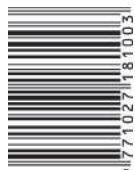

As a proportion of 2023/24's N\$8.85-b overall development budget after midyear, N\$2.365-b foreign loans (and to a far lesser extent, grants) constitutes 26.7% - significantly lower than last year's revised estimates when N\$2.7-b foreign development funding comprised 32.9% of the N\$8.2-b overall budget.

While over half of Namibia's N\$2-b national development budget for its green economic cluster in 2023/24 is propped up by N\$1.1-b in foreign loans, none of this accrues to the fisheries ministry which instead took the biggest, 20% midyear haircut to its project funding, with no provision for combating illegal marine harvesting by local and foreign trawlers on such a massive scale that it threatens to sink the N\$10-b industry.

As previous installments of our review of the development budget have shown, the government's dependence on foreign development funds is growing, as scarce fiscal resources are diverted into operational spending and away from the development portfolios of the administrative, security, health and welfare clusters that are all wholly dependent on domestic fiscal resources.

The green economic cluster's total budget for capital projects in 2023/24 amounts to N\$2,034,631,000 after midyear, with N\$1,100,946,000 or 54% funded through foreign loans outside the State Revenue Fund and N\$933,685,000 or 46% sourced domestically inside the SRF.

And within the green economic cluster, the Fisheries & Marine Resources Vote which is entirely dependent on domestic funding, had its development budget cut the most by 20%, alongside wholesale midyear cutbacks in all other votes across the sector in 2023/24.

One third of the Namibian central government's N\$6-b development budget for its economic cluster is financed through foreign loans, with over half of the N\$4.2-b domestically-funded component going to the green economy rather than the mining, transport and industrial sector, whose bigger, N\$4.26-b development budget is only 22.8% dependant on foreign funding compared to the green economy's 54%.

The only other cluster receiving foreign funding for its development projects is education, while the health and welfare cluster's foreign inputs are not visible in the budget.

The 18% increase in domestically-funded development expenditure to N\$6.5-b in 2023/24 "is further enhanced by off-budget activities in the form of grant-funded and loan-funded projects" amounting to N\$2.3-b external project financing, finance minister lipumbu Shiimi disclosed, providing no further information when tabling the main 2023/24 budget earlier this year.

Growing foreign development funding forecast

The government's increasing dependence on foreign development loans was acknowledged by the finance minister, who said in his midyear budget speech last year: "Consideration has been made to execute large capital projects, going forward, through long term funding from Development Finance Institutions (DFIs) to minimise the pressure on the budget".

What this means is that in order to channel most of its domestically sourced revenue into operational expenditure, the government has become more reliant on external capital for its development budget, since foreign lenders are hardly going to finance operational expenditure items such as remuneration, current overheads - and debt servicing costs, of course (*Bulletin 1472*).

This was already presaged by the National Planning Commission in its 2019/20 development budget when it noted "a significant increase in the external support earmarked for the development of infrastructure outside the State Revenue Fund from N\$1-b to N\$4.3-b" from the previous three-year medium term expenditure framework to

the one ending 2021/22.

The NPC also noted then that the four-fold increase in external funding compared to a much milder 6% increase in N\$24.6-b funding inside the SRF this MTEF over the previous MTEF's N\$23.3-b for development projects.

Externally-funded development expenditure was therefore projected to increase four-fold over the three years ending 2022/23, compared to only 6% in domestically-financed development expenditure.

In its 2021/22 development budget, the NPC tried to paint a rosier picture for the current medium term expenditure framework ending 2023/24, according to which the three-year overall development budget of N\$22.157-b will consist of only 12.27% or N\$2.77-b in foreign funding, with the remaining N\$19.4-b accounting for 87.7%.

This has clearly turned out not to be the case, given that during the three-year term starting 2022/23, 34.6% of the overall development budget was projected to be foreign-funded - three times more than the previous projection of 12.27% (*Bulletin 1471*).

Foreign finance in development expenditure

As a proportion of 2023/24's N\$8.85-b overall development budget after midyear, N\$2.365-b foreign loans (and to a far lesser extent, grants) constitutes 26.7%.

This is significantly lower than last year's revised estimates when N\$2.7-b foreign development funding comprised 32.9% of the N\$8.2-b overall budget, compared to 2021/22's actual expenditure when N\$1.478-b foreign funding constituted 24% of all N\$6.17-b development expenditure.

As noted in *Bulletin 1509*, sharply increasing ratios of foreign development budgetary inputs over domestic fiscal resources over the four years before 2022/23, before declining that year (and now in 2023/24), are in stark contrast to

2018/19, when only N\$513-m or 6.6% out of N\$7.8-b development spending was financed outside the State Revenue Fund, with N\$7.3-b or 93.4% financed inside the SRF.

In 2022/23, the overall N\$7.7-b development budget incorporating both domestic and foreign inputs was 15% or N\$1-b more than the previous year's N\$6.7-b. This was arrived at after a N\$1.24-b or 84% growth in external funding to N\$2.7-b, combined with a 4.36% or N\$228-m decline in domestic funding, however.

This was a reversal over 2021/22, when both domestic and foreign development inputs declined in relation to the previous two years.

These declines were a reversal on the previous two years when, in 2019/20, the N\$5.7-b domestic component grew only 5.2% to N\$6-b, while the N\$1.5-b foreign component grew by 13.3% or more than double to N\$1.7-b.

Comparing last year's revised estimates with 2023/24, foreign development funding fell by 12.4% from N\$2.7-b to N\$2.365-b, while domestic development funding rose by 18% from N\$5.5-b to N\$6.5-b.

This is a sharp reversal on the previous year when, between 2021/22 and 2022/23, foreign development expenditure almost doubled from N\$1.478-b to N\$2.7-b (an 82.6% increase), while domestically financed development expenditure grew by only 17%.

The economic cluster's foreign development funding

The economic cluster traditionally consumes by far the biggest share of all foreign development funding.

In 2023/24, its N\$2.07-b is 87.5% of the N\$2.365-b total, compared to 2022/23 when its N\$2.46-b was 91% of the N\$2.7-b total, and 2021/22 when its N\$1.128-b amounted to over 76% of all N\$1.478-b in foreign development finance.

For the economic cluster's foreign development inputs as a whole, this translates into a year-on-year increment of 118% between 2021/22 and last year, compared to a decline of 15.8% between this year and 2022/23, reflecting the 98% increase in all foreign development funding between 2021/22 and last year, followed by the 12.4% decline between 2022/23 and this year.

Within the economic cluster, the transport, mining and industrial sector's foreign funding more than doubled from N\$780-m by 118% to N\$1.7-b last year, before falling by 43% to N\$973-m in 2023/24.

By comparison, the green economic cluster's foreign funding also more than doubled by 117.4% from N\$349-m in 2021/22 to N\$759-m last year, only to rise by a further 45% to N\$1.1-b in 2023/24 – in contrast to the industrial sector's 43% decline.

Put differently, the industrial sector's share of the economic cluster's foreign development funding remained constant at 69% in 2021/22 and last year, before falling to only 47% in 2023/24, while the green economy's share remained a constant 31% in 2021/22 and last year before increasing to 53% this year, in tandem with the other sector's decline.

