's holdings based on pre-determined financial metrics.

Mr. Vivek Seigell, Assistant Secretary General, PHDCCI moderated the webinar and also delivered the vote-of-thanks to the panelists.







MERGERS & ACQUISITIONS KEY OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES



he Corporate Affairs Committee of PHDCCI organized a webinar on 'Mergers & Acquisitions: Key Opportunities and Challenges' on March 24, 2021.

Chief Guest, Hon'ble Justice Mr. M M Kumar, Former Chief Justice, J&K High Court, Founder President, NCLT highlighted that between 2005 and 2019 more than 3600 M&A transactions took place amounting to more than US \$ 310 billion, out of which 60% were related to industrial goods. He stated that remarkable progress in regulations and digitalization has made compliances friendly. He appreciated that introduction of IBC Act has reduced the timelines of M&A schemes, though further relaxations should be provided to ensure faster processing of cases at NCLT. He suggested that many of disinvestment schemes announced by the Government such as Air India. Bharat Petroleum and LIC should be started to boost M&A market. He also suggested that all legal bodies involved in M&A transactions should be empowered enough to work effectively on all provisions of M&A ensuring the new skills are embedded in their systems.

Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI said that in November 2020, India recorded the highest M&A deals of 149 amounting to US\$80 billion. He stated that with vaccination, life is returning to normal, if financing is affordable, it's natural that M&A will grow and progressively return in 2021.

Mr. Naveen N D Gupta, Chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI mentioned that the acceleration of digitalization and transformation of businesses instantly became a top priority for Corporates and M&A is the fastest way to make it happen creating highly competitive landscape for the right deals.

Mr. Aseem Chawla, Co-chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI highlighted that high levels of liquidity through 2021 are expected to continue to fuel M&A activity.

Ms. Akila Agrawal, Partner & Head – M&A, Cyril Amarchand Mangaldas gave a presentation on De-Spac Transactions in India. She highlighted that in 2020, special-purpose acquisition companies (SPACs) raised about US\$70 billion in capital and accounted for more than

half of all US IPOs. She mentioned that more SPAC activity in 2021 is highly expected, especially involving assets such as electric vehicle charging infrastructure, power storage and healthcare technology.

Mr. Lalit Kumar, Partner, J Sagar Associates in his presentation on Merger Schemes talked about the relevant provisions of Companies Act, 2013 and SEBI regulations followed with the stamp duty issues involved in the successful implementation of M&A. He also explained about the Fast Track, Listed Company and Reverse Mergers.

Mr. Amit Singh, Co-Founder & Director, Arms Length Advisors Pvt. Ltd. gave a presentation on Valuation under M&A, including internationally accepted valuation practices.

Mr. P K Rustagi, Co-chair, Corporate Affairs Committee, PHDCCI delivered vote-of-thanks to the Chief Guest, speakers, sponsor and delegates.

GROWTH OF INDIA'S DIGITAL LANDSCAPE: THE ATMANIRBHAR WAY

he Telecom Committee of PHDCCI organized an interactive webinar on 'Growth of India's Digital Landscape: The Atmanirbhar Way' on March 25, 2021.

The eminent panelists were: Mr. S.K Gupta (ITS), Secretary, Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI); Mr. Sarvesh Singh, Chairman & Managing Director, Bharat Broadband Network Limited; Mr. Ashutosh Vasant, Director-POM, Railtel Corporation of India Ltd; Mr. Sanjeev Shriya, Regional President, Idemia Syscom India Pvt. Ltd.; Mr. Sunil Joon, Chief Product Officer, Micromax Infomatics Ltd. and Mr. Vikram Tiwathia, Deputy Director General, Cellular Operators Association of India.

Mr. Sanjay Aggarwal, President, PHDCCI in his presidential address threw light on how the pandemic has accelerated the adoption of new and digital ways of working practices. He also spoke about how India's digital transformation could create significant economic value for consumers, businesses, microenterprises, farmers, government, workers and other stakeholders making India Atmanirbhar. He added that 5G revolution is likely to generate new growth avenues, boost industrial productivity and has the potential to transform the socio-economic fabric of the country.

Mr. Sandeep Aggarwal, Mentor-Telecom Committee, PHDCCI in his theme address spoke about how India's telecom sector has undergone a complete metamorphosis in the last 25 years. He deliberated about the infrastructure investment in digital technology; the wave of 5G technology; internet connectivity and growth of smart-phones.



He also elaborated on how the existing supply chains are getting disrupted and new opportunities are emerging in the telecom field due to the clarion call of our Hon'ble PM. He added that given the skill base in India, the scale of domestic market and technology orientation, India presents an attractive option for the global manufacturers.

Mr. Gupta also stated that fiberization of the network will be the focus area now. Substantial investment is also required in data centres; protection of private data and data privacy is going to play an important role in the industry. While India has taken a leap in the digital space, a lot more needs to be done and the government-public sector & private sector need to join hands for the same.

Mr. Sarvesh Singh, Chairman & Managing Director, Bharat Broadband Network Limited shared his views on how data and fibre will drive India's digital landscape further. He explained how Bharat Net will extend broadband to rural India by connecting the gram panchayats of the country and broaden opportunities & upgrade services. This will be done primarily by laying optical fibre. He added that BharatNet is completely using indigenous technology. He also said that using 5G will be able to provide differentiated services and applications as it can be configured both in high-speed connections, virtual streaming and IoT applications too.