Comparing clusters in the 2023/24 domestically-funded development budget

In its traditional first place, the economic cluster has N\$4.222-b to spend on domestically-financed development projects after midyear 2023/24, accounting for 65.09% of the N\$6.486-b total following a marginal N\$35.8-m or 0.84% cutback on its N\$4.258-b at the beginning of the year when it accounted for 65.44% of the N\$6.5-b total, which had been a 6.64% or N\$264.97-m increase over 2022/23's N\$3.99-b development expenditure accounting for a much higher 73.3% of the N\$5.46-b total.

The economic cluster's domestically-funded development budget in 2023/24 is augmented by N\$2.074-b in foreign loans outside the State Revenue Fund:

* N\$10-m for Vote 15 – Urban & Rural Development (none the previous two years);

* N\$0-m for Vote 18 – Environment, Tourism & Forestry (nil last year; N\$53.998-m in 2021/22);

* N\$17.51-m for Vote 19 – Mines & Energy (nil last year and in 2021/22);

* N\$945.552-m for Transport – Vote 24 (N\$1,700,060,000 last year; N\$779.939-m in 2021/22);

* N\$88-m for Vote 37 – Agriculture & Land Reform (N\$135.974-m last year; N\$272.48-m in 2021/22); and

* N\$1,012,946,000 for Vote 38 – Water (N\$622.98-m last year; N\$22.399-m in 2021/22).

* In second place, the education cluster's post-midyear N\$881.67-m development budget in 2023/24 accounts for 13.6% of the N\$6.486-b total following a N\$99.67-b or 12.75% increase – the biggest of all clusters – over its N\$782-m allocation at the beginning of the year, which had been a huge 90.7% or N\$372-m increase on last year's revised N\$410-m development expenditure accounting for a much lower 7.5% of the N\$5.46-b total.

The education cluster was the only one to suffer a midyear cutback in its development budget in 2022/23.

The education cluster's N\$881.67-m domestically-funded development budget in 2023/24 is augmented by N\$291.087-m foreign loans outside the State Revenue Fund:

* N\$52.087-m for Education, Arts & Culture – Vote 10 (N\$250-m last year; N\$350-m in 2021/22)

* N\$239-m for Higher Education, Training & Innovation – Vote 32 (N\$10-

m last year; nil in 2021/22).

* In third place, the security cluster has N\$767.57-m to spend on development projects after midyear 2023/24, accounting for 11.83% of the total following a 0.13% or N\$972,000 increase over its N\$766.6-m allocation at the beginning of the year accounting for 11.78%, which had been N\$86-m or 12.65% more than its N\$680.5-m revised expenditure last year accounting for a higher 12.46% of the total.

All the security cluster's development budget is funded internally through the SRF.

* The health and welfare cluster has N\$310.297-m to spend on development projects after midyear 2023/24, accounting for 4.78% of the total in fourth place, following a N\$12.2-m or 3.78% cutback on its N\$322.5-m ceiling at the beginning of the year accounting for 4.96%, which had been a generous 49.3% or N\$106.5-m increase over last year's revised N\$216-m development expenditure accounting for a much lower 3.96% of the total.

All the health and welfare cluster's development budget is funded domestically through the SRF.

* Fifth and last amongst clusters, the administrative sector has a development budget of N\$305-m after midyear 2023/24 accounting for 4.7% of the N\$6.486-b grand total – only marginally behind health and welfare – following a 19.25% or N\$72.7-m cutback on its N\$377.7-m allocation at the beginning of the year accounting for a much higher 5.8% of the total.

Its initial N\$377.7-m development budget at the beginning of this year was an enormous 93% or N\$182-m increase over its N\$195.7-m revised expenditure in 2022/23 when it accounted for a much lower 3.56% of the total.

Although it receives foreign loans for operational expenditure, all the administrative cluster's development budget is funded domestically.

Foreign-funded development projects in 2023/24

Within 2024/24's development budget, apart from the education cluster's N\$291.087-m foreign loans, all foreign development funding goes to the economic cluster.

Those votes with external development funding in the industrial economic cluster in 2023/24 (compared to 2022/23, 2021/22 and 2020/21) are:

* Industrialisation & Trade – N\$17.51-m (nil over the past two years at least);

* Transport – N\$945.552-m (N\$1.7-b last year, N\$779.939-m in 2021/22 and N\$1.055-b in 2020/21).

Those votes with external development funding in the green economy in 2023/24:

* Agriculture & Land Reform – N\$88-m (N\$135.974-m last year, N\$272.48-m in 2021/22, N\$244.658-m in 2020/21); and

* Water (Vote 38) – N\$1.013-b (N\$622.98-m last year, N\$22.399-m in 2021/22, N\$45.248-m in 2020/21).

Foreign funding for the green economy's projects

Only two of the green economic cluster's four votes – agriculture and water – are supported by foreign development funding totaling N\$1.1-b in 2023/24, 150% more than last year's N\$759-m, which was more than double 2021/22's N\$372.8-m and N\$344-m in 2020/21.

This N\$1.1-b foreign development funding in 2023/24 constitutes 55% of the green economy's overall N\$2.03-b development budget sourced inside and outside the SRF, compared to last year's N\$759-m which translated into 50.6% of the cluster's N\$1.5-b total development budget, compared to only 37% foreign funding of its N\$1-b total development

The economic cluster's N\$2.07-b share of all foreign development funding is 87.5% of the N\$2.365-b total this year, compared to 2022/23 when its N\$2.46-b was 91% of the N\$2.7-b total, and 2021/22 when its N\$1.128-b amounted to over 76% of all N\$1.478-b in foreign development finance.

expenditure in 2021/22 and 21.5% of its N\$1.64-b actual expenditure overall on capital projects the previous year.

In 2019/20, N\$568.5-m in external funding was utilized, accounting for 30% of the cluster's N\$1.9-b development budget.

As is repeated this year, over half the Namibian government's N\$1.5-b development budget for its green economic cluster in 2022/23 was propped up by N\$759-m in foreign loans, while its N\$749-m domestic funding for capital projects was only 68% of the N\$1.1-b it was two years ago.

The green economy's midyear woes

Although the central government's N\$749.2-m revised domestically-financed development estimates for the green economy in 2022/23 was 40% more than 2021/22's N\$535.3-m actual expenditure, it was only a little over two thirds of 2020/21's N\$1.1-b actual expenditure and less than a third of the N\$2.7-b it was eight years ago in 2015/16.

It started 2022/23 with N\$812-m before being cut back by 7.7% or N\$62.77-m midyear from its allocation at the beginning of 2021/22.

In 2023/24, the green economy's domestic development budget was cut back by 2.7% or N\$26.3-m to N\$933.685-m from its initial N\$960-m, in which the Fisheries & Marine Resources Vote suffered the biggest reduction of 20% to N\$16-m relative to its original N\$20-m ceiling.

By value, the biggest 2023/24 midyear cutback in the green economy domestic development budget occurred in the Water Vote, which shed N\$12.3-m or 3% to N\$387.685-m from its original N\$400-m development budget.