Mr. Ashutosh Vasant, Director-POM, Railtel Corporation of India Ltd.said that we need a resilient and reliable network, integrating all the assets, across the country so that all





operators can only concentrate on investments in creating reach to the actual customers. He stressed on creating a responsive organization which is transparent, accountable and meets the needs of the market.

Mr. Sanjeev Shriya, Regional President, Idemia Syscom India Pvt. Ltd. talked about how without the government support, Atmanirbharta cannot be achieved in the same measure. With schemes like PMI, PLI, promoting indigenous technologies like start-ups, all are now directed towards engaging the industry and young entrepreneurs towards being self-reliant. He spoke of how India can exceed in both hardware and software and has been leading in

digital landscapes like IoT, OTT, etc.

Mr. Sunil Joon, Chief Product Officer, Micromax Infomatics Ltd. spoke about how OTT, education technology, media and digital economy boomed due to the pandemic. He deliberated that digital adoption has increased to a large extent last year with more than 200 million active whatsapp and facebook users in India.He also added that the combination of 5G services and Al will be a game changer and provide significant benefit to the telecom industry.

Mr. Vikram Tiwathia, Deputy Director General, Cellular Operators Association of India spoke on how the mobile phones have completely transformed India's digital landscape in the last few years. He added that fiberization is needed; data archiving and labelling is required; best quality telecom equipment with best price is needed for India's digital landscape to get better.

INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN INDIA'S HEALTHCARE SECTOR

NITI Aayog released a report recently outlining the range of investment opportunities in various segments of India's healthcare sector, including hospitals, medical devices and equipment, health insurance, telemedicine, home healthcare and medical value travel. India's healthcare industry has been growing at a compound annual growth rate of around 22% since 2016. At this rate, it is expected to reach USD 372 billion in 2022. Several factors are driving the growth of the Indian healthcare sector, including an aging population, a growing middle class, the rising proportion of lifestyle diseases, an increased emphasis on public-private partnerships as well as accelerated adoption of digital technologies. The Covid-19 pandemic has not only presented challenges but also several opportunities for India to grow. All these factors, together make India's healthcare industry ripe for investment.

In the hospital segment, the expansion of private players to tier-2 and tier-3 locations, beyond metropolitan cities, offers an attractive investment opportunity. With respect to pharmaceuticals, India can boost domestic manufacturing, supported by recent Government schemes with performance-linked incentives, as part of the Aatmanirbhar Bharat initiative. In the medical devices and equipment segment, expansion of diagnostic and pathology centres as well as miniaturized diagnostics have high potential for growth. Further, medical value travel, especially wellness tourism, has bright prospects, given India's inherent strengths in alternative systems of medicine. Technology advancements such as Artificial Intelligence, wearables and other mobile technologies, along with Internet of Things, also offer numerous avenues for investment.





SCOPE OF WHO-GMP CERTIFICATION IN PHARMACEUTICAL INDUSTRY & GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

he Health and Pharmaceuticals Manufacturing & Medical Devices Committee of PHDCCI in association with the Department of Pharmaceuticals, Ministry of Chemicals & Fertilizers organized a webinar on 'Scope of WHO-GMP Certification in Pharmaceutical Industry & Government support' on March 26, 2021.

The Guests of Honour were Dr Rubina Bose, Deputy Drugs Controller (India), CDSCO (WZ), Ministry of Health & Family Welfare and Prof. Ramesh Goyal, Vice Chancellor, Delhi Pharmaceutical Science & Research University.

While giving the welcome remarks, Mr. Pradeep Multani, Senior Vice President, PHDCCI said that the GMP guidelines are designed to minimize the risks involved in any pharmaceutical

production that cannot be eliminated through testing the finished product. He mentioned about the five key elements, which are often referred to as the 5Ps of GMP - people, premises, processes, products and procedures (or paperwork) and said that MSMEs should make sure to make their plants GMP compliant for the growth & to get into quality consistency especially in Pharmaceutical as it directly deals with human lives.

Dr Ramesh Goyal, Vice Chancellor, Delhi Pharmaceutical Science & Research University said that the Government has taken exceptional measures for COVID-19 and the regulators have speeded up the regulatory approvals. He added that the country is witnessing Biopharma revolution. He stressed that to boost the pharmaceutical exports, GMP is

a must. India has been the fastest in adopting GMP as compared to other countries.

Dr Rubina Bose, Deputy Drugs Controller (India), CDSCO (WZ), Ministry of Health & Family Welfare said that CDSCO ensured the availability of medicines during COVID times by giving approvals to various industry without compromising on quality of products. She also enumerated about various key areas of Good Manufacturing Practices like quality management system, good data and record management system, quality risk management and many more. She said that we need to adopt GMP standards to cope up with global market.

Dr D P Ghosh, Corporate Head, Technical & Scientific, Albert & David Limited said that for pharmaceutical products, quality, efficacy and safety are the key words. GMP as per WHO requirement needs updating through the TRS. He further stated that all related to Industry should be imparted training on regular intervals by industry experts and senior regulators. He also said that quality assurance is the most important factor today which keeps a check on stages of procurement, testing, manufacturing operations and documentations are in full proof.



Mr. Mukesh Sinha, Advisor, Technical, Modi Mundi Pharma shared his views about the importance of WHO-GMP certification in the pharmaceuticals Industry. He also mentioned about significance of maintaining data integrity for delivering consistent quality of the products. He also urged for various training programs/ sessions to be conducted for the Industry on WHO-GMP certification.