Last year's entire reduction in the green economic cluster's allocation for capital projects came from the Water Vote, which suffered a N\$72.77-m or 17.3% cutback – the only vote out of all eight comprising the economic cluster as a whole, compared to this year's cross-the-board cutback on all except one vote – Urban & Rural Development in the industrial sub-cluster.

In sharp contrast to the green cluster's midyear cutback in voted development expenditure, the transport and industrial cluster received 20.3% or N\$549-m additional funding in 2022/23 – most of accruing to the Transport Vote.

The government's green economy has suffered annual declines in its development expenditure ever since its N\$2.7-b actual expenditure in 2015/16 to N\$1.1-b in 2020/21, before halving to 2021/22's N\$535.3-m actual expenditure from domestic funding.

diture from domestic funding.

Bulk water supply challenges

The green economic cluster's traditionally decreasing share of the development budget – before this year's dramatic turnaround in its fortunes – rendered it more inadequate than it already was before, to meet intensifying calls for land redistribution, challenges to environmental degradation and critical shortages in bulk water supply and food security.

As far as the government's development of national priorities in environmental conservation, agricultural development, water supply, the fisheries and land reform are concerned, the ongoing logging of indigenous forests in the north-east continues on an unsustainable scale, while foreign fleets continue to poach the country's dwindling fish stocks.

Positive signs of urgency in some project funding allocations in the water and sanitation sector are now increasingly supported by foreign loans, however – notably from the African Development Bank.

However, projects for bulk water supply still centre around ensuring the Namib desert's uranium mines don't run dry, providing rural pipelines to northern peasant communities and quantifying the volumes of artesian water that can sustainably be siphoned from aquifers to feed the country's central highlands until more sustainable solutions are found.

A new project introduced in 2018/19 was for feeding water from the Kavango River to the central highlands – the absence of which the *Tender Bulletin* has been at pains to point out over several years. The project was shelved the following year and remained absent from the development programme until being reintroduced in 2022/23.

This project refers to the Eastern National Water Carrier (ENWC) that commenced during the South African colonial era to link the Okavango River and Karstfeld aquifers with Von Bach Dam via a network of canals and pipelines.

Due to climate change, however, the Kavango River is not a long-term sustainable source of water for Namibia, leaving desalination as the only viable long-term option.

After an absence of several years, the Water Vote's 2022/23's development programme again referred to the ENWC as part of a wider project – the construction of water supply security infrastructure (TCE), which again features prominently this year.

Budgeted fish rot

One month before the Fishrot scandal broke in November 2019, Namibia's Ministry of Fisheries & Marine Resources had its 2019/20 development budget slashed by almost half to N\$10.7-m in the government's midyear spending cutbacks on capital projects totaling N\$1-b.

In 2023/24, the MFMR had its dismal N\$20-m ceiling for capital projects cut to N\$16-m, following last year when it had its N\$12-m ceiling – already less than 2021/22's N\$13.3-m actual expenditure – increased by N\$10-m midyear to N\$22-m – where it was at the beginning of 2019/20.

In 2020/21, the Fisheries & Marine Resources Vote suffered a 52.6% mid-year cutback in its development budget. And although the midyear revisions in 2021/22, left the FMFR Vote untouched, its allocation was a fraction of what it used to be.

On the eve of December 2019's national elections, the ruling party lifted the ban on logging to attract votes from peasant farmers disaffected by the recently-imposed restrictions on the wholesale cutting down of hardwood trees transported to Walvis Bay for shipment to China by the container-load.

This coincided with the Fishrot scandal that engulfed the ruling party, according to investigative news reports that exposed the underhand sale of government fishing quotas through politically-connected elites – many of them members of parliament who still don't declare this income as they are legally obliged to do.

Fisheries favour foreigners

It was reported in 2022 that Namibia's commercial marine fisheries have contributed about 3% to GDP and 20% to export earnings since 2007 (www.trade.gov/country-commercial-guides/namibia-commercial-fishing).

This gap has widened since 2015, when Namibia's industrial fisheries accounted for 3.5% of GDP and 13% of export earnings – testimony to the accrual of value extracted offshore from fish stocks landed domestically.

According to the Namibia Statistics Agency, the fisheries contributed 4.5% to GDP and over 14% to export earnings – widening the gap further.

This means ever more of the value of Namibia's marine fisheries is being exported than is being processed onshore for domestic value-addition.

Taxes on commercial fishing contribute insignificantly to government revenue, leaving the expansion of value addition through onshore processing largely untapped. And there are still no government development projects addressing this avenue.

Instead, the fishing industry continues to be plagued by rent-seeking from BEE concessionaires who speculate with government-allotted quotas, fulfilling their role as compradors to foreign fishing multi-nationals from South Africa, Spain, Russia and China (*Bulletin 1142*).

It must be said however, that recent local initiatives in the onshore processing of midwater landings such as horse mackerel are a promising development, although this is not attributable to government's development paradigm, but to corporate initiatives in the private sector instead.

Namibia's industrial marine fisheries remain bereft of state development projects that rather favour numerous

inland fresh water aquaculture projects that serve essentially as supplementary nutritional sources for impoverished rural communities inland, with little or no downstream commercial value creation.

In the marine fisheries, the government has turned to auctioning off mid-water quotas over the past two years – raising millions that are not channeled into the fisheries, but are used to prop up operational expenditure throughout the rest of government, euphemistically labeled 'government objectives'.

In these auctions, jointly organized by the ministries of finance and fisheries, the identities of the successful bidders are no longer publicly disclosed as had been the case in earlier auctions.

Even the MFMR's own Fisheries Observer Agency, has now asked for its own fishing quota with which to finance its operational shortfalls as a result of inadequate budgeting by the ministry.

The FOA is responsible for collecting scientific data on fish stocks and monitoring quota holders' compliance with regulations on harvesting, handling and processing fish stocks (*Namibia Sun*, 12-Aug-22).

Poor governance and illegal fishing

In 2022, two local companies triggered a public outcry when they lobbied president Hage Geingob to be allowed to harvest horse mackerel as wet fish landings (as opposed to frozen) within the 200m isobath zone where the species breeds and is currently out of bounds to protect fish stocks.

Their lobbying came after being refused permission by the fisheries minister and his predecessor.

One of the two companies was Gendev Fishing Resources in which

the ruling Swapo party has a 96.5% shareholding. Gendev owns 60% of the South African-controlled Gendev Group – heralding from the colonial era.

The other company, Princess Brand Processing, used to be named Seafloer Pelagic Processing which was once in a joint venture with government-owned Fishcor, linked to the Fishrot Scandal (*The Namibian*, 27-Sep-22).

In an article in *The Namibian* in 2021, Roman Grynberg, economics professor working at UNAM, wrote that Namibia imported 35,000 tons of pilchards from South Africa to keep its Walvis Bay canneries in business since there was a ban on catching the species locally due to stock depletion.

Namibia's industrial fisheries which earn around N\$10-b in export earnings, employ around 16,000 workers dependent on the sector's good governance.

But the government determines total allowable catches (TACs) annually in collaboration with private sector industry players and unions – often ignoring recommendations by scientists and marine biologists who scientifically assess fish stocks and sustainable levels of harvesting.