Dr Ghulam Moinuddin, Team Lead, Freyr Solutions thanked CDSCO for the tremendous work done by them during COVID times and mentioned that the number of WHO GMP certified companies are rising in India and need to comply with it.





VIRTUAL SESSION OF STARTUP SUMMIT

he Chandigarh Chapter of PHD Chamber organized a virtual session of Startup Summit on February 19, 2021 in collaboration with Chandigarh Administration and Startup Punjab.

Mr. Yashpal Garg, IAS, Secretary, Chandigarh Administration informed that Chandigarh will soon get its own Startup Policy with special focus on women entrepreneurship. The incubation Centre at Chandigarh for IT sector is operating since 2001. The new policy will focus on accommodating non IT Startups and expand the scope of incentivizing to private and institutional incubators, co-working spaces and startups.

Ms. Aastha Grover, Head, Startup Hub, Invest India conducted a workshop on startup schemes, registration process, recognition schemes, seed funds and special agreements with Ministries and corporates to promote products and services of Startups.

She informed the participants regarding various modes created by the Government of India to provide market access to startups including access to 30 States / UTs through their policies, international tie-ups with 11 countries to open access to their investors and markets, tie-ups with corporates to promote products and services by startups, pro bono service with listed companies and government engagement for social startups. She added that exclusive patent application route created for DPIIT registered startups increased the patent registration three times in

the past four years. She spoke on the government funding schemes and the application process.

Mr. Madhu Sudan Vij, Chair, Chandigarh Chapter, PHD Chamber informed the participants regarding services provided to startups through PHD-MSME Mentoring & Guidance Center.



While moderating the session, Mr. Param Kalra, Regional Chair, Startup Committee requested for solutions for the challenges faced by startups including the cost of incorporation of a company, higher cost of power and internet supply, need to enhance the exposure and reach for the tier 2 and tier 3 cities based startups, availing the government schemes and access to funds to incubators and startups.

PRESIDENT PROMULGATES INSOLVENCY AND BANKRUPTCY CODE (AMENDMENT) ORDINANCE, 2021

The President promulgated the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (Amendment) Ordinance, 2021 on April 4, 2021 to make amendments in the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 (Code). The amendments aims to provide an efficient alternative insolvency resolution framework for corporate persons classified as micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) under the Code, for ensuring quicker, cost-effective and value maximising outcomes for all the stakeholders, in a manner which is least disruptive to the continuity of MSMEs businesses and which preserves jobs. It is expected that the incorporation of Pre-Packaged insolvency resolution process for MSMEs in the Code will alleviate the distress faced by MSMEs due to the impact of the pandemic. It provides an efficient alternative insolvency resolution framework for corporate persons classified as MSMEs for timely, efficient & cost-effective resolution of distress thereby ensuring positive signal to debt market, employment preservation, ease of doing business and preservation of enterprise capital.





PUNJAB LOGISTICS & WAREHOUSING CONNECT - FORMING FUTURE COLLABORATIONS

he Chandigarh Chapter of PHD Chamber organized a virtual session on "Punjab Logistics Warehousing Connect - Connect - Forming Future Collaborations" on February 26, 2021 with the objective of exploring factors driving growth, consolidation of services, decentralization of warehousing, expansion plans in Punjab and collaboration opportunities between Industry and the Government.

Chief Guest, Mr. Sibin C, IAS, Secretary, Department of Industries & Commerce, Government of Punjab said Punjab has great potential for logistics and warehousing companies. Logistics is a very important sector for Punjab as it is a landlocked state and ranks second in ease of logistics.

Mr. Sibin informed that the State has a separate Logistics Cell to provide land and assist the logistics companies. Punjab is part of Eastern Dedicated Freight Corridor that runs from Ludhiana to Calcutta. Besides, there is an ICD in Amritsar and Mega Industrial Parks are coming up in Ludhiana, Bathinda and Rajpura. Moreover, the State has a business friendly Industrial Policy that offers numerous incentives to investors. He mentioned that presence of over 2.6 lakh MSMEs offer great potential for warehousing and

logistic sector and makes Punjab an attractive investment destination for warehousing and logistic companies. He invited warehousing and logistic companies to invest in Punjab and assured all support.

Guest of Honor, Mr. Yashanjit Singh, IRTS, Managing Director, Punjab State Warehousing Corporation noted that Punjab has a major share in e-commerce in the region and has good road, rail and air infrastructure and is strategically located as far as logistics is concerned. It is part of the Eastern Freight Corridor. It has a multimodal park with lot of potential for logistics and warehousing sector. He invited industry to invest in logistics and warehousing sector in the State.

Presenting the industry perspective, Mr. Ramesh Agarwal, Chairman, Agarwal Movers Packers said that consolidation of warehousing was triggered by GST but COVID-19 has necessitated decentralization of the same. He informed that the need of warehousing space is not same throughout the year. While it rises during the peak season, but during the lean period the space remains unutilized. As the warehousing space involves huge cost, there is a need to optimize the use of space. He shared the model being adopted by his company to reduce the space cost by use of mobile containers for temporary storage during the peak season instead of permanent covered space. He added that transportation, packaging and loading/unloading cost are also being saved in this process.

Mr. Achal Paliwal, CEO, Tata Motors Distribution Co. Ltd. shared that post Covid, the demand for vehicles has gone up but manufacturing is still low. He said that to save on costs, their company is working on JIT Model as logistics and warehousing are a major cost for the auto sector. Mr. Paliwal suggested that unused land of railways can be used for building warehousing facilities with Industry-Government collaboration.