These scientific recommendations are not published annually, nor does the fisheries ministry make public its reasoning behind determining TACs.

Although Namibia reported harvesting 167,000 tons of hake and 331,000 tons of horse mackerel to the Food & Agricultural Organisation in 2018, it has been estimated by some researchers that between 100,000 and 200,000 tons of fish – even up to 400,000 tons – are being caught through illegal unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing each year.

"The government has only recently resumed monitoring the northern border because our [fisheries patrol] vessels had no money", wrote Grynberg, who said locally registered, Chinese and Russian trawlers have been accused of this IUU harvesting on such a massive scale.

"Even with 100,000 tons of IUU in the horse mackerel sector, our fisheries will soon be in trouble", he warned, explaining that the higher-value hake species feeds on horse mackerel (*The Namibian*, 23-Jul-21).

Budgeted woodrot

As the ongoing officially-sanctioned logging of hardwood trees in the north-eastern forests continues, only N\$15.65-m (N\$6.7-m last year) has been voted for the government's integrated forest resource management project under the Environment & Tourism Vote in 2023/24, after N\$12-m was budgeted in 2021/22, compared to N\$19.45-m in 2020/21 – a little over half 2018/19's N\$33.4-m.

There is no end however, to the large-scale destruction of indigenous forests through the issuing of logging permits to greedy peasant farmers generating massive profits for Chinese operators under dubious legal terms.

This environmental destruction will hardly be offset by the 'integrated forest resource management' project consisting of tree planting, orchard development, community support on forest resources and wood utilization/forest product development of which the Environment, Forestry & Tourism Vote's project consists.

This is the only government project directly targeting forestry, with no mention of the conservation of pristine woodlands, but instead speaks only of 'forest resources management' – as if indigenous forests are a 'resource' to be 'managed' – not protected.

This project was supported through a German KfW Grant of N\$12.918-m outside the State Revenue Fund as last reported in 2020/21, with no amount disclosed since.

Counting projects in the economic cluster

The economic cluster's eight votes have 266 projects under implementation in 2023/24, compared to 244 last year and 248 in 2021/22 and 254 in 2020/21.

This is not far off from 2018/19's 247, 129 or 52% of which were cut back midyear – the last time that such midyear-affected projects were identified.

The industrial sub-cluster's 204 projects under implementation in 2023/24 (183 last year) constitute the bulk of the economic cluster's 266, compared to 187 projects in 2021/22 out of the economic sector's 248 projects.

As usual, most projects resort under Urban & Rural Development by number, with 137 (138 last year, 136 in 2021/22), although the Transport Vote's 37 projects (25 last year, 30 in 2021/22) account for most by far in terms of value.

We continue our procurement guide this week to the Namibian Government's 2023/24 national development expenditure estimates with a detailed examination of the 62 projects under implementation in the green economic cluster (all ongoing) – compared to 61 last year, 67 in 2020/21, 63 in 2019/20 and 62 in 2018/19, of which 27 were scaled back midyear – the last year this information was disclosed.

The project count by vote in the green economy in 2023/24:

* Vote 18 – Environment, Forestry & Tourism – nine projects (same as last year, 11 in 2021/22 and ten in 2020/21);

* Vote 22 – Fisheries & Marine Resources – seven projects (same as last year, six in 2021/22, five the year before);

* Vote 37 – Agriculture & Land Reform – 36 projects (35 last year, 36 in 2021/22 and significantly fewer than 2020/21's 41);

* Vote 38 – Water – ten projects (same as last year, eight in 2021/22, eleven the year before).

This leaves the Fisheries & Marine Resources Vote with no foreign funding inputs, where development priorities consist in building offices and freshwater fish farms, instead on focusing on the offshore marine sector with its vast potential for value-addition and industrial linkages.

Agriculture & Land Reform

In first place within the green economic cluster's domestically financed budget, Agriculture & Land Reform (Vote 37) has N\$465-m to spend on 36 projects in 2023/24, accounting for 49.8% of the total after its N\$470-m allocation at the beginning of the year when it accounted for a higher 48.96% also in first place, was cut back marginally by N\$5-m or 1.06%.

Vote 37's original N\$470-m ceiling for capital projects at the start of 2023/24 had been a 38% or N\$130-m increase over 2022/23's revised N\$340-m expenditure when it accounted for a lower 45.38% of the green cluster's total in second place behind the Water Vote.

Its N\$340-m revised domestically-funded development expenditure in 2022/23 was for 35 projects, all ongoing, compared to 36 in 2021/22, one of which was new, and significantly fewer than 2020/21's 41.

This N\$340-m domestic expenditure in 2022/23 was a considerable N\$104.867-m or 44.57% less than 2021/22's N\$235-m actual expenditure, when it accounted for 43.9% of the green cluster's total – also ranked second behind the Water Vote.

Its actual N\$235-m domestic development spending in 2021/22 was considerably below the N\$311.87-m to which it was already revised that mid-year, from an initial N\$347.77-m.

This, in turn, had been almost 28%

less than 2020/21's actual N\$482.26-m domestic development expenditure on 41 projects.

After midyear 2023/24, Vote 37 accounts for 11% of the economic cluster's N\$4.2-b domestic budget as a whole for capital projects, which is much the same as at the beginning of the year, compared to a lower 8.5% in terms of last year's revised expenditure and 7.58% in terms of 2021/22's actual expenditure.

Nationally, Agriculture & Land Reform accounts for over 7% of the N\$6.486-b total (excluding foreign loans) after midyear 2023/24, again much the same as at the beginning of the year, compared to a lower 6% last year and even lower 5% in 2021/22.

Vote 37's N\$465-m domestically funded development ceiling in 2023/24 is supplemented by N\$88-m in foreign loans, raising its total to N\$553-m, compared to last year's N\$136-m in foreign funding on top of N\$340-m for N\$476-m revised expenditure.

In 2021/22, its N\$235-m domestic development expenditure was augmented by N\$246.5-m foreign finance outside the SRF, raising its total to N\$481.5-m.

Vote 37 has six projects under implementation with foreign funding out of 36 in 2023/24, compared to four last year out of 35, also four out of 36 in 2021/22 and eight out of 41 projects in 2020/21.

Agriculture & Land Reform's 2023/24 projects

None of Agriculture & Land Reform's 36 projects in 2023/24 are new, as was the case last year out of projects, compared to one out of 36 in 2021/22 and three of 41 projects in 2020/21.

* N\$104-m has been voted for Vote 37's biggest project in 2023/24 – improvement of animal health and marketing in northern communal areas – reflecting N\$80-m revised expenditure last year, with only N\$21-m actually spent until 2021/22 since starting in 2001/2, out of N\$36.456-m project funding, all sourced within the SRF.

Its last disclosed project total was N\$303-m in 2020/21 with a N\$177-m balance to completion last disclosed in 2019/20.

* N\$88-m has been voted for Vote 37's second-biggest project – development of land in communal areas – reflecting N\$84-m revised expenditure last year when it was Agriculture & Land Reform's biggest project, with a total of N\$73.589-m actually spent until 2021/22 since starting in 2012/13.