Mr. Satyam Choudhary, Senior Director - New Supply Chain Capabilities, Flipkart said now speed of delivery is a major parameter for customers, therefore, they are decentralizing the warehousing facilities to be closer to the customers. Mr. Chaudhary added that as the customer base is expanding to Tier-2 and Tier- 3 cities, the lack of quality warehousing is a major bottleneck for e-commerce companies. He said mechanized warehouses and digital supply chain are the present trend in industry as these provide cost effective and efficient solutions.

Mr. Puneet Mehndiratta, Vice President, Adani Logistics shared that their company has commissioned silo storage facilities in Punjab and M.P. for scientific storage of food grains to reduce wastages. In Himachal Pradesh, they have created an integrated cold supply chain – Adani Agrifresh for storage, packing and supply of apples. He said that Punjab has great potential for Container Depots which can be built on PPP mode.

Mr. Madhu Sudan Vij, Chair, Chandigarh Chapter, PHD Chamber appreciated the setting up of State Logistics Committee by the Punjab Government to address the concerns related to logistics infrastructure and process barriers in a time-bound manner.

The Haryana Enterprise and



DR. HARSH VARDHAN ADDRESSES WHO ON WORLD HEALTH DAY

On the occasion of World Health Day on April 7, Dr. Harsh Vardhan, Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare addressed the WHO South East Asia Regional Office on April 7, 2021. The theme selected for this year, 'building a fairer and healthier world for everyone', could not have been more appropriate as it falls on all of us to collectively make sure that our policies, programmes and actions are guided towards a healthier future for all. This past year has brought home to us the need to ensure universal access to healthcare services, spanning from preventive to curative for each and every citizen, irrespective of their socio-economic status. Poviding universal health coverage, based upon a strong foundation of primary healthcare services ensures people have access to comprehensive care, ranging from promotive and preventive to treatment, rehabilitation and palliative care.

India launched its flagship Ayushman Bharat program on these lines, which has two components. The first endeavours establishment of 150,000 Health and Wellness Centres to deliver Comprehensive Primary Health Care while also focusing on health promotion, disease prevention, and multi-sectoral actions for social development in which citizens are active participants. The second component is the Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana which provides cashless cover of Rs. 5 lakh per family per year for secondary and tertiary care.

India's response to COVID-19 and its leadership role in enhancing global cooperation during these unprecedented times is an example of this approach. The COVID-19 vaccines being made in India are being shared with over 80 countries through our vaccine maitri initiative, a key step towards addressing inequities in vaccine distribution across the world.





CREDIT RATING AND ALTERNATIVE SOURCE OF RAISING FINANCE FOR MSMES



he Punjab Chapter of PHDCCI organized an interactive video conference on 'Credit Rating and Alternative Source of Raising Finance for MSMEs' on February 24, 2021. Experts at the session shared that a good credit rating helps MSMEs to borrow easily and at cheaper rates. They explained that credit rating is based on a company's credit report and past repayment trends, as well as an indicator of the company's future repayment capability. A good credit rating indicates a higher credit worthiness and lower risk of default for the lenders/investors.

Welcoming the participants, Mr. R S Sachdeva, Mentor, Punjab State Chapter, PHDCCI informed that the Chamber is conducting a series of sessions to address issues and concerns of the MSMEs. He mentioned that in the past MSMEs have been struggling for finance but now with Government initiatives, the position is improving slowly and funds have started flowing for MSMEs.

Mr. Mohit Jain, Chair, MSME Committee, PHDCCI said that MSMEs are not able to avail bank loans easily as banks insist for collaterals to safeguard their loans but it is not always possible for MSMEs to

provide the same. This results in huge unmet demand for funds. Mr. Jain further added that it is important for businesses to have a good CIBIL score as this makes borrowing easy. He said that now a number of alternate sources of finance are also available that are cost effective and easily accessible. He gave an example of Supply Chain Finance (SCF) which is an easy and faster way to increase the working capital. He said that fintech offers an innovative, simple and cost effective solution for e-commerce companies.

Delivering the keynote address, Dr H P Kumar, Former CMD, NSIC & Advisor, PHDCCI said that banks are unable to meet the demands of MSMEs because of strict lending norms. However, a number of alternate fund instruments like factoring, TReDS and invoice financing are available to MSMEs. However, due to lack of awareness, small borrowers are not able to access credit from these sources. Dr Kumar said that credit rating by an established Rating Agency helps in getting the loan easily because a third party assessment gives confidence to the lender.

Mr. Mubasshir Bakir, Associate Director - Analytics & Operations, SME

Solutions from CRISIL Ltd. mentioned that credit rating is the first step for approaching any bank or financial institution for loan. He said that Rating Agencies assess a firm's viability and capability to honour business obligations, provide an insight into its sales, operational and financial composition, thereby assessing the risk element and highlight the overall health of the enterprise. A good credit rating can help a company gain faster and cheaper loan.

Mr. Rahul Priyadarshi, GM-cum-Regional In-charge, Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI) made a presentation on Financial schemes of SIDBI. Besides this, fast credit can be availed under Speed, Speed Plus and Pratham Schemes for buying machinery. The Star Scheme of SIDBI provides loan for Rooftop Solar Systems.

Mr. Rakesh Khurana, Regional Manager, National Stock Exchange (NSE) made a presentation to explain the equity route for raising capital on NSE's SME platform.

Mr. Vijay Mittal, President, Derabassi Industries Association delivered the vote-of-thanks to the expert speakers and participants.





ROLE OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY (IP) IN INNOVATION MANAGEMENT: CHALLENGES & PROSPECTS

he Punjab Chapter of PHD Chamber organized an interactive video conference on 'Role of Intellectual Property (IP) in Innovation Management: Challenges & Prospects' on February 25, 2021.

Mr. Jaideep Singh, Convenor, Amritsar Zone of Punjab State Chapter, PHDCCI, while welcoming the speakers and the participants informed that IP Facilitation Centre has been set up at Amritsar which provides all IP related services like Trademarks, Patents, Copyrights, Designs and Geographical Indications.

Ms. Geeta Gulati, Advocate, Trade Marks & Patent Attorney explained that Intellectual Property (IP) Rights include trade name, brand, logo and designs. She mentioned that trademarks give identity to the business and includes name, color combination and style of writing the name and can be very effective in penetrating new markets. She further informed that the validity of trademark is 10 years from the date

of filing the application and can be renewed infinitely. The trademark is valid only in the country in which it is registered and is transferable.

She added that civil and criminal remedies are available for violation of IP Rights like using a similar mark for similar or related goods or services or using a well-known mark. She described that copyright means a legal right of an author/artist/originator and prevents such work from being copied or reproduced without the consent of the copyright holder. Copyright registered in one country gets registered automatically in other countries and is valid for lifetime of the holder and 60 years after his death. In case of business entity, it is valid during life-cycle of the entity.

She said that Industrial Designs include product design that can be manufactured in a factory and their registration is valid for 15 years. New invention can be patented and their registration is valid for a period of 20 years and cannot be renewed and

has to go in public domain after the validity period.

Dr Shweta Sen, Head, IPR Integrum IP in her presentation on Innovation Management explained that Innovation refers to an invention and its commercialization i.e. converting innovative ideas into a practical action plan so that it becomes a reality. Dr Sen added that an innovation process includes preparation, implementation, evaluation scaling up, improvement of ideas. She said that for businesses, the key to success is inventing and encouraging new ideas and leveraging the years of experience. She informed that innovations can be protected through patenting as it prevents others from copying without due permission of the inventor thus allowing the patent holder to commercially exploit his innovations. The patent holder has the opportunity to license, franchise or sell the invention.







QUALITY MANAGEMENT: DESIGN & STANDARDIZATION

he Punjab State Chapter of PHD Chamber in association with Deutsche Gesellschaftfür Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) organized an interactive video conference on 'Quality Management: Design & Standardization' on February 13, 2021 to apprise and update MSMEs, Industry members and Quality Management Professionals on process design and standardization steps to improve quality and boost productivity.

Welcoming the participants, Mr. R S Sachdeva, Mentor, Punjab State Chapter, PHD Chamber, said that quality management system affects every aspect of an organization's performance. Use of QMS tools of

Process Design and Standardization decreases ambiguity, guarantees quality and improves productivity and it ensures compliance in the most cost and resource-efficient manner, creating room for expansion, growth, and profit, he added.

Mr. Naresh Chawla, Senior Consultant, Kaizen Institute India emphasized that for advancing in the technological field, it is important to have designs that are human-centered and standardized.

Quality function deployment is needed to help understand customer needs and plan a product to provide superior value, he underlined. He made a presentation covering seven principles of design; Kano model and four phases of Quality Function Deployment.

Mr. Ankur Dhir, Principal Consultant & Trainer Quality Solutions, Chandigarh while explaining about need for Standardization said, every task regardless of how often you do, requires rules that define the scope, quality and methods to be followed. He further said, standardization gives freedom to customize processes and remain competitive. It gives the speed to work and makes manufacturing cost-effective.

He apprised on Product and Process Standards Applicable to manufacturers giving both the Indian and Global perspective; use of Standards; types of Standards besides explaining how to implement and establish a Quality Management system.

WORLD BANK APPROVES US\$ 105 MILLION PROJECT TO IMPROVE URBAN SERVICES IN TWO CITIES OF PUNJAB

The World Bank Board of Executive Directors approved a US\$ 105 million Punjab Municipal Services Improvement Project to strengthen urban services in Amritsar and Ludhiana, the two largest cities in Punjab. A major focus of the project will be on providing efficient water supply and sanitation services in Amritsar and Ludhiana, cities that are the engines of economic growth for the state of Punjab. The improvements in the water supply are expected to benefit more than 3 million people in 2025 and an estimated 5 million projected population in 2055. Industrial and commercial users would also benefit from the good quality reliable water supply. The project will finance all new raw water systems, water treatment plants, transmission systems, and reservoirs to supply clean water to cover entire cities under a Design; Build, Operate and Transfer (DBOT) contract. The DBOT operator will manage the operations and maintenance of these water supply systems under the direct supervision of the municipal corporations in the two cities through city-level water utilities.







TIPS AND TECHNIQUES TO BOOST ONLINE SALES

he Punjab State Chapter of PHD Chamber in association with Deutsche Gesellschaftfür Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) and Hisales Consulting Pvt. Ltd. organized an interactive session on 'Tips and Techniques to Boost Online Sales' on February 22, 2021 to apprise and update MSMEs and Industry members on concepts and methods to boost online sales.