This project is funded by an N\$85-m KfW loan in 2023/24, with Namibia providing N\$3-m.

Actual KfW loan expenditure outside the SRF until 2021/22 has now been restated as nil in 2023/24.

N\$710.77-m was the last disclosed total in 2020/21 and N\$194-m the last disclosed balance in 2019/20.

The KfW loan outside the SRF was first reported as N\$48.75-m in 2015/16 and repeated annually since with increasing amounts until 2022/23 when it became nil.

This project was supported by a N\$78-m tranche of the N\$440-m loan outside the SRF from Germany's KfW in 2022/23, the same as the previous year.

Up to 2020/21, N\$78-m of the KfW loan outside the SRF, accompanied N\$6-m inside the SRF had been voted, of which nothing was actually spent, according to the 2022/23 budget.

* N\$80.7-m has been voted for Vote 37's third-biggest project – Green Scheme including Neckartal Dam Phase 2 Irrigation Project, reflecting N\$2.57-m

In first place within the green economic cluster's domestically financed budget, Agriculture & Land Reform has N\$465-m to spend on 36 projects in 2023/24 after midyear, accounting for 49.8% of the total.

revised expenditure last year out of N\$9-m, compared to N\$52.2-m in 2021/22, when it was Vote 37's fourth-biggest project.

The development budget records this project with N\$72.8-m total expenditure until 2021/22 since starting in 2000/01, all funded domestically.

This project's last disclosed total was N\$217.6-m in 2020/21, with an N\$83.8-m balance last disclosed in 2019/20.

* Vote 37's fourth-biggest project has been allocated N\$66.4-m in 2023/24 – the land purchase sub-programme to acquire agricultural commercial land for the resettlement of previously disadvantaged Namibians.

N\$61.384-m was voted in 2022/23 as Vote 37's fourth-biggest project compared to N\$81.4-m in 2021/22.

Yet, no revised expenditure for last year or total expenditure to date is reported, which is hard to believe.

The project's commencement date has been restated as 2016/17, after starting in 1994/95. No actual expenditure out of N\$382.454-m funding until 2021/22 is patently inaccurate.

The project's last disclosed total of N\$3-b-m in 2020/21 with a N\$1.8-b balance last disclosed in 2019/20.

* N\$52-m has been voted for the fifth-biggest project – Namibia Agricultural Mechanization and seed Improvement Project (NAMSIP), reflecting N\$70.368-m revised expenditure last year, out of N\$80.985-m voted as the second-biggest project, after topping the list in 2021/22 and the previous two years.

According to the development budget, nothing has actually been spent on NAMSIP until 2021/22 since starting in 2018/19.

Prior to its accumulated expenditure's restatement to nil in 2023/24, N\$198.48-m out of N\$221.485-m project funding had been spent until 2020/21, of which N\$168.48-m was funded through an AfDB loan.

There no reference in the 2023/24 development budget to the N\$1-b AfDB NAMSIP loan for this project, of which a N\$10.617-m tranche was disbursed last year and N\$168.48-m in 2021/22.

In 2019/20, the NAMSIP project totaled only N\$1.3-b, supported by a N\$1-b AfDB loan (in addition to N\$311.749-m contributed by Namibia), of which N\$587.869-m was spent.

Of the N\$311.759-m initially voted in 2021/22, only N\$30-m was reported as spent in the 2022/23 budget.

None of Vote 37's remaining projects have been allocated over N\$25.6-m in 2023/24, with the lowest allocation at N\$270.000 – an indication of how thin the development fertilizer is spread.

In second place within the green economic cluster, Water (Vote 38) has N\$387.685-m to spend on ten projects funded domestically in 2023/24, accounting for 41.5% of the green cluster's total, following a N\$1.23-m or 3% cutback on its N\$400-m development budget at the beginning of the year when it accounted for 41.67% of the total.

Its initial N\$400-m allocation at the beginning of the year was N\$52.77-m or 15% more than its N\$347.227-m revised expenditure also on ten projects in 2022/23, accounting for 46.3% of the total in first place, after its N\$420-m allocation at the beginning of that year

In second place within the green economic cluster, Water (Vote 38) has N\$387.685-m to spend on ten projects funded domestically in 2023/24, accounting for 41.5% of the green cluster's total.

N\$1.041-b for construction of water supply

was cut back by 17.3% or N\$72.77-m midyear.

Its initial N\$420-m development ceiling at the beginning of 2022/23 was a massive 75.7% increase on 2021/22's actual N\$238-m expenditure – below its N\$260-m midyear expenditure for that year, however. It nevertheless outranked Agriculture & Land Reform to first place.

This N\$260-m had been a considerable 62.7% below 2020/21's actual N\$696.7-m expenditure when it accounted for 54% of the green cluster.

In relation to the economic cluster as a whole, the Water Vote accounts for 9% after midyear 2023/24 compared to 8.67% of last year's revised spending and 7.58% in terms of 2021/22's actual expenditure.

Nationally, Vote 38 accounts for 5.98% of the national total after mid-year 2023/24, below last year's 6.3% but higher than 5% of 2021/22's actual expenditure.

The Water Vote's N\$387.7-m domestically-funded development budget in 2023/24 is supplemented by over N\$1-b in foreign funding, raising its total to N\$1.03-b – almost double Agriculture & Land Reform's combined N\$553-m project allocation funded inside and outside the SRF.

Compared to this year's almost trebling of the Water Vote's domestic allocation by the addition to its foreign project loans, in 2022/23 its N\$347-m domestically-financed development allocation was supplemented by almost double or N\$622.98-m in foreign funding, raising its overall total to N\$970-m – double Agriculture & Land Reform's N\$476-m overall expenditure.

In 2021/22, the Water Vote's N\$260-m development budget inside the SRF was supplemented by only N\$25.4-m external funding (N\$45.248-m in 2020/21), raising its total to N\$285.4-m.

Water projects in 2023/24

Two of the Water Vote's ten projects in 2023/24 are supported by foreign loans totaling N\$1-b, compared to also two totaling N\$623-m in 2022/23 and two of eight projects in 2021/22.

* N\$1.041-b has been allocated to Vote 38's biggest project in 2023/24 - construction of water supply security infrastructure (TCE), involving new water infrastructure and upgrades and refurbishing of existing water installations in the northern, central and coastal areas, including water supplies to livestock in the north.

This project reflects N\$629.237-m revised expenditure in 2022/23 when it was also the biggest, with nothing actually spent until 2021/22 since starting in 2018/19, although it did provide for N\$73.5-m project funding but none was reported spent that year.

Oddly, 2021/22's recorded expenditure was in 2022/23 restated as N\$190.568-m spent out of N\$208.968-m allocated that year before being revised to nil in 2023/24.

The project was first listed as new in 2018/19 with a N\$202-m total and a N\$82-m balance to completion. In 2019/20 the project total shrank to only N\$3-m with a N\$1.88-m balance, only to jump to N\$3.7-b in 2020/21 with the balance undisclosed and N\$73.5-m voted.