Mr. Prakash Batna, Founder,CEO, Hisales Consulting Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai

explained the techniques that can be used to boost effectiveness of Online Sales Strategies. He mentioned that a good online sales strategy should focus on the vision and objectives that need to be achieved. It will identify Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) which will chart the progressions of the strategy towards the desired outcome.

During the Open House discussions, Mr. Batna guided the participants to use Google analytics

and understand the way Google and other search engines navigate the internet. Specific queries regarding Customer Persona, Off-Page SEOs and Backlinks were answered by the expert.

Ms. Rekha Agashe, ED & Managing Partner, Hisales Consulting Pvt. Ltd. Mumbai, offered a One-on-One Strategy Session for all MSME-INNO participants free-of-charge to evaluate their current strategies and the alternatives available to them to boost online sales.



INCREASE IN FDI INFLOWS

The measures taken by the Government on the fronts of FDI policy reforms, investment facilitation and ease of doing business have resulted in increased FDI inflows into the country. India has attracted total FDI inflow of US\$ 72.12 billion during April-January, 2021 versus US\$ 62.72 billion in the same period of last fiscal year. FDI equity inflows grew by 28% in the first ten months of F.Y. 2020-21 (US\$ 54.18 billion) compared to the year ago period (US\$ 42.34 billion). Singapore was the top investor country followed by USA and UAE. Computer Software & Hardware emerged as the top sector during the first ten months of FY 2020-21 followed by Construction (Infrastructure) Activities and Services Sector respectively.





COST REDUCTION TECHNIQUES TO ENHANCE PROFITS



he Punjab State Chapter of PHD Chamber in association with Deutsche Gesellschaftfür Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) organized an interactive video conference on 'Cost Reduction Techniques to Enhance Profits' on February 23, 2021 to apprise and update MSMEs and Industry members on cost reduction methods and strategies to reduce costs and increase profit margins.

Mr. Ankur Dhir, Principal Consultant and Trainer Quality Solutions, Chandigarh, apprised on the concept of Good Quality and Cost of Poor Quality (CoPQ). He elucidated the impact on CoPQ on the entire manufacturing process, impact on customers and overall sustainability of the organizations.

The Components of CoPQ namely, Appraisal Costs, Internal Failure Cost, External Failure Costs and Prevention Cost were explained citing various examples. Mr. Dhir gave references of various quality Gurus like JM Juran, Philip Crosby, H. James Harrington, etc. and traced their contribution to the evolution of the Quality Concept. The contribution of the Japanese concepts of Kaizen, 3M (Muri, Mura and Muda) and Genchi Gembutsu were explained in context with Toyota way of quality management.

The next concept discussed was understanding of value in context of manufacturing products and services along with steps of Value Engineering (VE).

Mr. Naresh Chawla, Sr. Consultant, Kaizen Institute India, shared a detailed approach to make the participants understand the components of Costing of Manufacturing Products. Mr. Chawla explained how to identify the non-value adding activities and work on building Cost Efficiencies without reducing the functionality and quality of the products manufactured. He explained if the Material Cost is forming the major proportion of the Cost, the same can be reduced by improving the quality and design of the products.

He apprised participants that CoPQ has been one of the biggest hindrances to the competitiveness of the MSME sector. To reduce CoPQ quality, Manufacturing Units can employ Quality Planning, Quality Control and Quality Improvement. He informed that very advanced techniques have been developed under Industry 4.0 to manage quality using automated technologies.

PRODUCTIVITY IMPROVEMENT THROUGH PROCESS WASTE REDUCTION

he Punjab Chapter of PHD Chamber in association with Deutsche Gesellschaftfür Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) organized an interactive video conference on 'Productivity Improvement through Process Waste Reduction' on March 6, 2021 to apprise MSMEs and industry members about the principles of lean, ZED and Material Flow Cost Analysis and their application in reducing process waste.

Naresh Chawla, Senior Consultant, Kaizen Institute India made a presentation on improving productivity and processing waste management. He said that productivity is the prime factor determining the competitiveness of a company. Productivity depends on efficiency, effectiveness and adaptability. He pointed out that during COVID-19 pandemic, only those companies survived who modified their operations according to the changed circumstances.

Mr. Chawla shared that for entrepreneurs, productivity and resource utilization have a cap as they cannot go beyond 100 percent

but the methodology has unlimited scope as technology can be leveraged to improve productivity infinitely. He added that return on money invested is a measure of efficiency, implying how fast an entity is able to rotate its assets.

Mr. Chawla underlined that innovation is a key to success for businesses as it leads to enhanced sales and better profit margins. Therefore, new products, new methods of production, new sources of raw material, creation of monopoly, breaking up of monopoly and exploring new markets are extremely important for businesses.

Highlighting the importance of elimination of wastage, Mr. Chawla said that in addition to preventing material wastage, focus should be to avoid wastage of time and manpower. He said that activities which consume time and resource but do not add value are categorized as non-value adding and should be avoided to increase profitability.

Mr. Ankur Dhir, Principal Consultant & Trainer Quality Solutions,

Chandigarh made a presentation to explain the cost reduction techniques through material flow cost accounting (MFCA) and Zero Effect and Zero Defect (ZED) Model.

Mr. Dhir mentioned MFCA is a management tool that assists organizations to better understand the potential environmental and financial consequences of their material and energy practices and seeks to improve them via changes in those practices.

Mr. Dhir explained that the ZED Certification Scheme is an extensive drive of the Government of India for inculcating Zero Defect & Zero Effect practices in manufacturing processes to ensure continuous improvement for enhancing global competitiveness of MSMEs in the country. The Scheme includes assessment of business processes, rating and handholding of MSMEs to optimize their production with intervention of experts.