This project was supported by a N\$22.4-m AfDB loan outside the SRF in 2021/22 plus N\$481.536-m from the AfDB as "capital transfers to public and Departmental Enterprises and Private Industries" – now all reported as nil.

In 2023/24, the AfDB loan reflects the same N\$481.536-m - all as capital transfers - plus Namibia's provision of N\$147.7-m, also as capital transfers.

Despite the project's purported nil expenditure until 2021/22, N\$190.568-m was recorded as revised expenditure for that year in 2022/23.

This was also its biggest project in 2021/22 when N\$209-m was voted initially.

In 2022/23 the project was supported by a N\$481.536-m AfDB loan outside the SRF (earmarked for "capital transfers to public and Departmental Enterprises and Private Industries"), compared to N\$22.4-m in 2021/22.

According to the development budget's redacted new format in which nothing has been spent on this project until 2021/22, it was described as 'new' when N\$73.5-m was allocated in 2020/21.

The project's scope in 2023/24 includes:

- * Abenab borehole development and linking with Eastern National Water Canal;
- * an additional Direct Potable Reclamation Plant for Windhoek;
- * Oshakati Purification Plant Extension;
- * Ohangwena No. 2 Well Field (Omafo - Eenhana Extension) (awarded to China's Unik Construction);
- * Rundu Purification Plant Extension and Replacement;
- * Katima Mulilo Purification Plant Replacement;
- * Coastal water supply upgrades now revised to include Kuiseb-Swakop and Orndel-Wolfskarsaken Pipelines Replacement; and
- * Olushandja to Oshakati Canal refurbishment.

* The Water Vote's second-biggest project in 2023/24 is 'bulk water supply', for which N\$348-m has been voted, reflecting no revised expenditure last year and no actual expenditure until 2021/22.

This is because it has not featured since 2019/20 when listed as new under Vote 20 (Agriculture).

Its purpose is to supply water in bulk to larger settlements where current water availability is under threat and to increase water security.

The main component is to augment water to the Central Area of Namibia (CAN) from the Kavango River in two phases - I: Kavango Link to Grootfontein; II: Grootfontein link to CAN.

Another component is the canal replacement with a pipeline from Cauleque to Oshakati.

Wholly funded by the government, it started 2019/2020 with N\$2.491-m total and N\$1.723-m balance, with N\$328-m voted reduced to N\$190.685-m midyear, now reported as nil.

* Vote 38's third-biggest project in 2023/24 is rural water supply coverage (rural secondary pipeline construction in the northern regions), for which N\$181.444-m has been voted, all funded by the government.

N\$173.8-m is reflected as last year's revised expenditure when it was the second-biggest project, with N\$404.765 actually spent until 2021/22 since starting in 1995/96 – out of N\$462.9-m funding reported until then.

Last disclosed values for this project are N\$1.1-b total in 2020/21 and N\$520.6-m balance in 2019/20.

Environment, Forestry & Tourism

Ranked third and second-last in the green economy, Environment, Forestry & Tourism (Vote 18), has N\$65-m to spend on nine projects in 2023/24 from domestic development funding, accounting for 6.96% of the green economy following a N\$5-m or 7% cutback on its N\$70-m allocation at the beginning of the year when it accounted for a higher 7.3%.

This initial N\$70-m had been a generous N\$30-m or 75% increase on 2022/23's revised N\$40-m development expenditure (unchanged midyear) from domestic funding when it accounted for only 5.34% of the green economy.

Last year's revised project expenditure was N\$8-m or 16.6% less than its actual N\$48-m expenditure in 2021/22, with a far higher 8.97% share of the sub-cluster total.

Its actual expenditure in 2021/22 was N\$15.3-m or 24% less than the N\$63.3-m to which its allocation had been reduced by N\$23.4-m or 27% mid-year from an initial N\$86.7-m ceiling.

Vote 18 spent N\$104-m on ten projects in 2020/21, after its initial N\$105-m allocation had been an inordinate 119% more than 2019/20's actual expenditure of N\$47.9-m.

But Environment, Forestry & Tourism's restated N\$47.9-m actual expenditure as reflected in the 2020/21 budget was half the N\$90-m it had for eight projects at the beginning of the 2019/20.

In relation to the economic cluster as a whole, Vote 18 accounts for only 1.5% after midyear in 2023/24 – identical in 2021/22 and in line with last year's 1.6%.

Nationally, Vote 18's development budget accounts for only 1% after mid-year in 2023/24, compared to 0.7% last year and 1.02% in 2021/22.

The is no foreign funding to supplement Vote 18's N\$65-m domestically-funded development budget after midyear in 2023/24, as was the case last year.

But at the time of its N\$63.3-m revised expenditure in 2021/22 according to the 2022/23 budget - since restated as N\$48-m actual spending year - was supplemented by German grants – all outside the SRF - totaling N\$54-m (same as the previous year), although the KfW grant for NAMPARKS was not mentioned in the 2022/23 budget.

Environment, Tourism & Forestry's 2023/24 projects

None of Vote 18's nine projects in 2023/24 is new, as has been the case over the past two years, compared to one of 10 in 2020/21.

* N\$16.98-m has been allocated in 2023/24 to Vote 18's biggest project – the construction and extension of regional offices and staff houses, reflecting N\$7.75-m revised expenditure last year (as voted) and total spending of over N\$31-m until 2021/22 since starting in 2003/04.

* Vote 18's second-biggest project is its Integrated Forest Resource Management, for which N\$15.65-m has been voted, reflecting N\$6.7-m revised expenditure last year (as voted), and total spending of just below N\$215-m since starting in 1996/97 out of N\$225.4-m cumulative funding available.

There is no mention in the NPC's development budget of possible external funding from Germany's KfW Development Bank.

This was Environment, Forestry & Tourism's third-biggest project in 2022/23, when the N\$6.7-m voted was a little over half 2021/22's N\$12-m expenditure, when it was Vote 18's second-biggest project for which N\$19.45 had initially been voted.

This project was supported by a KfW grant of N\$12.9-m, according to the 2020/21 budget, but the amount was not disclosed at the time – although it matched what had been voted.

In addition to the forest management project, Environment, Forestry & Tourism had another project under implementation with foreign funding in 2022/23, compared to four in 2021/22.

This was for financial contributions to Namibian Parks (NAMPARKS) for the Tsai //Khaeb (Sperrgebiet) National Park and the North-Eastern Parks, for which there was no mention of a KfW grant or its SRF status, that amounted to N\$210-m in 2020/21.

Fisheries & Marine Resources

Fisheries & Marine Resources has a mere N\$16-m to spend on its seven projects after midyear in 2023/24, following a N\$4-m cutback on its N\$20-m development budget at the beginning of the year - by far the biggest in the green economy, whose other votes were all reduced by between 1.06% and 7.14%.

fisheries monitoring, control & surveillance

At the bottom of the pile in the green economy, Fisheries & Marine Resources (Vote 22) has a mere N\$16-m to spend on its seven projects after midyear in 2023/24, following a N\$4-m cutback on its N\$20-m development budget at the beginning of the year.

This 20% cutback is by far the biggest in the green economy, whose other votes were all reduced by between 1.06% and 7.14%.