PHDRDF HEALTHCARE INTERVENTION AND SANITATION

PhDRDF has been actively conducting free health camps for the low-income population in various geographical locations across the country to increase access to healthcare. A team of a qualified Doctor, ANM, lab technician and project coordinator are present for each camp. Emphasis is given on generating awareness amongst the community on sanitation & hygiene, child & maternal health, waterborne diseases, communicable diseases and other geography based medical problems.

PHDRDF - ROTARY CLUB OF ROORKEE

HDRDF has partnered with Rotary Club of Roorkee, Rotary International, Rotary District grant through THDC, Rishikesh for a Mobile Medical "Sehat Van" to provide a holistic health care program to 30 villages in Tehri Garhwal. The

project will reach out to more than 12,000 people in the far flung areas of Pratapnagar and Jakhanidhar block of Tehri Gharwal, who are unable to access healthcare easily. Screening, diagnosis and treatment along with medicines will be provided to the

patients with a special focus on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) including Diabetes, Hypertension, Cardiac problem and Oncology through on-ground health camps as well as Tele-medicine consultation with specialist doctors.

PHDRDF - HSIL

HDRDF has partnered with HSIL to provide a Mobile Medical Unit and provide Free health Camps in nearby areas of Bahadurgarh and Kaharani in Haryana. The project will provide generic health care services to

the people through a well-equipped technology assisted mobile medical van with testing devices like ECG, blood test facility like haemoglobin, blood sugar and supported by a qualified medical team consisting of a medical doctor and paramedical staff including lab technician and ANM. Screening, diagnosis and treatment along with medicines will be provided to the patients.

PHDRDF WATER MANAGEMENT

HDRDF has been constantly working towards recharging of ground water table by establishing Rain water harvesting structures and generating awareness among the community on need and technologies of water conservation.

PHDRDF- HTWL

HDRDF and HTWL have partnered together to pond rejuvenation in Bhigan Village, Sonepat, Haryana. Concrete footpath of 360 meters with lock 'n' lock tiles have been paved around the pond. Trees with tree guard will be planted around the pond for soil conservation and green cover. Besides this, the pond will be beautified by installing RCC benches and installation of street lights so that the pond could be maintained and villagers use it as a park for walk ways and other recreational activities.

Out of seven, three check dams have been completed namely, KadruChuwaWala, FaujiWala and Sukkhal Khatt Wala check dams and construction work for Pooja Wala and Dhonj Wala check dams are in progress.

Now, the girls are able to manufacture the sanitary napkins independently. The project has reached its midway and products are being marketed and sold locally in other districts of Uttarakhand through various channels. Besides, the products are being sold in Haryana also.

PHDRDF- DONALDSON INDIA FILTER SYSTEMS PRIVATE LIMITED

HDRDF and Donaldson India Filter Systems Pvt Ltd. are running a Skill Development Centre since the last 5 years in village Mohammadpur Gurjar, Sohna block, Gurugram. From its initiation 2016, till date more than 300 girls and women got trained at this Center in both the courses. Most of the passed out girls have started earning their livelihood with the skills they have learnt at this Center. Currently, two batches in stitching and beauty culture are running with 20 candidates in each batch. Apart from this, the girls have also been provided with language learning skills at the Center to help them boost their confidence and communicate better. Beside this, sessions on basic computer are being conducted at the Center. On March 6, 2021 on the occasion of International Women's Day, self-defence training was provided to more than 40 girls at the Centre by a certified Krav Maga trainer.

PHDRDF- BRY- AIR (ASIA) PVT. LTD. & DRI PVT. LTD.

HDRDF and Bry –Air Asia are continuing their partnership for the second phase of Bry-Air Udaan Skill Development Centre for electricians in Sidhrawali village, Haryana. In this project, a total of 40 students will be trained in the electrician course in Sidhrawali village of Gurugram. After completion of the course, students will be provided third party certification along with jobs. It is to be noted that Bry Air (Asia) and PHDRDF have earlier run a training centre for electricians in Jatauli Village of Pataudi wherein 40 candidates were trained and provided job opportunities with third party certification. Currently, a batch of 20 students has been initiated. Self -defence training was provided to the girls of the centre on March 6,2021 with focus on building their confidence and to teach some self-defence techniques. The training was given by Krav Maga expert to more than 20 girls who particiapted with full enthusiasm.

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A ROOF FOR FAITH

irca 1947; 40 year old Chaudhary Paras Ram - with his wife and 14 children – was living in the refugee camp at New Delhi's Birla Mandir. The family, used to the high life and luxury in Pakistan, had a small corner to themselves. Filthy toilets, free community kitchen, daily fights over everything it was a tough existence. Back in Pakistan, this man was a prosperous trader, mill owner and honorary magistrate. This was as high as the natives ever got. Living in great comfort, hobnobbing with the "gora sahebs", children in convent schools, holidays in the hills, the works. The transformation was killing. He couldn't take it anymore, couldn't see the kids suffering. "Must find a place to ourselves", he thought.

Every morning he would do the rounds of nearby government colonies. Finally a deal was made. One of the babus agreed to let out his servant quarter for Rs. 25 per month. They could cook their own food in a little open space at the back. Chaudhary Saheb was happy. He gave the babu one month's rent in advance and promised to move in next morning. His limited resources would take a big beating

but the "camp" living was terrible. He would soon find some work, may be invest in a small business. In any case, the Mandir life couldn't go on. He had faith in God and on his own ability to rebuild their life.

Early next morning a 'tonga' was hired and the whole family, along with their few belongings, soon reached their new rented house. The tonga fellow was paid off, their stuff unloaded and, with great expectations, he proceeded to press the call bell.

For several minutes there was no response. Then a lady appeared looking askance at the eager faces. When the head of the family explained that he had settled the rent deed on the previous evening, presumably with her husband, she showed great surprise. "But we've already taken some other tenant this morning; at Rs 30 per month, Any way here's your refund", she showed Rs. 25 into his shaking hands and shut the door.

Paras Ram's world came crashing down. His faith was shattered. Their place in the temple would've been taken already by many waiting families. He had no where to go. At whose door could he knock. There were some distant relatives in Delhi but no one would put up so many people. "For the first time in my adult life", as he would confess later, "I cried".

All this time, a man next door was watching. Quietly he walked over to the shocked family and asked them to come into his house. He even picked up their luggage from the road and took them in. "I have a vacant room. You can stay here as long as you like. There will be no rent. I'm sorry for my neighbour's behaviour".

Paras Ram and his family stayed in Mr & Mrs Bhatnagar's government quarter in Gole Market for nearly 2 months. They all cooked in the same kitchen and ate together. Later, Mr Bhatnagar found them a haveli on rent in old Delhi. The owner, his friend Bashir Ali made Paras Ram his partner in "Capital Hat House" near Kotwali in Chandni Chowk. Still later, he sold his business to him and migrated to Pakistan.

Chaudhury Saheb's faith in humanity was restored. The good samaritan had changed his life.

Long speech, no relief, says Hooda

Chandigarh: Congress MLA and leader of opposition Bhupinder Singh Hooda termed the budget presented by Haryana chief minister Manohar Lal Khattar on Friday as a "two-and-half-hour speech, with much ado about nothing".

Interacting with media after the budget presentation, Hooda said it was a complete disappointment for those who were in distress. "Now the debt level is such that every child born in Haryana carries a debt of Rs 1 lakh, all due to misleading statements and mismanaged finances and resources. Haryana is heading for bankruptcy now," he alleged.

pecting some relief and concessions from the budget. But the chief minister's two-and-ahalf-hour-long budget speech did not provide any relief or help to any section, including farmers, labourers, workers, businessmen and homemakers." he said.

Hooda said the CM prolonged the budget speech to "mislead and confuse people". He said the government repeatedly claimed to increase the outlay for education and agriculture, but the truth was that the allocation had been reduced. "An attempt has been made to confuse the public by adding technical education to the education budget," he added.

The former CM expressed concern over the deteriorating financial health of the state, saying, "The BJP government is pushing the state towards debt and is taking Haryana towards bankruptcy. That is why debt figures were not clearly stated in the budget speech this time. Apparently, the government is hesitating to expose its failure. It is estimated that the total debt on the state has increased to Rs 2.25 lakh crore debt and every child in Haryana is born with a loan of Rs 1 lakh on their head."

The most disappointing aspect of the budget, he claimed, was that it did not show any vision or even give any semblance of trying to fulfil the ruling alliance's election announcements.

"Old age pension has been increased by just Rs 250, while the JJP formed an alliance with the BJP on condition of increasing old-age pension to Rs 5,100," he said.

The objectives of expansion, growth and technology upgradation of MSMEs would not be achievable if both the criterion are required to be fulfilled. Preferably the turnover criteria should be set for an enterprise to be classified as MSME.

Coting ahead, the cost competitiveness of MSME experters should be enhanced and a level-playing field created. Apart from boosting exports, this will reduce imports of items where India has domestic capabilities.

MSMEs have been seeking tax-free status for export income. This will help in partly compensating the additional cost of logistics and other bottlenecks which exporters face. MSMEs not onlyplay a crucial role in providing large employment opportunities at comparatively lower capital cost than large industries but also help in industrialisation of rural and backward areas, thereby reducing regional imbalances and assuring more equitable distribution of national income and wealth.

Raw-material sourcing
Often, the origin/source of raw ma-terials for MSMEs is far away, which hampers ease of accessibility and raises the cost of procurement. Also, economic powerfactivity is concen-trated in mega cities. The Govern-ment should, therefore, rationalise or simplify the existing laws to dis-tribute this concentration of eco-nomic power help bring raw-mater-ial and manpower resources closer

ial and manpower resources closer to MSMEs. Further, the focus should be on ensuring basislefree disbursement of loans to MSMEs, especially in rural areas. Banks must see that the significant repo rate cuts an-nounced by the RBI are transmitted fully to borrowers. Lowering the compliance burden of MSMis will improve 'ease of doing business' at the ground level and a lower tax regime will increase the personal disposable income of the people and create an overall virtuous circle of create an overall virtuous circle of growth and development in the

Both MSMEs and start-ups re-

Both MSMEs and start-ups require a lot of support to help them tide over the pandemic. The value chain of MSMEs should be enhanced, to make them structurally more competent and add to their efficiency.

Keeping in view the discuptions in global supply chains, India should build doreostic capacities to mitigate the impact on import demand with indigenous production. Exercise to a capacities of the indigenous production. Exercise to a capacity building at this juncture will not only reduce the impact of pandemic but also provide an opportunity to increase our presence in global exports. This will belp the country become the manufacturing hub of global supply chain and an export powerhouse.


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