Vote 22's N\$20-m development ceiling at the beginning of the year was already over 9% or N\$2-m less than 2022/23's revised N\$22-m expenditure also on seven projects (as voted), with a 2.9% share of the green economy, after its initial N\$12-m was boosted midyear by N\$10-m.

This, in turn, had been a 31% or N\$5.4-m reduction on 2021/22's actual N\$17.4-m expenditure on six projects, when it accounted for 2.6% of the sub-cluster.

Vote 22's N\$17.4-m development expenditure in 2021/22 was a healthy 93.7% increase on the previous year's N\$9-m (for five projects), after its N\$19-m allocation at the beginning of that year was reduced by N\$10-m or 52.65% midyear.

This cutback brought its development ceiling to below 2019/20's N\$10.7-m and was by far the highest midyear development expenditure reduction in the green economy.

Despite its strong performance as an export earner and the dominant role of foreign fishing firms, Fisheries & Marine Resources is the only vote in the green economic cluster that has no external funding.

Fisheries Vote's limited projects

Instead of investing in the localized development of Namibia's offshore fish resources, Vote 22 is again prioritizing its priorities on office accommodation as in previous years, with N\$11.3-m voted in 2023/24 for its biggest project – the construction of the Fisheries & Marine Resources ministry's regional office in Rundu.

This was its joint-biggest project last year, when only N\$1.87-m was spent out of N\$5-m voted, with N\$12.438-m having been spent until 2021/22 since starting as far back as 2015/16.

* Vote 22's second-biggest project is the extension and renovation of its head office, for which N\$4-m has been voted in 2023/24, reflecting N\$5.066-m revised expenditure last year after only N\$5-m was voted, compared to N\$6.5-m in 2021/22.

Only N\$286,000 actual expenditure is reported until 2021/22, since starting sixteen years ago in 2007/08.

By 2013/14 its total was N\$40.25-m with a N\$12-m balance. In 2015/16 the total escalated to N\$60.3-m, rising to N\$63.3-m the following year where it remained until 2020/21, with a N\$6.5-m balance to complete, falling to N\$4-m in 2017/18, when N\$36-m was voted, unaffected midyear.

In 2018/19 the balance rose to N\$15-m, with a further N\$10.6-m voted also unaffected midyear. In 2019/20 the last disclosed balance increased to N\$40.8-m.

All this with cumulative expenditure of only N\$286,000 by 2021/22, we are led to believe.

* Vote 22's remaining five projects – for which between N\$250,000 and N\$1.6-m have been voted, consist of the satellite office in Henties Bay, work

on the aircraft hangar at Arandis, and three freshwater aquaculture projects (same as last year):

- * the Keetmanshoop Fonteintjie Fish Farm;
- * aquaculture development in Kavango at Mpungu and Karowo; and
- * the Leonardville Fish Farming Project.

Building office accommodation and fish farms is hardly at the centre of the ministry's mandate to develop Namibia's marine fisheries potential.

Although the NPC's budget lists monitoring, control and surveillance in the fisheries as one of its development programmes active in 2023/24, there is no reflection of this N\$800,000 item in any of its development projects this year.

As we reported in *Bulletin 1515*, the NPC lists three programmes dedicated to fisheries and marine resources totalling N\$16-m in its list of development programmes for 2023/24, accounting for the smallest, 0.83% share of the green economy's N\$1.995-b total, none of which are supported by external funding:

- * N\$12.4-m for 'Maritime Administration Reform' accounts for 0.62% of the green economy;
- * 'Monitoring, control & surveillance' in the fisheries sector has been allocated a mere N\$800,000, accounting for the smallest share of only 0.04% amongst all the green economy's programmes; and
- * N\$3.4-m for the 'Promotion of Aquaculture' – 0.17%.

NOTES TO THE STATE PROCUREMENT BUDGET

This scoping of what we call government's 'procurement budget' as part of the overall budget is unique to the Tender Bulletin, has been undertaken for most financial years since 1993 and is unreplicated in Namibia. Its purpose is to alert tenderers to forthcoming procurement opportunities.

Procurement spending relates to heads of expenditure normally directed through public procurement channels (with abbreviations):

- * **Materials and Supplies (M&S):** Expenditure relating to the acquisition of store items of consumable nature to be utilized in the process of government services/operations, such as provisions, spares, stationery and other materials.

* **Other goods, services and expenses (OSE):** Generally relating to recurrent spending on items sourced in the real economy, i.e. excluding remuneration, other conditions service relating to the public service, transport provided by the government garage, utilities, property rental etc. OSE consists of consultancy services unrelated to construction as well as non-consultancy services such as advertising, catering, cleaning, entertainment, event management, gifts, legal, printing, security, travel, training services etc.

These two spending heads are form part of government's current expenditure in the operational budget as well as in the development budget.

Other procurement spending components occurring both as capital expenditure in the operational budget (i.e. not current expenditure) and also in the development budget are:

- * furniture and office equipment (FOE)
- * operational equipment, machinery and plant (OEMP);
- * vehicles (V).

Procurement components occurring only within the development budget are:

- * construction, renovations and improvement (CRI);
- * feasibility studies, design and supervision (FSDS).

Maintenance expenses consists of expenditure relating to maintaining capital assets, including office and operational equipment, buildings, roads and bridges, and other capital assets. Although annual and multi-year tenders are issued in this area (e.g. minor capital works, water infrastructure, vehicle, plant, electrical and electronic maintenance), we deliberately exclude it from our analysis to err on the safe side, since some of this maintenance is sourced internally within certain government ministries (e.g. the departments of works and of water affairs).

Although our coverage of the development budget overlaps with some of the operational budget, a project-by-project presentation of the development budget concretizes tendering opportunities more specifically with reference to actual project implementation and is presented separately from the estimates of operational expenditure.

Notices for high-value quotations by the agriculture ministry were leaked to tenderpreneurs before they were posted on the government's e-Procurement portal, only to suddenly appear on the website after the *Tender Bulletin* had been alerted.

N\$9.5-M PRE-FAB DENTAL UNIT AT KATIMA HOSPITAL

9 FEBRUARY 2024

The Ministry of Health & Social Services has awarded a tender for the construction of a prefabricated dental unit at its Katima Mulilo hospital, according to a notice of award accidentally published on the Government's eProcurement portal.

The eProcurement website accidentally published the award notice for a 2023 ONB tender for the Ministry of Health & Social Services, instead of a new tender for forklift training for Pharmaceutical Services at the Central Medical Stores.

On the list of new tenders in February 2024 under 'bidding documents' until 05-Feb-24, the attachment found was the award for tender W/ONB/1308PF-37/2023 for the construction of a pre-fabricated dental unit at the Katima Mulilo Hospital, Zambezi Region that closed 27-Nov-23.

Contract award below N\$11.2-m cost estimate disclosed accidentally after seven of eight offers were disqualified, with prices of three tenderers almost identical

This request for Open National Bidding was advertised only in *New Era* of 27-Oct-23.

The award selection notice is dated 01-Feb-24 and is the first award information made public since March 2023, when the MHSS stopped publishing bid opening records on its own website.

According to the Executive Summary of the Bid Evaluation Report, the cost estimate was N\$11,196,416.10 including VAT.

Of the eight offers received, only one was responsive and selected for the award:

* Nambuild & Civils / Shiimco Agencies JV = N\$9,516,953.69 incl. VAT.

Four of the seven non-responsive bidders were rejected because they were not in line with the principal business of pre-fabricated structures. The bid was restricted to companies specializing in the construction of pre-fabricated structures.

The seven non-responsive bidders were:

* NSZ Investment = N\$9,014,135.90 - not in line

* Nami Prefabricated Housing = N\$9,308,267.90 - 16.86% below the cost estimate (only offers within 15% below or above the project estimates were considered for the award)

NUST invited registered and reputable 100% Namibian-owned Risk Assessment companies to submit their

best proposals subject to a national preference. Service providers within the following categories were encouraged to bid: SMEs; Previously Disadvantaged Women; Youth; People with Disabilities.

On 14-Sep-23 the tender was awarded to:

* OSHEMS Investments = N\$947,089.50 incl. VAT.

The two non-qualifying bidders were:

* Okagulu Investment - no shareholders IDs; no risk management certificates of lead consultant

tenderpreneur who went about canvassing quotations in order to tender – before the bid notice had been circulated on an official platform.

Ironically, the printout of the tender notice clearly states that all procurement activities of the MAWLR (including bid advertisements up until the award stage) as from 01-Dec-23 will only be uploaded on the electronic government portal “therefore you are all advised to visit the e-GP Portal on regular basis”.

None of these four tenders had been posted on the GRN e-Procurement portal by 30-Jan-24.

The tenderpreneurs to whom these RFQs were leaked from within the ministry, must have had a hard time completing the bid documents, which were nowhere to be found on the GRN e-Procurement portal – unless they were also given access to the actual tender documents to the exclusion of other suppliers.

The contact people for the RFQs, Angela Malima and Hertha Uushona, could not be reached last week on the telephone numbers provided.

When contacted by the *Tender Bulletin*, MAWLR PMU Head, Mwala Lutaka, promised to investigate why the tenders were not visible on the GRN e-Procurement Portal.

The mystery around the leaked MAWLR tender notice deepened on 31-Jan-24, when the three tenders for which Angela Malima is the contact person suddenly became visible on the GRN e-Procurement portal late in the afternoon – in amongst other tenders that were already visible earlier in the week.

These three quotations – all prefixed with ‘G/R/FQ/38-’ – were already signed off by PMU Head Mwala Lutaka on 17-Jan-24 – before being date-stamped 24-Jan when it was leaked to some tenderpreneurs before being posted on the G-EP portal.

These three tenders are:

- * Tender G/R/FQ/38-39/2023 (with the original closing date of 31-Jan-24 on page 4 of the bid document but closing on 08-Feb-24 according to the E-GP portal) is a massive order for camping and cooking ‘field equipment’ for hydrological monitoring, also including tools and binoculars under Lot A as well as ‘electronics’ under Lot B, such as pumps, generators, welding machines, batteries and power stations;
- * Tender G/R/FQ/38-40/2023 is for a big order of 20 desktop computers and 10 laptops with accessories for the Department of Water Affairs;
- * Tender G/R/FQ/38-39/2023 is for a specialised Acoustic Doppler Current Profiler with accessories for hydrological monitoring by the Hydrology Division, requiring theoretical and practical staff training to operate the ADCP.

H Uushona is the contact person for the fourth tender, which Lutaka said might have to be amended:

- * G/R/FQ/37-78/2023 – canteen equipment for the Ministerial Regional Office in Rundu, Kavango East Region.

After the *Tender Bulletin*’s enquiry with the MAWLR PMU, the tender notice was finally posted on the e-Procurement portal late on Wednesday afternoon on 30-Jan-24, with the closing date amended by hand from 02- to 08-Feb-24.

Small chance of meaningful bidding from delayed uploads

The *Tender Bulletin* closely monitors the website <https://egp2.gov.na> for new tenders issued by government ministries, agencies and offices, as well as regional councils and local authorities.

In many cases, these invitations to Bid are date-stamped several days before the tenders are actually posted on the GRN e-Procurement portal.

This causes unnecessary delays for companies who might want to submit bids, because by the time the bid document can be accessed on the portal there is not much time left before the closing date.

On several occasions we have come

across a new tender on the government portal for which the wrong tender document was attached or there was no attachment at all.

One example last week was tender NCS/R/FQ/13-260/2023 for the Ministry of Health & Social Services, for which the ‘end date’ was 16-Feb-24.

While the description seems to be for maintenance materials for the Oshana Regional Office, air-conditioners for Oshakati, benches for Ondangwa and other supplies, the attached tender document on the GRN portal is for an older tender with a different tender number NCS/R/FQ/1305PO-258/2023 for air-conditioners at the renovated PHC Directorate that closed 09-Feb-24.

Previous information is no longer accessible

All state entities are supposed to post their tenders on the GRN e-Procurement website, which is hosted by the Ministry of Finance & Public Enterprises under the E-Procurement Client System.

But none of the information from previous years is currently visible on the GRN portal, which now only lists “Activities for 2024” – new bidding documents, adverts, cancellations, bid openings and awards issued during January and February 2024.

It seems that all procurement information since April 2022 when the portal was activated, is no longer accessible to the public. This was confirmed by Mr Negumbo of the MFPE IT Department in January.

In *Tender Bulletin* 1468 we reported that all public entities were instructed to post their tenders and bidding documents on the Electronic Government Procurement (E-GP) website and portal.

The platform was launched on 01-Apr-22, but was only populated with some content in October that year.

The E-GP portal was developed by the Procurement Policy Unit at the finance ministry, together with the Office of the Prime Minister during 2021/22 and is accessible to the public at <https://e-procurement.gov.na>.

As at the end of January 2024, only a fraction of all public entity tenders were posted on this platform, since many regional councils, municipalities, ministries, government offices and agencies still prefer to use their own websites or not advertise their RFQ tenders at all.

The biggest culprit is the City of Windhoek, whose RFQs are not listed on its website at all.

Late uploads at several ministries

The *Bulletin* has this year already tracked several RFQ tenders that were posted late on the GRN e-Procurement portal. Some of these are high-value tenders with many items for which prices first have to be sourced from suppliers.

Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication & Social Welfare

The MGEPESW at the Office of the President issued nine RFQ tenders for large quantities of food that closed on 02-Feb-24 but were only found on E-GP on 29-Jan-24. The invitations may have been dated 22-Jan-24 but were not visible on 26-Jan-24. These were:

- * G/R/FQ/36-103/2023 to G/R/FQ/36-112/2023: Supply and deliver food items for the Feeding Programme of Marginalised Communities for Quarter 4 of FY 2023/24 in 9 lots for Ohangwena, Kunene, Kavango East & West, Zambezi, Omaheke, Oshikoto regions and two lots for Otjozondjupa.

Delayed uploads in 2023

The *Bulletin* red-flagged 42 RFQ tenders in 2023 that were badly affected by late uploads on the E-GP portal or for which the documents were only accessible shortly before the tenders closed. These included:
